We both have been with them in the boat and have been cut-off by an adult not looking where he was going, they have witnessed boats going wrong way on the lake, boats trying to swamp sailboats, the buoys, skiers coming close to rafts trying to spray people, motor boats coming into swimming areas, horse-play of all kinds. Some are done showing off and others just plain careless.

It is hard for me to explain to them why all this goes on when it is wrong and no one does anything about it. The Marine officer in Cassopolis that instructed them said it was not the younger drivers that should take this course but the older ones and I believe him. I have taken down several boat numbers that I am calling the Sheriff's Dept. to report as I want my children, as well as every-

one, to be safe on our lake. As a concerned Mother, I am



BIRCH LAKE--A CENTER OF AREA HISTORY

Start from Birch Lake and you have an unlimited amount of colorful and relaxing small trips into history. Some need only a few hours; some a whole day.

Many of the small towns in our local area date back to the early 1800's. Constantine has a group of houses that were constructed for what is considered cheap today (\$3,500) in house building. They are in beautiful shape and fun to drive by to see and once a year are opened for a public house tour.

Up Patterson Hill Road between Vandalia and Jones, there is Bald Hill which is a geological oddity--a gravel hill made of composite rock deposited here by a glacier. It is bare of vegetation; you can climb it and it is a very interesting sight.

Then there is Jones itself. Once a "typical small town" of the early 1900's it is being renovated and turned into a street of various memories of the 1890-1920 era. It is worth an afternoon's time, especially on various weekends when special attractions are planned.

North of M60 between Vandalia and Cassopolis is the Russ Forest. It is an area of virgin timber set aside by the Russ family as forest area not to be sold. Within this area stands the oldest and largest tulip tree in America. Also, timber planted by the forestry and agriculture departments can be found along the access road.

Near the Russ Forest is another old home which is being restored and is open for viewing at various times of the year.

Also along Highway 60 between Cass and Vandalia is the farm which was the final "depot" of the Indiana Underground Railroad of our country's Civil War.

If you want a longer drive, try the shopping mall in Kalamazoo with dinner at the Whistlestop. It is the old railroad depot for that area and a very interesting building. In Mishawaka, a tour of the 100 Center Shops in Old Kamm's Brewery with dinner at the Ice House or a snack at Rathskeller or ice cream at the Black Cow plus a movie at one of the twin theatres could provide an afternoon and evening of entertainment.

South Bend has Notre Dame with Sacred Heart Cathedral always open, a grotto beside a beautiful lake, the original Log Chapel and many other attractions. Special tours can be arranged to see a diesel engine that switches cargo from ND to the main line, a TV and radio Station (WNDU) and the ND Library. Also in South Bend is the River Bend Plaza which is scheduling a series of attractions for the summer months. Watch the South Bend Tribune for these.

If you have any doubts about the title, rest assured--Birch Lake is in itself a large part of our area history. Look for another article soon on the subject.
