# The Great Labor Day Sandbar Stand


Commodore-in-waiting John Erhardt has declared Saturday, Sept. 4 as the date for the first annual Birch Lake Sandbar Stand.


Each year the Durham's spend part of their vacation time helping their children accomplish new things.

The family all agrees that the baby of the family, three year old Evan, wins the award for the


greatest accomplishment. Evan made several trips around the lake on the "flexiboard" during the week (photo on Page 1).




reached her goal of crossing in and out of the wake on her wakeboard. The






# The History Of a Dream Come True

hundred years ago, there was only one cabin on Birch Lake. A wealthy

Chicago businessman built it on the North Shore in 1902 and the cottage was named Silver Springs because it was Birch Lake's fresh water springs that made it the head lake for other lakes such as Shavehead and Baldwin lakes.

Eventually, the businessman went bankrupt and sold the cottage to a man named Mr. Thayer from Miles, MI for \$500 in 1918. (That would be a steal now, but back then it was expensive with wages under \$15 a week.) Every time Mr. Thayer would come to the lake, it would take him 12 hours in a horse and buggy to get here.

When Mr. Thayer passed away, his son, another Mr. Thayer, inherited the cottage. This Mr. Thayer had a son named Jim. Growing up, Jim liked to hunt and fish with his father when he visited the lake. When he was a boy, there were four cottages on the lake, all on the North Shore because much of the area surrounding the lake was swampy or had no roads leading to it.

When he was young, Jim developed a fascination with the Potawatomi Indians that camped between Birch and Shavehead Lake. They were peaceful Indians that grew their own food and lived in harmony with their environment. They were even accom-

modating to the white men who started to settle in their area. After a while of being friendly, the white men tried to take the Indian's land. They eventually succeeded, but not before the Indians went on the warpath and tried to defend their home.

As Jim grew older and learned more about the Indians, he appreciated them and wanted something to show his appreciation for the Indians and their way of life. He wanted a totem pole.

For years he wanted one. He thought about what kind of wood he would use, what kind of carvings it would have, and how tall it would be. It wasn't until the mid 1990's that he got his chance to have a totem pole of his own. He met a carver, Douglas Christie, who agreed to carve a totem pole for Jim if he could find the right log.

Jim had two kinds of wood in mind: Sycamore and Tulip Poplar. Both of them grew straight, had hard wood that wouldn't crack easily, and had very long trunks. However, it proved harder than you'd think to find the right tree. It took Jim three years to find the right tree. It was a Sycamore that grew straight and didn't have a branch for 38 feet.

Once it was cut down and sent to Doug's workshop, he stripped the bark and set it aside to dry. A year and a half later, it was dry and ready to be carved, and the wood had hardly cracked at all. Sadly, right before Jim's pole was to be carved, Doug, the carver, had a accident that broke both of his legs.

After nearly a year of healing, Doug was once again ready to carve Jim's pole, but because his accident was carving and height related, the 38-foot log had to be cut in half to be carved.

Doug carved a pole that started with an Indian at the top. This Indian was Shavehead, the chief of the Potawatomi, whose shaved head and bear claw necklace indicate that he is on the warpath.

Under Shavehead was carved an eagle holding a fish in its talons that has a seven-foot wingspan. Under the eagle were a sun, a beaver, a bear, and fire. The Potawatomi worshiped the sun and fire, and they hunted the abundant beaver and bears that once lived there.

From the back of the totem pole, a wolf howling at the moon was carved. The Indians also worshiped the moon and they coexisted with the wolves and other animals in the woods very well. On the right side, a picture of corn was carved and on the left, a design of leaves because the Potawatomi grew their own crops and respected every aspect of their environment.

It took Doug a year and a half to carve the wood. Next he coated the pole with four coats of a special oil to keep it from getting too dry and cracking. Then Doug painted his beautiful creation with several coats of special paint.

Once the oil was soaked in and the paint dry, it was time for the final step. The pole was coated with four layers of polyurethane to keep water from getting in and rotting the wood.

The pole was then brought to Jim's house and was erected on five square feet of cement, four metal rods, and an iron grate underneath to keep it in place. At last the two pieces of wood were joined together and tied with a rope it keep it in place. And the totem pole was finally done!

The totem pole now stood 20 feet high with a 38-inch base weighing in at 6.000 pounds. It had two numbers carved into each of its sides: 1821 and 2002. 1821 was the approximate time that the Potawatomi lived in this area and 2002 was the year that the pole was put in Jim Thayer's front yard. That front yard happens to be the same front yard of the same cottage that his grandfather bought all those years ago.

If you'd like to see the totem pole first had, it is on the North Shore on the path that is walked to go all the way around the lake (you can't miss it) and Jim probably wouldn't mind a few compliments on his life's dream come true.



Boat" MC. Welcome David! Please try to sail with us again when there is more wind to play in.





# Scorpions and Indians ...

handful of bright stars highlights the evening sky this weekend. Yelloworange Arcturus stands high in the sky (Remember, Arc to Arcturus?)...reddish Antares is low in the south...and the Summer Triangle is rising in the east.

These and other bright stars seem to form patterns in the sky. Antares, for example, is part of Scorpius, a hook-shaped pattern that resembles a scorpion. But most of the stars look like they're sprinkled across the sky at random. And according to one American Indian story, they really are.

The story comes from the Navajo, who live in the Four

Corners region of the southwest. There are several versions, but the basic outline is the same.

It begins with First Woman carefully placing the stars in the sky, creating beautiful patterns. But then Coyote, the trickster, comes along and offers to help. First Woman doesn't trust him, so she refuses. But Coyote persists, and finally convinces her to let him give it a try -- IF he promises to be patient.

Coyote behaves himself at first. He picks up the stars from a blanket and places them in the sky one at a time. But after a while, he can't resist the temptation. He picks up the blanket and shakes it vigorously, scattering stars across the entire sky. And so the night sky appears today — a few bright

stars forming patterns, and all the others sprinkled across the firmament at random, creating a beautiful but slightly chaotic blanket of stars.

Look for the different patterns. Check out the familiar - Big Dipper, Teapot, Scorpius. Also try for less familiar - Cygnus the Swan in the Summer Triangle, the Great Square of Pegasus and Bootes the Hunter. More on those later. Bundle up and enjoy the show. It's free you know.

# Off the page

The American Library Association sets aside a week in September to bring awareness about censorship. Banned Books Weeks is celebrated in libraries across America. While I think everyone censors or "selects" their own reading, listening and watching, as well as of their children concerns arise about an anonymous person censoring all of us. Below are just a few of the books that have been censored over time. I have included the reason of censorship as well as a brief summary of the book. The upside to censorship is that kids want to read these books to see what all of the fuss is about.

Ø Fahrenheit 451 (Bradbury) "Fahrenheit 451 is the temperature at which book paper catches fire and burns. After learning that books are a vital part of a culture he never knew, a book-burning official in a future fascist state clandestinely pursues reading until he is betrayed. This book "created too much individualism and independent thinking".

Ø <u>Diary of a Young Girl</u> (Frank) A thirteen-year-old Dutch-Jewish girl, Anne Frank, records her impressions

of the two years she and seven others spent hiding from the Nazis before they were discovered and taken to concentration camps. Censors found this book "sexually offensive" and "a real downer".

Ø <u>Bury My Heart At Wounded Knee</u> (Brown) The documented account of the systematic plunder of the American Indians during the second half of the nineteenth century. Banned because it was "slanted".

Ø Of Mice and Men (Steinbeck) Sustained by the hope of someday owning a farm of their own, two migrant laborers arrive to work on a ranch in central California. Profanity was the reason this book was challenged.

Ø I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings (Angelou) An autobiography covering the childhood of a woman who has been a professional dancer, actress, poet, journalist, and television producer. This book was censored because it was deemed "anti-white".



# Notice to all Birch Lake Property Owners:

Before a Discharge and Treatment Plant can be built for the proposed sewer system in Porter Township, a permit must be issued by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ). Regardless of what side of this issue you are on, I'm sure we are all concerned about the environmental concerns surrounding this giant undertaking. Consider that the aquifer will need to be lowered, affecting wells and indigenous animal and plant life, heavy construction equipment will be digging 20 feet down, construction runoff, etc. This is our opportunity to request a public hearing of our concerns before a permit is issued. It does not matter if you live here year-round or are a registered voter. If you are a property owner with environmental concerns about the sewer issue it is very important that you put those concerns on paper in the form of a letter and mail it before September 2, 2004 to: Mr. Sean Syts MDEQ PO Box 30273 Lansing, MI 48909 Request that he schedule a public hearing on the proposed Discharge and Treatment Plant to be built for the sewer system

in Porter Township, Cass County. Mr. Syts wants to hear from us on environmental concerns. Unfortunately, he is not interested in the monetary issues, so please avoid those in your letter to him. This may be your only chance to be heard. I encourage you to take action. If you need help composing a letter, please contact me.


All that remains is a financial issue. When the bonds were sold earlier this year, the covenants pledged the full faith and credit of both the Township and County.


IF the sewer plan were stopped by the County, ALL property owners in the Township would have to repay the millions spent to date and ongoing costs to retire the non-callable bonds.




