Homeowners' Association Meeting

The annual meeting of the Homeowners' Association took place Saturday, August 15, 1998 at the clubhouse. Rick Russwurm called the meeting to order and reported on the membership and finances, and on the public vote declining Constantine Schools' request for a property tax increase to finance new construction. Dean Davis reported on the meetings of local governmental and other boards attended on behalf of the Homeowners' Association, including the Porter Township Board of Trustees, Constantine School Board, Board of Public Works, Board of Zoning Appeals and Community Policing Association. Dean also discussed his investigations into the possibility of inviting, in conjunction with the water quality committee and the board of the BLYC, a professional to conduct an updated comprehensive water quality analysis of the lake. He will try to make arrangements for that professional to attend a meeting open to all lake residents to discuss the proposed analysis, after which a decision would be made whether to hire the professional to conduct the analysis. Scott Troeger discussed the proposed new Michigan legislation on waverunners. He also reported on the extent and type of usage of the boat launch, and (as reported earlier this year in local newspapers), that the county along with the DNR seems interested in paving the land behind the boat launch to add more parking spaces for the boat launch and Lake Park. The membership considers additional parking at the boat launch to be extremely undesirable, with adverse consequences for water quality, safety and quality of life for the lake homeowners. Dean Davis reported on local political changes and their implications for the lake, and Bill King reported on the status of the dispute between Porter and Newberg townships over providing fire and emergency services to the lake. During the discussion period, it was learned that some lake residents had observed the dumping of sewage from the new intensive hog sheds onto the field directly South of the lake. The membership considers this activity absolutely unacceptable and action will be taken to stop it. Members also discussed the desirability of coordinating efforts with other local lake associations on matters of mutual interest, and this will be investigated. The meeting was then adjourned by Rick Russwurm.

Bring a young sailor out on Saturday to introduce them to the sport (free lessons, see below). 08/16 - Race Results:



Don't mess with Mother Nature ...


