


cool orange PFD), but not before awarding the Commodore's Trophy to Don and Lind Harman (a well deserved recognition, I might add!).





The Best of Beck's Bistro

Ginger Scented Grilled Tuna

1/2 cup aromatic peanut oil 3 Tlbs soy sauce

1 Tlbs toasted sesame oil 4 large garlic cloves, minced

I Tlb Dijon mustard I 1/2 tsp minced peeled

1 1/2 tsp minced peeled fresh ginger root

1/2 cup minced scallion, trimmed white part and 1 1/2 to 2 inches of the tender green.
6-8 tuna steaks

Cooking spray for grill

- 1. In a small bowl, combine the peanut oil, soy sauce, sesame oil, garlic, mustard, ginger, and scallions, and mix together thoroughly.
- 2. Gently rinse tuna steaks under cold water and pat dry. Choose a glass dish that is large enough to fit steaks in a single layer. Brush one side of steaks with some of marinade and place in dish with the marinade side down. Pour remaining marinade over

fish using a basting brush to cover fish well. Allow the fish to sit at room temperature for at least 10 minutes or cover well with plastic wrap and refrigerate no longer than 12 hours.

3. To grill: Before heating grill, brush it well with oil or spray with cooking spray. Heat grill or coals to hot and place tuna (with marinade left on) on hot grill. Cook tuna a total of 7 to 10 minutes per inch of thickness, turning once. When done, tuna will be beautifully seared on outside. For medium-rare, it should be a deeper red at very center. If desired, cook until light pink in center but avoid overcooking or fish will be dry.

or fish will be dry.

4. To broil: Preheat broiler until very hot.
Lay each steak (with marinade left on) on a cold broiler pan. Broil close to heat source turning once until crispy, and the fish flakes easily but is not at all dry, 4 to 5 minutes per side.

Makes 6 to 8 servings

Chicken Drumsticks Extraordinaire

1 cup lightly packed fresh basil leaves

1/2 cup broken pecans 1/4 cup olive oil

2 cloves garlic, minced 1/4 tsp salt

1/8 tsp pepper 8 meaty chicken drumsticks

- 1. In a blender container or small food processor bowl, combine all ingredients except the chicken. Cover and process till pureed, scraping down the sides of blender or food processor as needed.
- 2. Remove the skin from the chicken, if you like. Place the chicken on the rack of uncovered grill directly over medium coals. Brush with about half of the basil mixture. grill chicken, uncovered, for 35 to 45 minutes or till an instant read thermometer registers 180 when inserted in the center of the meat, turning once halfway through grilling time and brushing with the remaining basil mixture.

Stu's Star Stuff

While enjoying another ort lived,

romantic, albeit short lived, evening at the end of the pier, we were recently treated to the sight of the full moon peaking above the tree tops on the east side. The orange-ish glow was beautiful and inspired Kimberly Jane to ask, "Is that a Harvest Moon?"

"Actually, " I began, (uh oh), "the Harvest Moon won't be until next month." Certain she was dying to know more I continued. "Before the days of mechanized farming, when farmers had only a few days to gather an entire crop by hand, the light of a full Moon was a blessing. It extended the work-day well into the night, providing a few more precious hours for harvesting. So the full Moon - prime harvest of September season at high northern latitudes - was especially welcome. It was named the Harvest Moon." I took her silence to mean, "do go on.

"Each full Moon has its own name to denote its significance to that time of year. The full moon closest to the fall equinox was given the name Harvest Moon. The full Moon AFTER the Harvest Moon is the Hunter's Moon. October's full Moon was named the Hunter's Moon long ago, because with the crops harvested and safely stored for the winter, the ground was bare. That gave hunters a better look at game scampering across the fields. Hunters often took advantage of the full Moon to nab extra meat for post-harvest feasts.

vest feasts.

"You usually can count on the Hunter's Moon to appear orange or yellow as it rises—
the result of particles suspended in our atmosphere. It makes the Moon resemble a pumpkin - appropriate for that time of year.

"When the moon is full it's also a good time to experience the Moon Illusion — an optical illusion that makes the Moon look larger when it's near the horizon than when it's higher in the sky. Psychologists say it looks bigger because we can compare it to objects on the

ground. When it's higher, it stands alone." Turning to accept my praise I found that the reason for the silence was that I was alone. I headed for the couch.

Illusion or not, it's always nice to watch a full Moon as it pops above the eastern horizon.

It's just another part of a great show. And it's free. Enjoy the winter show. See you in the spring.

"Uh-when?


"Just a little while ago.'



During the past few weeks of this summer, a few residents have voiced concern about the scum or floating material on the lake at vari-

ous times recently

We feel confident in our evaluation of the situation. A microscopic examination of the material would reveal body insect parts. Mayflies appear at clean lakes and have a short life cycle. Their death is on the surface of the lake. It is usually greater than what the fish popularity surface of the take. It is usually greater than what the fish popularity can consume. The floating mass is rotting organic matter accompanied by decaying plant material on the surface. The floating mass is not associated with fecal coliform. Fecal coliform is associated with animal and human waste. Septic systems that were contributing bacteria and/or phosphorus to the lake were pinpointed and corrected.

The State of Michigan Water Quality standard for fecal coliform is 200 colonies.

In the State of Michigan Water Quanty standard for fecal coliform is 200 colonies per one hundred millimeter sample. If this
standard is exceeded the water is not suitable for swimming.
At Birch Lake, the water is clean. On August 26, 2002, a member
of the water quality committee collected surface water samples at different locations around the lake. Proper procedures were followed. The
sample was taken well away from the shore-and/or bottom, beneath the

surface of the water. The sampler submerged the sample bottle and moved the bottle away from him as he filled before lifting it out of the water. The samples were placed in a cooler and taken to Garrett Laboratories for fecal coliform testing.

On August 28, 2002 the results of the tests are as follows:

- middle north shore area: 2 fecal coliform per 100 millimeter middle south shore area: 11 fecal coliform per 100 millimeter
- middle east shore area: 2 fecal coliform per 100 millimeter middle west shore area: less than 2 fecal coliform per 100 millimeter

there is no rise in bacteria and there is no rise in phosphorus.

According to Don Winne, executive director Michigan Lake and Stream Associations and Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program tests, Birch Lake is Oligotrophic (top quality) based on lake phosphorus, Secchi disk, dissolved oxygen, chlorophyll a and the Aquatic Plant Survey. These are current findings of Birch Lake from 1999 through 2001 as evaluated by Ralph Bednarz, Howard Wandell and Niles Kevern, Michigan State University, Department of Environmental Quality.

Homeowners' Association News

The Constantine Public Schools is seeking a property tax increase of 7 mills payable for the next 27 years to finance school construction projects.

This possible tax increase would affect taxpayers on most of Birch Lake except for those on the west side who are in the Cassopolis School district.

Constantine School's proposal this time is for two construction projects totaling \$28,310,00. The first is for \$24,850,000 for building a new high school, converting the existing high school to a middle school, and for improvements to

There will be a vote on the proposed \$28,310,000 Constantine School construction projects and 7-mill, 27-year property tax increase at Mason Township Hall at the corner of Kessington and US-12.

the two elementary schools. The second is for \$3,460,000 for a new auditorium for the high school.

Both proposals will be submitted to the voters on Monday, September 23, 2002. The place for voters from Birch Lake to cast their ballots will be the Mason Township Hall, at the corner of Kessington Road and US-12. This is a change from the usual voting place, which was outside the Constantine School district boundaries. If approved by the voters, the proposals will result in a property tax increase estimated to be 7.00 mills (\$7.00 for each \$1,000 of taxable valuation).

Taxable value is theoretically 1/2 of market value. As an example of the impact of a 7 mill tax increase, a property with a mar-ket value of \$300,000 and taxable value of \$150,000 would pay an additional \$1,050 per year in property taxes, or \$28,350 over the 27 years of the millage increase (without factoring in the effect of increases in taxable valuation permitted under the law). Constantine Schools has previously sought tax increases for similar school construction projects on four occasions, but the voters rejected each of them.
