### TOM'S GARAGE OPEN HOUSE

### BIRCH LAKE AND THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

One of the principal grievances of the Southern Slave Owners before the Civil War was the Underground Railroad.

Quakers from Pennsylvania came to Michigan and purchased sections of land around Birch Lake and Calvin Center. When the runaway slaves from the South were carried by the underground to Michigan, a farm was given to them and many families retain this land to the present day. The underground railway was a route over which the colored men and their families were carried after dark, on horseback or wagon, from one station to the next. These stations were usually about twenty miles apart. Two principal routes were used, one coming from Cincinnati through Indiana and the other from St. Louis through Illinois. Those two routes converged just east of Cassopolis at the home of Stephen Bogue. A monument marks the spot on M 60. This was the Michigan terminal of the Underground Railroad. Bogue and Josiah Osbourne were the principal operators and the most important men in the undertaking.

Osbourne was located on the farm that was later known as Hillring's Lakeland Gardens. Mr. Osbourne operated a nursery on this farm as far back as 1850, furnishing shade and fruit trees for the surrounding country.

In 1847, slave owners from Bourbon county, Kentucky organized an expedition to come to Michigan to recover some of their runaway slaves. They arrived in the month of August and camped near Shavehead Lake. They knew exactly where the runaways were living as they had sent up a spy the previous The spy had made maps and reported their locations winter. to the slave owners. The Kentuckians captured several men, women and a baby living on the Odell farm. The alarm spread and from all over the Birch Lake area angry farmers gathered, armed with guns, sythes, and clubs. The Kentuckians were stopped and surrendered at the Osbourne Farm (Lakeland Gardens). Their wagons were overturned and later dumped into Birch Lake.

The colored people were again free and the slave owners left to return to their homes the best way they could. After returning to Kentucky, they wrote many threatening letters to Birch Lake, which fanned the flames of the Civil War. The wagons that were dumped in Birch Lake were visable

for many years on the east side of the lake. Even in recent years, reports that pieces of these wagons have been sighted and brought up from the soft marl bottom.

that resembles a sophisticated arrangement of broomstick, hubcaps, jingle bells, screen door springs, and the kind of horn that makes an Model-T-ish Ooga! sound.

They specialize in polka music, and play during the polka festival at Camp Bellowood near Union in mid-September. But their repertoire is not limited to polkas; Matt can coax a lump into your throat with familiar, folksy airs on the button accordion, and Joyce can bring a tear to your eye with lonely laments on the mouth organ.

Sometimes they are joined in performance, as they were at the fair, by a couple of friends who call themselves The Ding-A-Lings: Evelyn Gay, who plays the washboard (more difficult than it sounds!), and Betty Wegener, who plays the "gutbucket" (washtub bass). Betty also plays with the New Frontier Band.

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When they're not making music, Joyce operates Joyce Realty from the couple's Birch Lake home. She got her real estate sales license in 1974, and her broker's license in 1978. A business in her home made sense because "that's where every-

one knew to find me."

Matt mans a permanent booth at the Shipshewana Flea Market. A World War II Army Air Corps veteran and B-29 crewman, he participated in the battle for Tinian Island in the Pacific. A unique twist to his military service is that while in the Air Force, he sailed twice around the world. After his service stint, he worked for Hammond Organ Co. until his retirement.

Matt and Joyce met at Willowood, the old O. Henry ballroom, and danced their first dance together to the music of Wayne King.
