

You sit home and watch TV ... you're sipping a refreshing iced tea. The news comes on and then you hear the All-Star game is drawing near. Then you see a far-off land where men are dying in the sand. A frown appears across your face ... you're tired of hearing about that place. Who cares about Viet Nam across the sea - it's far away and doesn't concern me.
