Lemon Pepper Pasta with Chicken (Melanie Hall)

1 pkg lemon pepper pasta

1 lb pkg fresh mushrooms(cut up)



1 pkg feta cheese crumbled

1 pkg chicken breasts (boneless, skinless) chunked

1/2 C Burgundy wine

1T minced garlic

In a medium skillet, melt 1T butter, add wine garlic and saute chicken with mushrooms until chicken is done. Stir, put fresh spinach on top, cover, simmer 5 to 10 min. Cook pasta according to pkg directions, adding 2T of olive oil to water. Drain pasta. Put pasta into a large serving bowl and add contents of skillet. Add crumbled Feta and mix well. Serve hot or cold with french bread. It is good without the chicken too.



NEW CONCERN OVER PWC'S

For those who use a Personal Water Craft, there is no denying they are great fun. Otherwise we wouldn't be buying 175,000 of them every year.

Those who dislike PWC's have long cited that the noise and danger have no place on our national waterways. Thus laws have been passed to limit the hours of usage and act as a compromise between the groups.

However, new information about water pollution should give everyone concern about PWC use on our waterways. In fact, Lake Tahoe has banned most PWC's because of petroleum waste left by their two stroke engines. Also, a proposed policy change nearing final approval in Washington would ban PWC's from 356 of the 378 units in the National Park System.

The Sierra Club, which backs tighter regulation of two stroke engines, claims that in seven bours of operation (an average weekend for some) a standard PWC's two stroke engin creates as much air pollution as a 1998 automobile will emit in 100,000 miles. The Izaak Walton League asserts that two stroke engines leak 165 million gallons of oil into American waters each year - 15 times the amount released by the EXXON VALDEZ in the 1989 spill. The average PWC engine discharges 25 to 30 percent of its fuel UNBURNED, into the air and water.

The newer fuel injection engines dramatically reduce waste and noise and do provide a solution to what will be a serions problem to America's waterways, especially small inland lakes.

Birch Lake Joins <u>C</u>OOPERATIVE <u>LAKES MONITORING P</u>ROGRAM

This program, which is a cooperative venture between the Birch Lake Yacht Club Water Quality Committee, Michigan Lakes and Streams (ML&S), and the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ), allows us to measure and monitor Birch Lake's CLARITY, PHOSPHORUS, and CHLOROPHYLL.

Following are some questions and answers about the second element of the program— PHOSPHORUS.

What is phosphorus?

Phosphorus is one of several essential nutrients that algae need to grow and reproduce. For most lakes in Michigan, phosphorus is the limiting factor for algal growth.

Where do yqu find phosphorus?

Phosphorus is anaturally occurring element that is found in rocks and soil. Humans use and dispose of phosphorus on a daily basis in common items such as fertilizers, foods, and cleaning agents.

Phosphorus is found in lakes in several forms and is in a constant state of flux as environmental conditions change and plants and animals live, die, and decompose in the lake. It is also possible for lakes to receive some of the human generated phosphorus through runoff, septic leachate, and other sources. The various forms of phosphorus are constantly changing and are distributed in different locations of the lake with changing seasons. Because of this, all of the forms of phosphorus are measured together as total phosphorus.

What does phosphorus testing tell us?

The total amount of phosphorus in the water is used to predict the level of productivity and eutrophication in a lake. An increase in phosphorus over time is a measure of nutrient enrichment in a lake.

When do you test for phosphorus in the lake?

Phosphorus tests are done in the late summer and in the spring. Late summer results, along with Secchi Disk measurements and chlorophyll measurements, provide an estimate of the level of productivity, or trophic state of the lake. These results are used to calculate a set of trophic state indices for the lake. Spring overturn, when the lake is generally well mixed from top to bottom, is an opportune time of the year to sample just the surface of the lake to obtain a representative sample for estimating the total amount of phosphorus in the lake. At other times of the year, water column sampling helps determine phosphorus levels in the lake.

What is the meaning of trophic state indices?

Trophic state indices provide a quantitative means of describing the stage of lake aging or eutrophication. Lakes are classified according to their trophic state (i.e. oligotrophic or clean water/low productivity, mesotrophic or moderately enriched, eutrophic or poor water quality/high productivity).

In the next issue, we will discuss CHLOROPHYLL, the third element of testing.

PERSONAL WATERCRAFT SAFETY ACT Effective 4-1-99

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- 281.1411 Operation of personal watercraft: requirements.
- Sec. 11. 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, a person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state unless each person 12 years of age or older riding on or being towed behind the personal watercraft is wearing a type I, type II, or type III personal flotation device as described in R281.1234 of the Michigan Administrative Code.
- A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state unless each person on board or being towed by the personal watercraft who is less than 12 years of age is wearing a type I or type II personal floration device as described in R281.1234 of the Michigan Administrative Code.
- A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state unless each person on board the personal watercraft is wearing a personal flotation device that is not inflatable.
- 4. A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state if a child who is under 7 years of age is on board or being towed behind the personal watercraft unless the child is in the company of his or her parent or guardian or a designee of the parent or guardian.
- 5. While operating a personal watercraft equipped by the manufacturer with a lanyard-type engine cutoff switch on the waters of this state, a person shall have the lanyard attached to his or her person, clothing, or personal flotation device as is appropriate for the personal watercraft.
- 6. A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state during the period that begins I hour before sunset and ends at 8 a.m. As used in this subsection, "sunset" means that time as determined by the national weather service.
- A person operating a personal watercraft on the waters of this state shall not cross within 150 feet behind another vessel, other than a personal watercraft, unless the person is operating the personal watercraft at slow-no wake speed.
- 8. A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state where the water depth is less than 2 feet, as determined by vertical measurement, unless one or both of the following circumstances exist:
- (a) The personal watercraft is being operated at slowno wake speed.
- (b) The personal watercraft is being docked or launched.
- 9. A person shall operate a personal watercraft in a reasonable and prudent manner. A maneuver that unreasonably or unnecessarily endangers life, limb, or property, including but not limited to all of the following, constitutes reckless operation of a personal watercraft under section 17:
- (a) Weaving through congested vessel traffic.
- (b) Jumping the wake of another vessel unreasonably or unnecessarily close to the other vessel or when visibility around the other vessel is obstructed.
- (c) Waiting until the last possible moment before swerving to avoid a collision.

- A person shall not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state carrying more persons than the personal watercraft is designed to carry.
- A violation of subsection (10) is prime facie evidence of reckless operation of a watercraft under section 17.
- 12. A person operating a personal watercraft in excess of the speeds established under part 801 of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.80101 to 324.80199, is guilty of reckless operation of a personal watercraft under section 17.
- 281.1419 Operation of personal watercraft; distance requirements; exceptions.
- 2. Except as provided in subsection (4), a person who operates a personal watercraft or a person who is being towed by a personal watercraft on a water sled, kite, surfboard, parachute, tube, water ski, or similar equipment on the waters of this state shall maintain a distance of not less than 100 feet from a dock, raft or buoyed or occupied bathing or swimming area, a person in the water or on the water in a personal flotation device, or a vessel moored, anchored, drifting, or sitting in dead water.
- 3. A person who operates a personal watercraft or a person who is being towed by a personal watercraft on a water sled, kite, surfboard, parachute, tube, water ski, or similar equipment on the waters of this state shall maintain a distance of not less than 200 feet from a submerged diver, vessel engaged in underwater diving activities, or a flomtion device displaying the international diving insignia.

281.1427 Display of boating safety certificate.

- Sec. 27. 1. An individual who is required to complete a boating safety course under this act and who operates a personal watercraft on the waters of this state shall display his or her boating safety certificate upon the demand of a peace officer who identifies himself or herself as a peace officer.
- 281.1431 Use of personal watercraft; age provisions; exception
- Sec. 31. 1. Except as provided in subsection (2), a person under the age of 14 shall not use a personal watercraft on the waters of this state.
- A person who is 12 or more and less than 14 years of age before January 1, 1999 may use a personal watercraft on the waters of this state if before January 1, 1999 he or she obtained a boating safety certificate.
- 3. A person who was born after December 31, 1978 shall not operate a personal watercraft upon the waters of this state unless he or she first obtains a boating safety certificate.
- 281.1433 Certification requirements for out-of state residents.
- Beginning 1 year after the effective date of this act, a person who is not a resident of this state shall operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this state only if he or she has one of the following in his or her possession:
- (a) A boating safety certificate.
- (b) A certificate issued by his or her state of residence that reflects education and training that is substantially similar to the education and training required to obtain a boating safety certificate under this act.






BLYC SAILING NEWS


