
COMMODORE'S COMMENTS

WHAT IS A ZEBRA MUSSEL?

A Zebra Mussel is a pain in the neck.

A Zebra Mussel is a pain in the foot.

A Zebra Mussel is a pain in the hand.

Zebra Mussels damage boats and motors that are docked.

Zebra Mussels have a negative impact on fish, because they reduce their food source.

Zebra Mussels have a sharp edge and stop YOU from using your beach.

Michigan Lake and Stream Association held their 39th Annual Conference in April, 2000.

Bob and Gert Temple represented the BLYC Water Quality Committee at the Treetops Resort in upper Michigan and attended Mike Klepinger's session on Exptics.

Mike Klepinger is the Exotic Species Program Coordinator, Michigan Sea Grant

Michigan State University, Lansing Michigan.

What is an EXOTIC?

It is an aquatic nuisance species plants and animals. One is the Zebra Mussel.

The Zebra Mussel is not native to our mussel population. They were accidentally introduced into Lakes Erie and St. Clair in the 1980s when one or more transoceanic ships discharged ballast water into the lakes. The ballast, which water ships carry to balance the vessel when they aren't fully loaded, may have contained Zebra Mussel larvae and possibly adult mussels may have been carried on an anchor or chain. They are now a permanent part of the Great Lakes, many major river systems, and inland lakes. They continue to spread rapidly. Research is needed to gain understanding of the natural predators, spawning activity, and pollutant uptake.

How are they spread?

Nearly anything that has been in Zebra Mussel infested waters may have the mussels on them. Boaters and angles are responsible for the spread of the Zebra Mussel. The green and white sign that is posted at the Public Landing was purchased by the water quality committee from Michigan Lake and Stream Associations to educate a boater and an angler on how to take action against the Zebra Mussel. A few adult Zebra Mussels have been found at Birch Lake - mostly at the Public Landing.

Does this mean that the mussels found have been brought in by boaters and anglers? Or does this mean that mussels are reproducing in Birch Lake?

A female mussel may produce up to one million eggs per season. Spawning may begin as early as May and end as late as October, but it peaks during July and August.

Larval Zebra Mussels (veligers) drift in the water for three to five weeks. If they are present at Birch Lake they will settle and attach to hard surfaces with their sticky byssal threads and form into adults over the course of the summer.

CAN WE SLOW DOWN A ZEBRA MUSSEL INFESTATION AT BIRCH LAKE?

With the help of MDEQ, MLSA, and Sea Grant, the water quality committee will be introducing a monitoring and reporting program for Zebra Mussels. The tools that we will use are a brick and a rope. The money to purchase the tools was donated to the water quality committee by your neighbors. We will be recruiting them and YOU to "hand pick, remove, and kill" the Zebra Mussel.



Boating safety / PFDs

Who must wear a Personal Flotation Device (PFD)?

-Children less than 6 years of age must wear a Type I or Type II PFD when riding in the open deck area of a boat.
-Each person 12 years of age or older operating, riding on or being towed behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear a Type I, Type II or Type III PFD (that is not an inflatable device).
-Each person less than 12 years of age riding or being towed, behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear a Type I or Type II PFD.

What type of PFD do I need to carry on my boat in Michigan?

Vessels less than 16 feet (including canoes and kayaks) must be equipped with one Type I, II, III or IV PFD for each person on board. The U.S. Guard requires all vessels less than 16 feet, used on the Great Lakes or connecting waterways, to carry one approved Type I, II, or III device for each person on board.

Vessels 16 feet and longer, in addition to the Type I, II, or III for each person on board must carry one type IV. (Canoes and kayaks over 16 feet are exempt from the Type IV requirement.)

Types of PFDs

TYPE I

(Off-Shore Life Jacket) (22 lbs. Buoyancy) Best for open, rough or remote water, where rescue may be slow in coming.

Advantages: Floats you best. Turns most unconscious wearers face-up in water. Highly visible color.

Disadvantages: Bulky.

Sizes: Two sizes to fit most children and adults.

TYPE II

(Near-Shore Buoyant Vest) (15.5 lbs. Buoyancy) Good for calm, inland water, or where there is good chance of fast rescue.

Advantages: Turns some unconscious wearers faceup in water. Less bulky, more comfortable than Type I PFD. Inexpensive. *Disadvantages:* Not for long hours in the water. Will not turn some unconscious wearers face-up in water.

Sizes: Infant, Child Small, Child Medium, Adult.

TYPE III

(Flotation Aid) (15.5 lbs. Buoyancy) Good for calm, inland water, or where there is a good chance of fast rescue.

Advantages: Generally the most comfortable type for continuous wear. Freedom of movement for much active water sports. Available in many styles. Freedom of movement for water-skiing, small boat, sailing, fishing, etc.

Disadvantages: Wearer may have to tilt head back to avoid going facedown. In rough water, a wearer's face may often be covered by waves. Not for extended survival in rough water.

TYPE IV

(Throwable Device) For calm, inland water with heavy boat traffic, where help is always nearby.

Advantages: Can be thrown to someone. Good back-up wearable PFDs. Some can be used as a seat cushion.

Kinds: Cushions, Rings and Horseshoe buoys.

Disadvantages: Not for unconscious persons. Nor for non-swimmers or children. Not for many hours in rough water.



Stu's Star Stuff*

The Moon reaches Last Quarter at 8 p.m. EDT tonight, although don't look for it then. The half-lighted sphere does not rise until after 1 a.m.

It's easiest to look for this phase during morning daylight hours. The half-illuminated orb should be easy to spot in the S and SW long after sunrise.

When you look at the Last Quarter Moon, you gaze out the "windshield" of spaceship Earth. This Moon marks the direction we are traveling as our planet orbits the Sun.

Later in the week the waning Crescent Moon approaches and passes Jupiter and Saturn. Tuesday morning, an hour before

sunrise, the Moon is two "fists" to the upper right of the planets.

The Crescent Moon also makes a wonderful target for binoculars and small telescopes. The craters stand out in exaggerated relief along the terminator, that boundary between light and dark.

Before dawn on Wednesday the Moon passes just south of the fourth-magnitude star Gamma in Capricorn. Once the Moon moves out of the way, Uranus can be found 2.1° NW of the star through mid-June. Uranus is two magnitudes fainter than the star, so binoculars and a detailed finder chart will probably be necessary. Such a chart can be found at:



"You would think that such a day would tremble to begin..."

Translucent wisps of early morning mist were ghosting in soft curls from the top of the glassy water as the resident Heron and I shared the spectacle of an orange glow that painted the lake as it reflected off the houses from the west shore. Through sleep-crusted eyes still red-roadmapped from a double overserving at Hickory Inn, I read the musical notes formed in the air by the mayflies pinging over the gaping mouths of lunging bass; by pollen motes pirouetting to the lyrical laughter of lapping waves.

We were there for the same prey, that great, graceful, gray bird and I, and across the stillness of the still-sleepy morning, our growling hunger for a breakfast of Birch Lake Bluegill bound us to the mutual pangs of a perch lust in deep trout tremolo

In an instant I was rewarded. The water under my fly rose in a torrent, surrounding it with a sucking slosh of scales and fins.

Got him, I shrieked wordlessly, gently setting the hook and finger-reeling the line as I pulled against the contretemps vibrato of the fish's watertop frenzy of wet and white-foamed

Even if a pet doesn't directly interfere with the driver, a dog moving about in a car can cause a big distraction. You may remember hearing on the news how novelist Stephen King was struck by a van while walking a country road. King was badly injured, and the driver said it hap-pened because "he was distracted by his

The Humane Society of the United States advises the safest place for traveling pet is either properly restrained in the back seat or cargo area or (in the case of cats and very small dogs) placed in an appro-

priate pet carrier. Your local pet supply store carries safety harness and carriers for dogs of all sizes. Your Vet would be happy to assist you in decid-



ing to best restraint for your dog

Restraints also help a pet feel more secure while traveling, especially when you have to make some quick turns or maneuvers.


