HOMEOWNERS' ASSN. NEWS

The Wightman Petrie Engineering Firm will conduct an informational meeting on sewers at 11 am on June 15, 2002 at the BLYC Clubhouse

The Porter Township trustees have been deliberating whether to implement a wastewater (sewer) project for some or all of Baldwin, Long, Indiana, Carter, Shavehead and Birch lakes. The engineering firm Wightman Petrie has prepared studies for a proposed sewer project involving those lakes including costs, procedures, timetables and alternatives.

The Homeowners' Association has been monitoring those developments. It appears that many residents of Baldwin, Long and Indiana lakes are strongly in favor of having sewers installed as soon as possi-

It therefore seems likely that as early as this Summer a petition drive may be initiated for installing sewers at Baldwin, Long, Indiana, Carter, Shavehead and Birch lakes.

The Homeowners' Association wants to ensure that the property owners at Birch Lake receive all the relevant facts in order to make an informed decision if a sewer petition is circulated.

The engineering firm Wightman Petrie has agreed to send representatives to a joint meeting of property owners of Birch and Shavehead lakes.

The meeting will be on June 15, 2002 at 11 a.m. (Indiana time) at the BLYC clubhouse. Representatives of Wightman Petrie will explain the proposed wastewater project and be available to answer any questions about it. You are encouraged to attend this



An Itchy Situation Poison Ivy

In Michigan, we have many plants that can wreak havoc on our skin and probably the most well known is poison ivy. Poison ivy grows in clusters of three waxy leaflets, 2 to 4 inches long and pointed at the tip. In poison ivy, the main source of itch comes from allergenic oil called urushiol (yoo-ROO-she-ol), which has the consistency and even the color of 3-in-1 oil and is found in the leaves, stems, roots and skin of the berries.

Once the oil gets onto the skin, it only takes five to 10 minutes for the poison oil to mix with the lipids (oils) on the surface of the skin. It is at this time that person could wash the area with lots of warm water (using soap could actually spread the oils) in

an attempt to remove the oil. Once exposed, there is a four-to-six-hour window of time where washing the area with water will help. Once urushiol enters the skin it does not resurface through the blisters, so scratching the blisters will not spread the condition. The body makes fluid in the blisters; but this fluid does not contain urushiol. It is possible to not be allergic to urushiol but it is uncommon.

Only 15 percent of the population is truly immune. It is also thought that if you reach adulthood and you have not had a reaction, you chances of contracting the allergy drop from 85 percent to 50 percent. So, for those of you who have never had the itch, there is a chance that you will never get it, but there are hundreds of cases out

there where people have gone for years without an outbreak and suddenly, well into adulthood, they develop the rash

Contrary to popular belief, poison ivy is not all bad. Many wildlife species such as insects, rabbits and more than 60 species of birds, including ring-necked pheasants and ruffed grouse, benefit from it by using it as an important food source.

For humans, prevention is the best medicine. Learn to be able to identify the plants, pay attention so that if you do come into contact with the oil you can wash thoroughly with alcohol, and water solution. Most importantly, don't let the itch or the fear of poison ivy keep you from getting out around the trails and woods that surround Birch Lake. It truly is a natural place to be.

May 2002 Report #1

GOOD NEWS: I am Oligotrophic. I am TOP water quality. BAD NEWS: I am sensitive to phosphorus. I can't take it any more!

In the late '70s, I first became aware of the fact that *phosphorus* in my diet is a problem. I was analyzed by several environmental sources, and a report from Dr. Snow, Andrews University, indicated that I was slowly being *poisoned*. My condition was in a middle to low middle quality. He said that I have a relatively long water renewal period, 15.2 years; therefore, I was on the way to becoming, I shiver to say the word, "eutrophic" — a dead lake.

The pure natural spring sources are my only antitoxidants. The pure natural spring sources give me crisp, clean, and refreshing water.

Unlike me, you have wheat germ, brown rice, and ledithin: fish, zucchini, sweet potato and butternut squash. You have onions, and romaine lettuce. Grapefruit, lemon juice and cherries are also your antitoxidants — as well as garlic, and maple syrup. Toxins in MY body are neutralized when I am fed pure spring water.

By the mid 1980s, I could no longer digest the increasing amount of phosphorus in my diet. I vomited black scum mixed with green phlegm on a nearly daily basis. You have olive oil to release bile and aid digestion—pure spring water is the only aid for me!

I developed a dangerously high fever from the contaminated septic seepage and feared that my disease was contagious to you and that I would be put in quarantine.

Specialists Don Wirne, Michigan Lake & Stream Associations, and Lee Maager, Cass County Health Department, concurred that my severe condition needed correction. After careful study of facts, symptoms and tests, a diagnosis came as an enormous emotional shock for me and for property owners!!

Good News: I am Oligotrophic

Measurements were taken by the Health Department to heal my laden body. By the mid 90's each of the 181 lakefront properties had been inspected and 96 septic systems that were contributing bacteria and/or phophorus to my body were corrected. Corrected septic systems are my "apple a day." I am fully recovered from middle to low middle health. My temperature is normal. (In 1978 my oxygen stopped at 25 feet) My oxygen stops at 90 feet. My phosphorus level is in the top trophic range.

Bad News: I am sensitive to phosphorus.

A steady drip drop of phosphorus runoff from fertilizers, soil, decaying leaves, and high phosphorus goose droppings will enter my body and continue to build up in my deep basin. Like the leaky faucet into a bucket when the water builds up and spills over, the continuing build up of sediment in my deep basin will spill over into my water column. The phosphorus will feed the algae. The algae will grow at a rapid pace. It will be the beginning of my loss of oxygen. I will loose my immunity to eutrophication.

You have cumin, oregano, turmeric, cloves and ginger. Oats, wheat germ, brown rice, peas and beets, as well as fish and yogurt and lecithin and sunflower seeds are good for your immune system. In order for me to stay immune to phosphorus, I trust that you will take the responsibility to keep phosphorus runoff away from my body and make sure that I will always be your spring fed Birch Lake not your phosphorus fed Birch Lake.

And now a word from your water quality committee:

Every year the Yacht Club renews Birch Lake's health insurance policy with Michigan Lake and Stream Associations for an annual check-up. The water quality committee appreciates the opportunity to participate in Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program.

Professionals in land and water management are teaching us how to be good stewards of your lake. We are listening. We are working together for the good of Birch Lake.

Anchors and Hurricanes

Last September 15th, Ron Dionne, the guy who edited my first novel, sent me an e-mail that included eight photos he'd taken on the morning of the 11th. Ron's office was in a building across the street from the world trade center complex, and after the towers came down, he took his camera and went outside.

His pictures were no more horrible than hundreds of other images we all saw that week. They captured the reality of a devastated war zone: rubble everywhere, body parts scattered among the stones, automobiles twisted and burned beyond usefulness. They were ghastly, but by the time I first saw them, the scenes they depicted had become all too familiar.


Nevertheless, my experience of the 9/11 tragedy changed as soon as I opened the e-mail and Ron's images appeared on my computer screen. Like all other Americans, Shirley Anne and I had been non-stop television viewers since we saw the second plane fly into the trade center towers while we ate breakfast and watched the Today Show. We were angry, and confused, and devastated by what we'd seen, but Ron's photographs, made it all much more immediate and personal. Suddenly, I felt the breath of this evil on the back of my neck.

Here was someone we knew, and with whom we'd shared a very good time, sending us evidence of his involvement in the most horrific experience any of us could remember. This was Pearl Harbor played out in the street where he worked and lived; this was a piece of the holocaust delivered to his doorstep in a single moment.

Naturally, I've kept those photos. I've kept them, but I almost never get them out of their files. I don't need to refresh my memory or open them up to check a detail; I can see every one of them in my head whenever I choose, and all too often when I don't.

And now it is May instead of September and we're getting ready to make our annual move to the lake. The pier is in, and yesterday the guys from Eagle Lake Marina delivered our boat. I've cut the grass twice already, and our thoughtful son-in-law, Scott, has cut it again because it threatened to take over the neighborhood. We've had our wood walls power washed and sealed and the house siding and roof reclaimed from a year's worth of dirt and rough weather. Next Tuesday, the flowers go in.

On our way from Granger to Birch yesterday we saw two white swans swim-



ming in a stream near Rainbow Road, and later Scott, Shirley Anne, and I stood on our pier and watched a loon surface and dive his (her?) way across the southeast corner of this gorgeous lake. I've waited in the road so I could say hello to Chuck Gollatz, interrupted my mowing for a discussion with Dave and Judy Olson, waved to Doug Courier and his dog Bear, and thanked Dwayne Weaver for helping Scott and me complete a chore that called for three sets of hands.

Shirley Anne and I will be snug inside our lake home for the summer by the time this Barker comes out, and the beauty and the rhythm of the season will be underway. In a world where 9/11 events can happen at any minute, thank God for people, and times, and experiences like those found on beautiful Birch Lake.







Welcome back to the star studded skys of the lake. The display the planets put on early in the month was wonderful. And the Moon and Venus at mid-month were spectacular too. So what's up for the next few days?

A lunar eclipse occurs on Sunday, so what must be the phase of the Moon? Answer: Full (7:51 a.m. EDT). Lunar eclipses occur at Full phase, solar eclipses at New. The eclipse is a penumbral eclipse,

Look West for planet sightings

which means the Moon passes through the edge of the Earth's shadow. Penumbral eclipses are generally unsatisfying. The Moon is only slightly darkened. The casual observer probably would not notice. More bad news: this eclipse is visible primarily from the Pacific, Australia and New Zealand. The western U.S. can catch a glimpse of it at moonset.

In spite of the cooler than hoped for weather we know that summer is indeed on its way. All three stars of the Summer Triangle are observable 2 hours after sunset. Vega, brightest and highest of the trio, is

almost half way up in the east-northeast. Altair, in Aquila, the Eagle, and Deneb, tail of Cygnus, the Swan, sit low above the horizon in the east and northeast. This three-some is the most identifiable celestial harbinger of warm summer nights.

Finally, over the next 7 or 8 days, look in the west after sunset for Venus and Jupiter. Venus is closing and poised to overtake the giant planet early next week. Watch every night to follow the progression...and enjoy the show. It's free.
