Greetings from your friendly Marine Deputy: I hope everyone had a safe and enjoyable weekend over the Fourth. On the 4th we had two near drownings and two other possible drownings that turned out to be unfounded reports. The two near drownings could have been much more serious than they were. One young man had dived into the lake from a pier where he was visiting and was not familiar with the depth of the water where he was swimming and hit his head. In checking the depth of the water at the end of the pier we found that it was may 3 foot deep. A little checking in advance would have prevented a very serious problem.

If you have never seen a victim of drowning you are fortunate, because it is not a pleasant sight. It is not a pleasant sight when a person is being revived either, but it sure makes you feel good when they start breathing on their own.

Another type of problem lake residents are having is kids on minibikes. Many times these youngsters don't have sufficient control of these bikes and do present a problem. All teenagers and parents should remember that before any vehicle can be driven on public structs or highways it must be licensed, the driver must have a license, and to drive a mini-bike or motorcycle the driver and rider must have on a helmet.

On July 3rd I stopped a young boy and told him he could not ride his mina-bike on the streets without a license and a helmet. The next day, July 4th, I was again at Birch Lake and observed this same young boy on his mini-bike driving it on the streets. I was talking to two other boys on bikes with no helmets at the time. Then he saw me he turned around and headed the other direction very quickly. He knows he is in violation of the law and is stilf doing this. His parents are also in violation of the law for permitting him to do this.

Laws are made for the protection of all people. Many times a law is made to protect YOU FROM YOURSELF.

Inasmuch as considerable interest has been shown in Disney World in Florica, we are giving a few points of interest.

It will be opening in October 1971. It is situated 7 miles west of Kissimmee and is reached by a four-lane divided boulevard which connects the entrance with the main parking area on U.S. "192 near Interstate "4. 
