#### Personal Watercraft laws

We have been asked to remind Birch Lakers that one of the laws affecting Personal Watercraft on lakes in Michigan stipulates that PWCs cannot be operated after one hour before sunset.

During the month of June, sunset occurs between 8:12 to 8:23 pm (Ind. time), so PWCs must be off the lake one hour prior to that. In July, the days start getting shorter, and sunset occurs at 8:23 on July 1 and drops to 8:04 on July 31; August sunsets range from 8:02 on the 1st to 7:19 at the end of the month.

We have also been asked to remind all boaters that the Cove is a "no-wake" zone.





# Burn barrels are big air polluters

Burn barrels may cut down your
garbage bill...but at a greater
cost!

A study by the
Environmental Protection
Agency has found that, pound
for pound, backyard burn barrels release as much as 80 times
more air pollutants than municipal incinerator. Included in
those pollutants are such things
as dioxins, PCBs, volatile
organic compounds and an
alphabet soup of other chemicals. The low-temperature combustion of materials that aren't
recycled releases may pollutants
into the air; according to the

EPA – sometimes even more than hotter burning fires that include newspaper and other recyclables.

The EPA study found that pollutants from household burn barrels are primarily a problem to immediate neighbors downwind. While the amount of pollutants from individual burn barrels is relatively small, the picture changes when burn barrels are common across communities.

In 1994, the EPA tried to determine the primary sources of dioxins in environment by comparing amounts in soils with estimated production from industry and other large sources. They found environmental levels higher than would be expected from known sources. Once they found that dioxin levels from burn

that dioxin levels from burn barrels can be as much as 11 times higher than from municipal incinerators, they speculated that burn barrels may be the "missing link" that could help account for the discrepancy.

The most immediate environmental impact of burning whether it's in a barrel or leaves in the fall-is detrimental air quality that can be especially hard on people with asthma or other lung conditions. Ideally people should not burn household wastes. There are alternatives to waste disposal other than burning... recycling of paper, plastic, glass and leaves/brush. Active recycling and composting can reduce the burden on our landfills as much as 40 to 70 percent.

Be a good Birch lake neighbor do not burn. The birds, fish, frogs, turtles, eagles and children need good clean air. And since some pollution travels farther be a good neighbor Globally.

# **Dream House**

s is the case every spring, there is a lot of construction going on around the lake. When I went running this morning, I counted two brand new houses and four remodeling projects. It took me back to the year we decided to make a major financial commitment to our house at Birch, as a way of preparing for the time when we would spend more of the year on these shores.

We built our place 12 years ago, utilizing much of the shell of the old home (a remodeled fisherman's cottage with an unfinished upstairs) where we'd spent our summers since 1973. We had trees we wanted to save, and we liked the story-anda-half design of the original building, so we elected not to do a complete tear down.

"It will cost you more than if you started from scratch," Ernie Nagy promised me, and he was right.

Joe Bailey had done the Nagy's place as well as Bud and Barb Zesinger's house, and we liked both of those, so we asked him to take a look at our situation. Joe spent a couple of hours giving us a pop quiz on how we wanted to live while we were at the lake, and within a couple of weeks he came up with a design that gave us everything we'd discussed.


I was still working in the consulting business, so I left town on an airplane almost every Sunday night, and I rarely returned before Friday. Construction began in November and went until the following Spring, and Shirley Anne spent part of nearly every day driving to Birch to be on hand while the crew was working. Joe began by gutting the house and jackhammering the floor, leaving no supporting walls in place and creating two enormous holes in the siding.

When Shirley Anne showed me what it looked like, all I could manage to say was, "I sure as hell hope you know what you're doing, Baby."

As usual, she did. She has more nerve than James Bond and more determination than War Emblem. She was her own general contractor, and though Joe helped her find most of her subs, she had to choose every color, swatch, tile, cabinet, handle, fixture, appliance, carpet, light, and wood type we needed. She placed every ceiling light, fan, sconce, wall switch, and outlet we had to have. She orchestrated the overall project, paid everyone, and made certain the work of one group didn't fall behind and create problems for someone else. It was a 24-hour-a-day job.

She had a marble cutter that wouldn't talk to anyone but her, and a bunch of drywall hangers who came and went as they pleased and managed to alienate everybody. She had to fire a group of painters who wouldn't come to work, and she dumped a landscaper after he completed only one of the four wood walls we needed.

She had never done anything like this before, but she took to it as though she'd been born for the task. Thank God, it was her who built the house. If it had been me.



we'd still be living in a tent in front yard.

Occasionally we have people from the lake come to us for advice about building a "dream house" at Birch. Shirley Anne can help them with all of the details, but I am now as I was then, kind of a "big picture" guy.

"My advice," I tell them, "is to be certain you love this place before you decide to pour a sizable portion of your resources into a home here. Then bring your happiness with each other and with your family to the experience."

Birch Lake cannot cure a sick relationship or mend family wounds that have been picked up elsewhere, but Birch Lake can make the good times better, and the best times indescribably good.

Also, if you're wise, you'll get my wife to build the place for you. I've been through this home 10,000 times, and never once have I said, "I wish we had done this a little differently."

of the Sun, then, it's just big enough to cover it up, turning daylight into darkness.

But the Moon's orbit around Earth isn't

a perfect circle. Its distance from Earth varies by about 30,000 miles. This is enough to cause Luna's apparent size to When the Moon is farthest from Earth, it isn't quite big enough to cover the Sun, so a "ring of fire", or annulus, encircles the dark lunar disk. For this reason Monday's eclipse will nowhere be complete, or total. Instead, the bright ring shows at maximum eclipse for observers on a line extending from Indonesia to Mexico.

The U.S., except for the east coast, will witness various stages of a partial solar

For us here at the lake or in town, the eclipse is in progress at sunset. The eclipse begins about 8:30 p.m. when the sun is quite low. At its best, about 25% of the sun's diameter will be covered. This eclipse requires eye protection or special techniques to view safely. The sun will still be too bright to look at directly, but you may notice the sky turning a bit dusky, and temperatures could drop by several degrees.

# Michigan PFD laws (in brief)

Children less than 6 years of age must wear a Type I or Type II Personal Flotation Device (PFD) when riding in the open deck area of a boat. Each person 12 years of age or older operating, riding on or being towed behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear a Type I, Type II or Type III PFD (that is not an inflatable device). Each person less than 12 years of age riding or being towed, behind a personal watercraft (jet ski) must wear

a Type I or Type II PFD.
What type of PFD do I need to carry on my boat in Michigan?

Vessels less than 16 feet (including canoes and kayaks) must be equipped with one Type I, II, III or IV PFD for each person on

board. Vessels 16 feet and longer, in addition to the Type I, II, or III for each person on board must carry one type IV. (Canoes and kayaks over 16 feet are exempt from the

Type IV requirement.)

PFD Types
TYPE I (Off-Shore Life
Jacket) (22 lbs. Buoyancy)
Best for open, rough or
remote water, where rescue
may be slow in coming.
Sizes: Two sizes to fit most
children and adults.

TYPE II (Near-Shore
Buoyant Vest) (15.5 lbs.
Buoyancy) Good for calm,
inland water, or where there
is good chance of fast res-

Sizes: Infant, Child Small, Child Medium, Adult. TYPE III (Flotation Aid)
(15.5 lbs. Buoyancy) Good
for calm, inland water, or
where there is a good
chance of fast rescue.
TYPE IV

(Throwable Device) For calm, inland water with heavy boat traffic, where help is always nearby.

Kinds: Cushions, Rings and Horseshoe buoys.

**Note:** All PFDs must be ready at hand and not enclosed in plastic bags or other containers.






