Good sense, particularly experience and training are most important. Before letting your children out in the dinghy with its one and a


half horse, make sure they can handle it properly. (There are a good many of our Birch Lakers who would like to see a Safety Course taught to some of our Senior Citizens also) We don't need a law for instance, to tell us that a swimming area is no place to run an outboard..... at any speed! Yes, adults do it too. They're old enough and big enough to know better....why not set a good example?

You know there are always two sides to every story and our swimmers should also respect the rights of our boaters. We have plenty of water and plenty of room for everyone to enjoy good safe fun.

Following are some complaints that have come to our attention....maybe you didn't think....maybe this doesn't even apply to you...but let's remember:

- (1) When its dark enough for boats to have their lights on, its too dark to be skiing. It is difficult enough to watch, even on a sunshiny day, for skiers and especially if they have fallen.
- (2) Swimmers on rubber floats should not be so far from shore that they interfere with boat traffic.
- (3) Unmarked "snorklers" are appearing out of nowhere. With so much to watch...they are particularly hard to see....how about a little flag as a safety precaution (this is a law, you know)
- (4) The same lighting regulations apply to pontoon boats as to other watercraft...remember red and green on the bow and white at the stern.
- (5) Skiers should give fisherman more consideration (the law clearly states at least 100 ft. clearance....this goes for all boats, not only those pulling skiers.
- (6) Boat traffic should run in a <u>COUNTER CLOCKWISE</u> manner. Maybe our own folks are not to blame but PLEASE advise the company enjoying your cottage and the lake to follow this rule. Don't be a "wrong way Corrigan"
- (7) KEEP SEATED ... And this doesn't mean on top of the back of the seat or on gunwales.

HISTORY OF BIRCH LAKE AND UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

One of the principal grievances of the Southern Slave Owners before the Civil War was the Underground Railroad. Quakers from Pennsylvania came into Michigan and purchased sections of land around Birch Lake and Calvin Center. When the runaway slaves from the South were carried by the Underground into Michigan a farm was given to them and many families have retained this land to the present day. The Underground railway was a route over which the colored men and their families were carried on horseback or by wagon, after night from one station to another. These stations were usually about 20 miles apart. Two principal routes were used, one coming up from Cincinnati through Indiana and converged just east of Cassopolis at the home of Stephen Bogue. A monument now marks this spot on route M 60. This was the Michigan terminal of the Underground Railroad. Bogue and Josiah Osborne were the principal operators and the most important men in this undertaking. Osborne was located on the farm that is now known as Hillring's Lakeland Gardens. He operated a nursery here as far back as 1850, furnishing shade and fruit trees for the surrounding country.

In 1847 slave owners from Bourbon County, Kentucky organized an expedi-tion to come to Michigan to recover some of their runaway slaves. They arrived in the month of August and camped near Shavehead Lake. They knew exactly where the runaways were living as they had sent a spy up the previous winter. The spy had made maps and reported their location to the slave owners. The Kentuckians captured several men, women and a baby living on the owners. The Kentuckians captured several men, women and a baby living on the Odell farm. The alarm spread and from all over the Birch Lake area angry farmers gathered, armed with guns, scythes and clubs. The Kentuckians were stopped and surrounded at the Osborne farm (Lakeland Gardens) Their wagons were overturned and later dumped into Birch Lake. The colored people were again free and the slave owners left to return to their homes the best way they could. After returning to Kentucky they wrote many threatening letters to the farmers around Birch Lake, which fanned the flames of the coming Civil War. The wagons that were dumped in Birch Lake were visible for many years on the east side of the lake. Even in recent years reports that pieces of these wagons have been sighted and brought up from the soft white marl bottom by skin divers. by skin divers.
