Only then can a responsible decision be made.

Again, the BLYC has not taken a stand on the sewer situation now, nor does it intend to in the future.

Jones, Tim Steffen, Kevin, Kurt and Herm Kruggel, Mike and Brian Machalleck, Dick Bender and John Ball.






News from the Cove

Birch Lake Notes

Homeowners' Assn. News Some Zoning and Keyholing Facts:

Birch Lake and all of Porter Township have been subject to a zoning ordinance since 1982. For the past 20 years the lakeshore property around Birch Lake has been zoned L-R (lake residential) except for Camp Tannadoonah which was zoned for "Parks, Campgrounds, Recreation." Most of the back lots have been zoned R-1 (residential) except for a very few backlot areas which were zoned Agricultural. Both L-R and R-1 areas are limited to single family structures. The 1982 zoning ordinance also contained a provision limiting "keyholing" or "funneling," the use of a small lakeside lot to give lake access to multiple off-lake parcels.

The zoning ordinance and the keyholing ordinance have now both been considerably strengthened, effective this spring. The efforts to strengthen them have been ongoing for several years. They have involved lengthy political processes and have had to overcome opposition from various groups. Homeowners' Association board member Rick Russwurm was active on the Porter Township Planning Commission which accomplished the new zoning Master Plan. These matters

have previously been reported on at annual meetings of the members of the Homeowners' Association and are on the agenda for the 2002 annual meeting scheduled for Saturday, August 24, 2002 at 10 a.m (Indiana time) at the BLYC clubhouse.

The new zoning Master Plan modified the zoning map, so that all the lakefront lots are now zoned L-R, the most restrictive single family dwelling category. Back lots are either zoned L-R or R-1. The L-R and R-1 classifications limit the use to single family residences and do not allow any condominiums, commercial developments, campgrounds, RV or trailer parks, apartments, etc. Even Camp Tannadoonah is now zoned L-R. The Camp's current use as a children's camp is "grandfathered" and can continue indefinitely, but any other use or substantial change of use must comply with the restrictions of L-R classification.

The new "keyhole or funnel waterfront access" ordinance requires property used for lake access by land off the lake to have at least 50 lineal feet of frontage for each dwelling unit given access, to contain at least 7,000 square feet, to have at least 200 feet of total frontage and to have a minimum depth of at least 140 feet. Piers on key-

hole property cannot be within 50 feet from another pier or longer than the average length of the four adjacent residential lot piers (two on each side). Property currently being used to provide backlot lake access can continue its historical use if otherwise lawful and in accordance with the express provisions of its deed, but must comply with the pier length provisions.

All zoning ordinances have

provisions for seeking variances from the zoning requirements. Variance requests require a public hearing after notice is published and also is given directly to nearby property owners. A zoning variance request goes first to the Zoning Board, and if denied, goes then to the Zoning Board of Appeals. There is always a risk of an undesirable zoning variance being slipped through during the off-season, but that risk is lessened by the presence on the Zoning Board of Rick Russwurm and by the presence on the Zoning Board of Appeals of Dean Davis. Both Rick and Dean reside on Birch Lake and are on the Homeowners' Association Board. Should the Homeowners' Association learn, through these or other sources, of any attempt for an undesirable variance from the zoning requirements, the Homeowners'

Association will try by all appropriate means to prevent that undesirable change. The willingness of large numbers of Birch Lake residents to show up at zoning hearings, even during the "off-season," to express opposition to undesirable zoning variances will be important. Strong ordinances and representation on decision-making bodies are important, but everyone still needs to be vigilant and to be prepared to take concerted action when necessary to protect the good things we all value about Birch Lake.

Zoning decisions ultimately involve political considerations. Large numbers of people acting together present one of the most potent political considerations. Porter Township's largest population group consists of the lake property owners on the various lakes. The Porter Alliance of Lakes (P.A.L.) was formed as a way for the homeowners' associations of Birch, Baldwin, Long, Indiana and Shavehead Lakes to communicate about and provide mutual support on matters of common concern. P.A.L. supported the recent strengthening of the zoning and keyholing ordinances and P.A.L. can potentially be effective in helping prevent undesirable zoning variances affecting any of the Township's lakes.



Sewers at Birch Lake

The possibility of sewers at Birch Lake has been in the back of many of our minds for several years as we have watched the neighboring lakes, one by one, install sewers and waste removal systems. This summer, after the joint meeting between Birch Lake and Shavehead Lake residents, the issue of sewers has moved front and center.

The joint meeting was very informative, and I thank Dean Davis and anyone else responsible for putting the meeting together. The tone that Dean Davis set, that the meeting was informational and not a forum for debate, was appropriate and I commend him for that also.

Each of us now must decide whether we should move forward and begin the lengthy process of having sewers installed, or defer the decision for another point in time. The debate is heating up and I hope that once the votes are tallied, that we can all move forward regardless of the outcome, as a united lakefront community.

I believe that we should install sewers now and not later. Recent circulated information, including a letter from some MSU sewer guru, which was intended to convince us that sewers aren't needed now, did indicate that sewers will be necessary at some point in time. If that is true, then why put off the inevitable? Birch Lake water quality may be very good now, so why not ensure its high quality for future generations of Birch Lakers? We are indebted for the efforts back in the '80s that led to the improvement of the septic systems. However, let's not kid ourselves in thinking that septic upgrades will be better for the water quality over the long term than a sewer sys-

Opponents of sewers refer to the many potential risks and negative effects of sewers. If these risks are real, then I suggest we invite residents of the neighboring lakes that have already installed sewers, to share with us all of the problems that they have encountered to

The only real reason for opposing sewers is the cost. I sympathize with anyone on a fixed income that may be faced with the costs of a sewer system. However, if sewers are inevitable, keep in mind that the costs will only go up. If we don't take advantage of the power in numbers and join the other lakes now, the future costs of going it alone 10 years from now may be prohibitive for many.

I encourage all Birch Lakers to look beyond the cost and accept the fact that sewers are best for the lake over the long term and sign the petition for sewers.

Vidalia Onion Pie

- 1 1/2 cups finely crushed buttery crackers (Ritz)
- 6 Tlbs (3/4 stick) unsalted butter, room temp, divided
- 2 cups thinly sliced Vidalia onions or other sweet onion.
- 3/4 cup milk (not low fat or non fat)
- 2 eggs 3/4 tsp salt
- 3/4 cup packed grated sharp cheddar cheese (3oz)

paprika chopped fresh parsley

Preheat oven to 350. Mix crackers and 4 Tlbs butter in bowl until well blended. Press mixture on bottom and 1 inch up sides of 8 in. pie plate. Melt remaining 2 Tlbs butter in heavy medium skillet over medium heat. Add onions and saute until tender, about 12 minutes. Arrange onions in cracker crust. Beat milk, eggs, and salt in medium bowl until blended. Season with pepper. Pour egg mixture over onions in crust. Sprinkle cheese over filling. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake pie until knife inserted comes out clean, about 35 minutes. Garnish with parsley and serve.



Barbecue Meatballs

- 2 Lbs ground chuck I tsp salt
- Dash of pepper 1/2 cup com flake crumbs
- 2 eggs

SAUCE:

- 1 cup ketchup
- 1 cup water
- 1/3 cup Worcestershire sauce
- l tsp salt
- 2 dashes Tabasco sauce
- 1 tsp chili powder

Mix ground chuck, salt, pepper, corn flake crumbs and eggs. Roll into small balls. Place meatballs on a cookie sheet and bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Make sauce and pour over meatballs. Simmer meatballs in sauce for 2 hours or place in crock pot for several hours on low. Makes 50 meatballs.



Vitrate Alert — check your water

Ten of the 21 Birch Lake wells that were tested for Nitrates last weekend are reported to have potentially dangerous levels of nitrates above the state limits.

The tests, which were done by Garrett Labs, an independent testing facility in Niles, indicated that the those wells all failed to meet the state guidelines of 10 parts of nitrogen per liter, some showing levels as high as 38 ppl, a level that indicates a serious health hazard.

The nitrates are showing up in wells in different parts of the lake, with four of the over-the-limit tests coming from the West Shore, one from the Cove, and the remainder along the East Shore. At least one of the wells tested within acceptable levels just last year. Health officials warn that nitrates above state limits are dangerous, especially for infants and babies, and for senior citizens, Most health officials also recommend that everyone should refrain from drinking water from contaminated wells, and that appropriate steps should be taken to eliminate the problem.

Nitrates are chemicals that are found naturally in drinking water. The primary sources of nitrates are human and livestock waste, and the most common use of nitrates is in agricultural and lawn fertilizers.

According to a local well driller and to a representative of the Michigan Lakes and Streams Association, nitrates are frequently found in rural wells with depths are insufficient to get below the appropriate filtering layers of earth.

They added that anyone with a nitrate problem should consult the local health department or a well expert, and that they should also consider having their wells tested for depth, and for other forms of bacteria.

Treatment for nitrate is complicated and expensive, but only water used for drinking and cooking needs to be treated. The three methods of reducing or removing nitrate are demineralization by distillation or reverse osmosis, ion exchange, and blending. Although it is common to think of boiling, softening or filtrating as a means of purifying water, none of these methods reduce nitrate contamination. Boiling water is, in fact, the worst thing to do because it actually concentrates the nitrate. Softening and filtration of well water do nothing at all to remove nitrate.

Test your water this weekend

Anyone on the lake who wishes to have their drinking water tested for Nitrate levels can do so this weekend for just \$10.

Nancy Walker, a real estate agent with ReMax Shore Acres and a Birch Lake East Shore homeowner, will handle the program again this weekend. Lake residents can pick up a water container and an instruction sheet from a box on Walker's porch any time Saturday. After filling the container, they should then return it to another box on the porch and place their \$10 check into the envelope provided. Checks should be made payable to Garrett Laboratories.

The results will be available early next week, and we will keep you updated in upcoming editions of the Birch Barker.

Concerned about the possibility of nitrates in your drinking water?

Here is some information you should know:

- 1. Approximately 28 percent of the shoreland surrounding Birch Lake has an agricultural watershed (a watershed is the area around a lake from which the lake gains water. Birch Lake is a spring-fed lake).
- 2. Nitrates can come from over-application of fertilizer on farmland. It can take as many as 10 to 15 years from the time of fertilization for the nitrates to reach the lake because ground water flows slowly.
- 3. The wetlands and forestlands around the lake help absorb some of the nutrient runoff; however, there are some areas that have direct runoff.
- 4. Shallow wells can be affected by this runoff and may have unsafe nitrate levels as a result.
- 5. Application of fertilizer directly on your property can also seep into shallow wells.

If you have concerns about your well water:


- 1. Have your water tested for nitrates.
- 2. If levels are unsafe, you may need to drill a deeper well or install a filtration system.

doing it."


"Well, I said, "She done good. It is very nice."






