


BIRCH LAKE

The Fishing Club finally got off to a start at a meeting held in the Yacht Club. (Mr. Russell Weaver gave the time of the meeting when he was contacted).

Of the topics discussed at the meeting, main topic was on what kind of fish to stock in the lake. Trout was mainly wanted as a game and prestige fish, but statistics show that it is unprofitable


to stock trout in the lake for several reasons. Smallmouth bass and largemouth bass are wanted placed in the lake more frequently, and in larger sizes. Walleyes and northern pike were also brought up. They were not widely considered because of their diet and because they are not natural to this lake.

Too many bluegills and scavengers, such as gar and suckers, feed on eggs and decrease the lake's fish population. Another point brought up about the decreasing fish population is the netting in the lake which takes place during the winter months. Many fish, not licensed for netting, are kept but even if the fish not intended to be netted are released, the great majority of them would die anyway.

The Fishing Club wants to invite a Conservation Officer to one of their meetings to seek his views on different fish stocks. He has to be a qualified person who knows Birch Lake and what it can support.

The general mood of the Club is to work with the Yacht Club and the Conservation Department. The Club has written to the Conservation Department for information. The letter and its hopeful results will be discussed at the next meeting.

GREETINGS FROM YOUR FRIENDLY MARINE DEPUTY

We are now well into the summer and there seems to be more problems around the lakes than just boats. Many of our lake residents have called the office to complain about the operation of Mini-bikes on the roads around the lakes.

The state law is very clear in regards to the operation of a motor vehicle on the streets and highways of this state. To start with, before a vehicle can be operated on a public street or highway it must be registered with the Secretary of State's office, have a license plate bolted on to it and be insured. Once these qualifications are met, then the operator must have a license to operate such vehicle and he or she must wear a helmet while operating it. While these bikes are on the street they then must abide by all the laws and regulations governing motor vehicles.

If the vehicles are operating on public streets or highways they will be stopped and issued a summons for illegally operating a motor vehicle. If the youngster is under 16 he will be cited into probate court for operating a vehicle without a license. The owner of the bike or parent will be given a summons and cited into the Fourth District Court for allowing an unlicensed operator to operate a motor vehicle.

If young people have Mini-bikes and wish to drive them, they must meet all requirements or keep them on private property.

The law is not meant to restrict anyone from having fun or enjoying themselves, but it is for their own safety and welfare. We ask all parents to help us with this problem.

POLLUTION

Cottage owners on Birch Lake rely on septic tanks to remove their wastes and some garbage but how many of you know the exact location of your tank and its capacity? It is wise to know the relationship of your water well (depth and location) to your septic tank; during periods of high water or if the drainage around your cottage is not adequate, you and your family could be drinking sewage water that has not been properly cleaned. Even if you have the proper distance between your well and tank, do the contents of your neighbor's tank seep into your well? Different soil structures have very different drainage patterns and some are not adequate at all for sewage. Contact the Soil Conservation officer if you are in doubt. Many major and minor diseases can be contracted from impure water.

On the subject of drainage, does your septic tank drain into the lake due to underground water movement? The bubbles and foam that appear on the lake from time to time could be due to inadequate drainage--drainage toward instead of away from the lake.

Is your septic tank big enough for the number of people that you have living in or visiting your cottage? The number of guests that you invite to your cottage should be limited by the amount of water and wastes that your tank can handle--if you care about the lake and the surrounding area.

- DO: Clean your septic tank regularly
- Use white toilet tissue as color dye pollutes the water
- Peel the plastic liner from disposable diapers before placing them into the toilet
- Dispose of facial tissues in the trash - not the toilet
