COMMODORE'S COMMENTS




Have fun, but let's be careful out there.





Swimmers' Itch alert

Several Lakelanders have reported the return of the dreaded swimmers' itch, a rash of small, raised bumps on the skin (resembling mosquito bites).

Dr. George Plain, the Medical Officer for the St. Joseph County (Indiana) Health Dept., says Swimmers' Itch is caused by a Trematode (parasite) and is related to the more-dangerous Schistosoma Mansoni, a

fluke usually found in only in Africa.

Commonly referred to as "duck fluke," the leaf-shaped parasites live in snails. During their larval bloom, which is often related to a heat wave or warming trend, the little nasties attach themselves to the skin of unsuspecting humans and irritate the heck out of our skin.

Fortunately, they don't get any farther than the skin (which differentiates them

from their often-fatal African cousins); unfortunately, there is little you can do once they get you except treat the skin topically with your favorite anti-itch remedy (scratching only makes it itch worse and adds the danger of infection if your bacteria-laden fingernails break the skin).

During the period of the bloom (which

is commonly spread by wind and waves so certain areas of the lake may experience problems while remain fluke-free). Dr. Plain suggests that you wash off with soapy water when you get out of the lake, and that if the problem becomes severe, you should visit a dermatologist.

Common preventive measures from lakelanders include liberal doses of oily products like suntan oils, baby oil and Avon's Skin So Soft before you get wet.

- I RESPECT THE OUTDOORS. I observe but do not disturb other wildlife that live around the water. I release fish right away if I don't plan to eat them.
- I INVITE MY FRIENDS TO GO FISHING WITH ME, AND HELP OTHERS LEARN TO FISH

was a photo-finish.


The Sunfish fleet had two new competitors: Rick Russwurm, whose dazzling new boat was eyed enviously by the other skippers in their battered old tubs; and "Lt. Cmdr." Neil Troeger, who crewed for his dad the first race before his 40 pounds of expertise and 51/2 years of experience were transferred to the committee boat. Tom Howard, steady as always, pulled off two first place finishes in the Sunfish fleet, putting him more than 50 points ahead. (In contrast, there is only a fraction of a point separating the second and third place Sunfish and the first and second place MC's.) Jim Bolinger's stellar performance promises to shake up the Sunfish fleet.

The Commodore was reminded the hard way to duck when the boom swings across (that's why it's called a "boom", Bob). The Fleet Captain needs to learn to rig his boat properly and not to foul a starboard tack boat near the finish line.

WATER QUALITY BLYC Water Quality Committee June 2000, Report #5

COOPERATIVE LAKES MONITORING PROGRAM

Under the guidelines and directions of Michigan Lake and Stream Associations, and Department Environmental Quality, Birch Lake is enrolled in FULL CLMP:

PHOSPHORUS
CHLOROPHYLL
SECCHI DISK TRANSPARENCY
DISSOLVED OXYGEN AND TEMPERATURE

Bob Temple reports to Ralph Bednarz, Limologist, DEQ. The spring phosphorus sample date was April 6. The turn-in date was April 10 at the DEQ Plainwell, Mi. office. Chlorophyll was sampled on May 15 and June 16. Turn-in date is July 20 in Plainwell after the July 15th sampling. Secchi Disk Transparency readings are weekly and began May 7. The latest reading: 23.5 feet is in the Oligotrophic range.


Testing for Dissolved Oxygen and Temperature was introduced as a pilot program to a very limited number of lakes and only with FULL CLMP. The electronic equipment costs approximately \$1,100 and is loaned to Birch Lake and shared with Diamond, Corey, and Christiana. Readings were taken on May 5, and 20, June 6, and 23. Birch Lake still has oxygen at 90 teet deep!!!!!!!






Meat eating dinosaurs

From the Birch Barker archives

Birch Lake & the Underground Railroad

One of the principal grievances of the southern slave owners before the Civil War was the Underground Railroad.

Quakers from Pennsylvania came into Michigan and purchased sections of land around Birch Lake and Calvin Center... The Underground railway was a route over which the black men and their families were carried on horseback or by wagon, at night from one station to another. These stations were usually about twenty miles apart. Two principal routes were used, one coming up from Cincinnati through Indiana and the other from St. Louis through Illinois. These two routes converged just east of Cassopolis at the home of Stephen Bogue. A monument now marks this spot on Route M-60. This was the Michigan terminal of the Underground Railroad. Bogue and Josiah Osborne were the principal operators and the most important men in this undertaking.

Osborne was located on the farm that is known as Hilrings Lakeland Gardens. He operated a nursery here as far back as 1850, furnishing shade and fruit trees for the surrounding country.

In 1847, slave owners from Bourbon Co., Kentucky organized an expedition to come to Michigan to recover some of their runaway slaves. They arrived in the month of August and camped near Shavehead Lake. They knew exactly where the runaways were living as they

had sent a spy up the previous winter. The spy had made maps and reported their location to the slave owners.

The Kentuckians captured several men, women, and a baby living on the Odell farm. The alarm spread and from all over the Birch Lake area angry farmers gathered, armed with guns, scythes, and clubs. The Kentuckians were stopped and surrounded at the Osborne farm. Their wagons were overturned and later dumped into Birch Lake.

The black people were again free and the slave owners left to return to their homes the best way they could. After returning to Kentucky, they wrote many threatening letters to the farmers around Birch Lake, which fanned the flames of the coming Civil War.

The wagons that were dumped in Birch Lake were visible for many years on the east side of the Lake. In more recent years, pieces of these wagons have been sighted and brought up from the soft marl bottom. (Birch Barker 7/2/77)

In case any of you noticed some strange goings-on around the water in front of Camp Tannadoonah, here's what is happening! The Cass Co. Historical has been diving for the sunken wagon that may have been there since 1848 when the slaves escaped to this area and were being protected and hidden from the owners. They say that they have located the "buck board" but it may take many more hours to remove all the mud

before they attempt to raise it from the Lake and treat it. (Birch Barker 7/27/85)

Three skin divers who fished some wagon parts out of Birch Lake, near Vandalia, have turned their find over to the State Historical Commission.

Commission experts will attempt to determine if the divers located a relic of pre-Civil War days that figures in stories about the slave traffic of more than a century ago.

Three Lansing men were prepared to go back after the rest of the wagon if study shows their weekend recovery has historical value.

Ervin Morris, Ira Cooper and Merritt Nevins brought from the bottom of Birch Lake, two metal rear wagon wheels, a connecting axle and a reach apparently broken off between the rear and front wheel assemblies. The rusty objects appeared to first observers to be hand forged.

Tales handed down in the Vandalia-Cassopolis area had it that a group of Kentucky slave-owners seeking runaways left the wagon hidden in the woods while they searched. Local abolitionists then were supposed to have dragged the vehicle to Birch Lake and sunk it about 100 ft. off shore. (From a newspaper clipping that appears in "A Scrapbook History of Early Decatur, MI" on a page dated 1957.)

Emergency Services for Birch Lake

Welcome back to Birch Lake! The summer is into full swing and now that the children are out of school the summer cottages are busting at the seams with company, and everyone is enjoying the beauty of the lake. We hope that your summer is filled with fun and wonderful memories. However, if an emergency should arise, do you know who to call and what to do?

Many Birch Lake property owners know very little about the emergency services provided to the lake if and when the need should arise.

The Newberg Fire and Ambulance Departments serve Birch Lake. Newberg Fire Department is located on the corner of M-40 & M-60 in Jones, Michigan. If you should need their services for an EMER-GENCY, call 911.

Cass County Michigan has an enhanced 911 system that shows the name of the caller and address of call when you activate 911. These calls go into the Sheriffs Department offices in Cassopolis. They then activate the fire or ambulance. Your address is shown on their screen, but they will still ask you for your address to confirm the location to help avoid mistakes. There are several Lakeshore, Northshore and Lakeview Drives on other lakes in Cass County — and that can lead to confusion.

When you call 911, state the emergency you have, fire or medical, as calmly as you can so that you can be understood. If it is a medical emergency, state the type of emergency (heart attack, diabetic, injury, etc.), and give as much information to the dispatcher as possible to enable them to understand the nature of your specific emergency. Give the age of the person, the type of illness, your five-digit address and any specific information that would help the EMS personnel who are trying to locate your home. Many Birch Lake homeowners do not have their five-digit address posted on their mail-

box or their home. Take time to get your numbers up and easily visible now!

911 dispatchers are trained to help you with life saving techniques if needed. Stay on the line till they tell you to hang up.

If an individual in your home has a specific medical problem or other need, these can be added to the 911 system by filling out the form located on the last page of your GTE telephone book for Cass County. All changes must be submitted in writing Residents can mail this form that will be used in advising the dispatcher of any special conditions or instructions you may provide to police, fire or ambulance services dispatched to your location. All information is provided directly to central dispatch and will be held in strict confidence. Send the form to: Cass County Central Dispatch Attn: Special Instruction Coordinator 321 M-62 North, Cassopolis, MI 49031. If you have any further questions about the 911 system, you can call Sgt. Behnke of the Cass County Sheriffs Department at 445-

There have been several problems with incorrect addresses of summer residents in the 911 system. The phone company reports these addresses. If you have had a phone line installed and you have not given the correct information (five digit street address, full street name, city, county and township) your address may not be correct

in the system.

Members of the Newberg Fire and Ambulance Departments are all volunteers. Birch Lake has two Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) living on the lake: Julie Weaver and Darlene Troyer. They are both willing to help you with a medical emergency if they are home. Always activate the 911 system prior to calling one of these EMT's. Time is critical in treatment.

Newberg Ambulance Department has two Basic Life Support Units (BLS). These ambulances are staffed with an EMT and a Medical First Responder on each run. The ambulance is equipped with equipment to care for most medical emergencies. BLS units are not licensed to carry drugs. If a patient is in need of advanced services, the EMT in charge may call for an Advanced Life Saving unit for an intercept.

If you need to be transported to a hospital by the ambulance service, you will be taken to the *nearest* hospital! It is important for you to know that as of this year, emergency protocols for Cass County mandate that patients be transported to the *nearest* hospital for treatment. Three Rivers Hospital is the nearest hospital to Birch Lake. The EMT in charge may ask Medical Control in Dowagiac to grant them permission to divert to a different hospital, but it is not guaranteed that the permission will be given.

We hope that you have a safe and enjoyable summer. But if you have an emergency, you can be assured that the members of the Newberg Fire and Ambulance Department of Jones will have your best interest in mind.





Grilled Spiced Rib-Eye Steaks

8 1-inch thick bone-in the rib-eye steaks (1 lb

1/4 tsp ground allspice

1 tsp ground cumin

2 Tlbs kosher salt

Prepare grill for cooking.

Let steaks stand at room temperature for 30 minutes.

Stir together allspice, cumin, and salt.

Pat steaks dry, and sprinkle spice mixture onto both sides of steaks to lightly coat, pressing to adhere.

Grill steaks in two batches on an oiled rack set 5 to 6 inches over glowing coals 4 to 5 minutes on each side, or until an instant read thermometer inserted horizontally 2 inches into thickest part of meat registers 130 degrees for medium rare. Transfer steaks to a platter and let stand 10 minutes. Serves 8.

Irish Coffee (official formula)

Warm a stemmed glass. Put in a generous jigger of Irish Whiskey, sugar to taste and hot strong black coffee. Stir well. Pour pure fresh cream gently on the top.

To insure the cream floats gently on top of the coffee, it is advisable to place a turned over spoon at the edge of the glass, just above the coffee line. Then pour the cream very gently over the back of the spoon until it rests lightly on top of the coffee mixture.

Did you ever wonder why we have Daylight Saving Time? I know I have. It all seems so confusing; springing ahead, falling back. Why bother? Well, it seems that the idea for Daylight Saving (not Savings) Time came about in England in the early 1900s. The intent was to save energy. And it does.

During World War II, the United States observed year-round Daylight Saving Time (from February 2nd, 1942 to September 30th, 1945). But what seems so confusing is that everywhere you go, everyone is on a different time.

Someone should set down some standards.

Actually, there are standards. In 1883 the US was divided into 4 time zones.

I didn't know. Maybe we should all just go by what time it is wherever we happen to be? And maybe if Indiana wants to become Standard, they should follow the rules like everyone else. That's what I think anyway.

Have a heart — protect your pooch



We have all read about (and felt) the number of nasty mosquitoes this year. Due to the amount of rain we have recently

Boating 'rules of the road'

Boating Rules

You will probably never be expected to quote the navigation rules, but no matter where you boat, other's have a right to assume that you know what you are doing.

To help everyone avoid collisions, the following rules of the road were set up. On the water, the stand-on boat has the right of way. The give-way boat must keep out of the stand-on boat's way.

Crossing situation

In a crossing situation, the boat to starboard is the stand-on boat and has the right of way. It must hold course and speed; the give-way boat keeps clear and passes behind the stand-on boat.

Overtaking

A boat being overtaken is the stand-on boat and has the right of way. It must hold course and speed. The passing boat must keep a sufficient distance to avoid collision or endangering the other boat with its wake.

If the course ahead is not safe for passing, the stand-on vessel shall indicate by sounding five or more short, rapid blasts.

Meeting head-on (or nearly so)

When two boats approach each other head on, either vessel shall signal its intention with one short blast which the other vessel

> Five or more rapid horn blasts indicate DANGER

shall answer. Each vessel shall then alter course to the right to avoid collision

Starboard to starboard passing

When a starboard to starboard passing situation is desired for convenience or safety, either vessel shall signal two short blasts (which the other vessel shall answer with two short blasts) before passing.

Powerboats yield

Powerboats should give less maneuverable boats such as sailboats, rowboats and canoes the right-of-way except in an overtaking situation.

Proper look out
All boats at all times must maintain a proper look out for danger. The person should be experienced enough to recognize lights, markers, boats and other hazards.

Safe speed

Every boat must maintain a safe speed at all times to avoid collision. Safe speed takes into consideration such factors as visibility, traffic, weather conditions and maneuverability.

Speed regulations

In Michigan, there is a statewide speed limit of 55 MPH. You may not operate a motorboat at a speed above slow no-wake speeds when the water depth is less than 3 feet

Riding on decks or gunwales

A person shall not operate a motorboat at more than slow no-wake if any of the following circumstances exist:

1. A person is located on or in the bow of the motorboat and the vessel is not manufactured to provide bow seating

2. A person or portion of a person's body extends beyond the exterior port or starboard walls of the hulls of the motorboat. This does not apply to those operating a sailboat that is not being powered by a motor or a person attempting to anchor, moor, dock or otherwise secure a vessel.

Reckless boat operation
Did you know that dropping water skiers off close to swimmers, or rocking another boat with your boat's wake can be considered either reckless or unsafe boating operation?

Michigan law provides that a person commits the crime of reckless operation when a boat is operated carelessly in willful disregard of the rights, safety or property of others. Violation of this law carries a stiff penalty if convicted.

Unsafe operation of a boat occurs when a person operates a boat in a manner that endangers or would be likely to endanger a person or property.

Other provisions require the operator maintain a proper lookout, to be able to stop within the assured clear distance ahead and to obey all speed limitations.

A boat operator is responsible for the safety of everyone aboard.

Boats and booze: Unsafe at any speed

Alcohol and boating

Drinking and operating a boat is as dangerous as drinking and operating a car. Operating a boat under the influence of intoxicants is against the law. A blood alcohol content level of .10 or more is considered to be under the influence. There is no open-container law for boaters but conservation officers strongly advise boat operators to wait until they get back to shore before consuming alcohol.

A conservation officer who has reason to suspect that a boat operator is under the influence may require the operator to undergo sobriety tests. Anyone who operates a boat on Michigan's waterways has given implied consent to a field sobriety test. Refusal to submit to a chemical test can result in loss of operating privileges for one year.

The penalty for conviction of operating while intoxicated can

be very severe. It may include the loss of a person's motorboat operating privileges.

WHEN DRINKING ALCOHOL, BOATING IS UNSAFE

- 1. Alcohol affects your sense of balance, which is critical when boating.
- Boating requires good vision and alcohol can seriously restrict your vision. It reduces peripheral vision, night vision and your ability to focus.

BOATING ACCIDENT WHAT DO YOU DO?

Operators involved in a boating accident shall stop their boat immediately at the scene of the accident and:

 Give assistance to any person injured in the accident unless in danger themselves.

2. Show their Certification of Registration and give such information as their name, address, and identifying number of their boat as well as the name and address of any occupants to the other boat's operator and/or occupants.

Any witness to the accident shall give their names and address to the operator, occupant or injured person.

Persons offering help at an accident with the approval of the victim are not liable for civil damages resulting from their assistance. This is on condition that the help is offered in good faith and is reasonable and prudent.

Report Required

Boat operators or owners must make a written report of a boating accident to any peace officer when:

- 1. Any person dies, disappears or is injured and receives medical treatment
- 2. Damage to property is in excess of \$100.

This report must be made within 48 hours of the accident.

- 3. Alcohol affects your judgment. Operators under the influence are likely to take risks they normally wouldn't and less likely to make the right choices in lifethreatening situations.
- 4. Alcohol slows your reaction time and in the case of a hazardous situation, seconds may be all you have to take the correct action.
- Even without alcohol, reaction time is slowed in normal boating by stressors.

Stressors include motion, sun, wind and noise. Include alcohol and the stressors' fatiguing effects are multiplied.

ALCOHOL FACTS AND MYTHS

Myth: Beer is less intoxicating that other alcoholic beverages.

Fact: One 12-ounce can of beer, one 5-ounce glass of wine or one shot of 80-proof liquor all contain about the same amount of alcohol and have the same effect.

Myth: A cold shower, a walk in the fresh air, or black coffee will sober you up.

Fact: Once you have consumed alcohol, nothing will sober you up except time. Your body will burn about one ounce of alcohol per hour. If you are legally drunk it will take about seven hours to sober up.

Myth: It's easy to tell if someone is too drunk to drive.

Fact: Many experienced drinkers have learned to compensate for alcohol's outwardly visual effects and can hide their intoxicated condition.

Myth: You are the best person to judge whether you are fit to drive.

Fact: One of the first things you lose when drinking is your judgment.


