

## EARLY WILLIAMSVILLE

To all of us here on Birch Lake, Williamsville and "Lanky's" has become synonymous since it is the friendly stopping place for food, refreshments, ice, gas or just news.

But we'd like to turn back the pages of history just a few years and give you a glimpse of Williamsville seventy years ago. Where Breece's Store now stands was a large two story brick building, The William Merrit Store. This store has changed hands many times since it was first established back as far as 1860 by Josiah Williams, the gentlemen who laid out the village in March 1848 that bears his name. Some of these people are: Wm. Merritt, William Merritt, Jr., J. Fred Merritt, Milo Merritt, Oscar Loupee, Tom White, Albert Snyder, Hyton Jones and the present owner, G. W. Breece.

The General Store has played a very important part in the history of this community because it was the center of all business transactions in the early days. Part of the time it housed the post office and most of the time had the only telephone in the vicinity.

The earliest records in this township are the entries of land in 1829 by John White . (who was probably the first settler in North Porter), John East and Nathan Williams. At this time Josiah Williams build the great mill just south of the main streets of Main and Mill and it was operated by W. W. Camp.

The old mill by the creek has also played an important part in the history of Williamsville. Many sacks of feed, and flour have geen ground by the great stone run by the water power coming down the mill race from Birch Lake and the Mill Pond. Austin Searer is the present owner of the mill. His father, Christian Searer came here in 1880, bought the mill and ground feed, made cider and sorghum.

Down on the corner of Main and Mill streets in the house now owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. William Franklin was an Inn operated by a man by the name of Austin. No doubt many weary traveler spent the night in this haven. Directly across the street was a grocery or general store, as they most all were in those days, operated by Rhuben Weikle, later by Tom White. In the center of the block was a telephone exchange installed by Perry Storey.

There were two physicians in the village, a Dr. Moore who lived at the southwest corner of Main Street and a Dr. Fort.

Zacky Brown started a barber shop in this same block and operated a feed store and livery in connection with the barber shop. Other ventures were a saw mill run by Albert Reck and Jerome Cousins, a cabinet and paint shop operated by Will Rhinehart, and a cooperage by Hardy McCally.

Mail was carried at this time on horse back or by horse and cart; the route running from Bristol through Williamsville and to Vandalia. The carrier was James W. East.

There was a Methodist Church erected on the northeast corner of Pine Tree Toad intersection on land donated by William R. Merritt. Cost of the Church was \$5000. The Quaker or Friends church was erected back in 1850. These people have left their imprint on the section through these many years.

Now when we go to Lanky's for our groceries or refreshments, let's think a few kind thoughts of the people who many years ago were part of a thriving little village on Birch Lake.
