Did you hear about the Indian who had only one tooth? His name was Ree but everyone called him One-Tooth--Ree.

Be sure your boat carries enough Coast Guard Approved life jackets, flotation cushions, or life preservers to equip each person on board.

If you use your boat after sunset or before sunrise, it must be equipped with workable navigation lights.

To Tow water skiers, your boat must have a 170 degree wide-angle rear view mirror located so the boat driver has a clear view of the skiers. At least one competent person must be on board to observe and, if needed, to assist the skiers.

Always drive at a speed slow enough to be able to stop within the assured clear distance ahead of you.

When you overtake and pass another boat, you must pass on the left side of the other boat. The boat being passed has the right-of-way.

Motorboats must always give sailboats, canoes, or rowboats the right-ofway. And when the motoboat gives way, the other boat must not change direction or speed until after any risk of contact has passed.

Special Notes

- 1. Starting time for the first race will always be at 11:00 Michigan/10 Indiana time. The second race will follow the first with notice from the committee.
- 2. We will be sailing with the latest NAYRU rules including the 720° rule. Descriptions of rules will be given in a later Barker edition.
- 3. Boats must sail a minimum of 16 races to be eligible for season standing trophies.
- 4. The 4th of July Regatta series will count toward the season standings but the Labor Day Regatta series will not.
- 5. The sailing fees will continue at \$5.00. Fees must be paid by July 4.
- 6. All boats are required to have APPROVED life preservers aboard. This will be enforced.
- 7. There will be no make-up races. A listing of all finishes will be kept at the Yacht Club.
- 8. The protest procedure and the scoring will continue the same as last year.
