

Long ages ago, millions of years in the past, the region where Birch Lake now lies was deep under a tropical sea. After the sea receded the land which emerged was the home of the reptilian and mammal age. Some 2500 years or more ago great sheets of ice a mile in thickness swept down from the northeast, plowing and gouging the surface of the land.

Probably primitive man lived here before the ice came. He may have been the Folsom Man as Folsom points, believed to be spearheads have been picked up in Cass County. Shortly after the ice left, man came again, the forefathers of the Indians.

The first Indians in this section as found by the early French explorers were Miamis. Through a war council treaty the Miami Indians, who were not a war-like tribe, were replaced by the Chippewas, Pottawatomies and Ottowas, who with the exception of occasional wars lived in relative peace. The area around Birch Lake was held by the Potawatomie Indians, who were headed by Big Chief Pokagon and under Chiefs Weesaw and Shavehead. While Pokagon was a very brilliant man, making friends of the white man, accepting the white man's ways and teachings, Shavehead was the opposite. He was a large man for an Indian, very ugly and very mean, gaining his name by keeping his head shaved, which did not make for an improvement in his appearance. Shavehead's winter guarters was around Shavehead Lake and in the summer he migrated to what is now Motts-ville, where there was a ford across the St. Joe River. This ford was on the Sauk Trail which is now modern U S Highway 12. Shavehead would camp at the ford and extract a fee from the white settlers for the use of the crossing. It is reported that he discontinued this practice only after a young, burly settler had taken his ox whip and thrashed Shavehead within an inch of his life.

Shavehead was responsible for the death of many white settlers. He would promise to secure game for the white man but no one returned from the hunting trips but Chief Shavehead. Strangely enough, Shavehead met his death the same way. He was at the Trading Post, which is now Cassopolis, drunk and making his brags about participating in the Fort Dearborn massacre. He was overheard by a young trapper who had lost his wife and child in the debauchery. The young trapper was then living on the Island in Diamond Lake. He asked Shavehead to go home with him. A shot was heard and Shavehead was never seen again.


The Indians under Chief Weesaw, whose winter Quarters was in the vicinity of Newton's Woods joined Chief Shavehead's band in the early spring around Birch Lake, where they bathed in the lake and drank of its water, claiming the water had great healing power. It is recorded that Chief Pokagon, who was ill, made the journey from his home near Sumnerville for this purpose.

Settlement in Cass County was very slow. In 1840 the population was only 5,710. Early settlers around Birch Lake were the Harveys, Merritts and O'Dells.

The decade previous to the Civil War was very exciting in the Birch Lake area. Sections of land in South Cass County had been purchased by Quakers for the purpose of setting up small farms for runaway slaves and negroes brought up through the underground railroad. Periodically there would be a raid by Southern slave owners to recover their property.

As the pure, clear water of Birch Lake was known to the Indian, it was destined to be known by the whites. Before there were any cottages, it was a popular fishing and camping lake. The quality of fish taken from its waters was superb. The scenery was magnificent and as roads became passable, cottages began to be built on its shore. One of the first, if not the first, was the Smith cottage. Today the lake has more than 200 cottages with a summer population of over 700 people enjoying its skyblue waters. There is nothing commercial on the lake. We are proud of the clubhouse which has been built on land that was given by the Howard's (13 lots in all) in the year 1959. The Yacht Club and its officers, over the past few years, have put in many long hours of hard work to make this possible, but even this could not have been accomplished if the neighbors and friends had not so generously given to this enterprise by paying yacht club dues and entering into the planned recreation for both adults and juniors.

After looking over many locations the officials in charge of selection of sites for the summer camps of the South Bend and Mishawaka Camp Fire Girls chose beautiful Birch Lake with Camp Tannadoonah and Camp Ki-Lo-Qua showing the results of their vision and foresight.




