

Have A Safe and Fun Summer!

It's a bird! It's a plane! It's blooming dogwood!

America's woodlands soon will be carpeted with delicate bunchberry dogwood flowers - or maybe not so delicate.

A team of scientists has reported that the blossoms explode open in less than 0.5 milliseconds and with 800 times the acceleration experienced by astronauts - the fastest plant movement on record, making the snap of a Venus fly trap appear glacial by comparison.

Joan Edwards, professor of biology at Williams College in Massachusetts, and colleagues began their investigation into "Cornus canadensis" exploding flowers after a botanical excursion.

A student, Sarah Klionsky, stuck her nose near a bunch of flowers.

"Oh, something went poof!" Edwards recalled her saying. "I'd never known anything that poofed out of those flowers," said Edwards, whose study was published in the current issue of the journal Nature.

Edwards transported hundreds of still-closed flowers back to her lab, prudently avoiding the word "explosive" when explaining her cargo to airport security.

Attempts to film the flowers with a 1,000-framesper-second camera produced only blurred images because the motions were too fast. Clear images finally were obtained with a 10,000frames-per-second camera.

The four-petaled flower bursts open when a large pollinating insect lands on a trigger hair. When the petals unfurl, the pollen-bearing filaments inside spring straight, much like a medieval cata-

Birch Kid organizes awareness campaign


Katie Luecht, the daughter of Patty and Bill Luecht of Indianapolis and Birch Lake (east side) says she didn't think the teasing she heard one day about some special-needs students was appropriate, so she decided to do something about it.

With a younger brother who has autism, Luecht, a fifth-grader at Danville South Elementary School, has knowledge of the condition that her peers may not share. So she thought selling the multi-colored puzzle piece ribbon of autism awareness would be a beginning to her classmates' educations.

With the help of her family, the student council and her Girl Scout troop Luecht purchased the materials to make ribbon pins to be handed out with a card briefly explaining what autism is and what the ribbon represents.

Along with the ribbons and cards, Luecht's selling table and the halls in her school have posters about autism.

According to information from the Autism Society of America, autism is a complex developmental disability that affects an individual in the areas of social interaction and communication. The society said it is a spectrum disorder that affects each individual differently and to varying degrees of severity. And as many as 1.5 million children and adults in



America are thought to have autism today.

The puzzle pattern of the ribbon represents the complexity of autism and the different colors and shapes are meant to show the diversity of the disorder and the

people affected.

"We see a lot of the kids coming up and reading the posters," said Amy Linsmeyer, the school's life skills teacher. "So they're interested, so that's the best part."

And they seem to like the ribbons as well. At 50 cents a ribbon, the first day of sales brought in \$47.

Tina Carlton, school principal, said, "This is outstanding. She can't even keep up with the supply and demand. This is self-directed, composed by Katie."

Luecht has decided that all of the proceeds will go to Linsmeyer's special education class, where her fourth-grade brother John attends. Linsmeyer said the money will be used to buy more materials for the class.

With each ribbon a person buys, they get a paper puzzle piece they are to color. Those pieces will be cut out and put on the walls through the school.

Luecht says so far she has seen a slight improvement, and hasn't seen anyone being teased.





Swimmer's itch/What it is, does and how to prevent (and treat) the seasonal itch

The technical name for swimmer's itch is cercarial dermatitis. Swimmer's itch is a patchy red pinpoint skin rash associated with itching on the parts of the body that have been in the water. Swimmer's itch is usually not severe. After the initial transient itching it will disappear without treatment. The itching occurs within 48 hours and may last up to 7 days. Rarely, it can be severe if a large proportion of the body is affected. The major, although not the only, cause of swimmer's itch are trematode parasites of aquatic/migrating birds. The life cycles of these parasites involve snails as the first host and aquatic birds or some mammals as the final host.

The larval parasite called a "cercaria" is released by snails and causes dermatitis when it mistakenly penetrates a person's skin rather than

it rightful host, usually a duck.

Common lore is that this is caused by "duck fleas" in freshwater — this is incorrect. Trematode parasites cause the freshwater swimmer's itch.

At one time or other in the past 70 years, since it's major cause was first identified in Douglas Lake, Michigan, swimmer's itch has been reported in almost every country in the world.

Swimmer's itch occurs the water temperature reaches the appropriate level for snails to reproduce and grow rapidly, and when migrating aquatic birds infected with the parasite return from their winter habitats or domesticated aquatic birds return to full activity.

Specific diagnosis is difficult. There is no widely available blood test that gives specific indication that cercaria have caused the itching. The best confirmation of the cause is based on knowing from other people that swimmer's itch occurs in the place where one swam or entered the water.

Treatment may not be necessary when there are only a few itching spots. An antihistaminic or mild corticosteroid cream purchased over the counter in pharmacies can be beneficial. If the initial itching is severe, then scratching can cause abrasions and skin infections may develop. If the symptoms persist for longer than 3 days, a dermatologist should be seen. Prescription medications may help reduce the itching.

Here are some tips to prevent swimmer's itch:

- avoid swimming for long periods in shallow wateravoid swimming in
- areas where swimmer's itch is a problem and where there is an onshore wind
- towel off immediately after leaving the water may help reducing swim-

mer's itch caused by cercariae of some species that enter only as the water dries on the skin

- do not encourage birds to stay in your area by feeding them
- wavoid placing rip-rap on your shore. This provides an excellent surface for certain species of snails to attach their eggs. The higher the number of snails, the greater the chance for swimmer's itch.

Editor's Note: Although we haven't heard of any cases of swimmers' itch yet this year, it is inevitable. Even though we print this info every year, a lot of people remain oblivious ... be advised that the condition is relatively harmless (although quite a nuisance for a week or so), and the parasite that causes it almost always disappears in a couple of weeks.


Sewer Board. Two Birch Lake residents, Carl Klappauf and Herm Kruggel, have been appointed to the Sewer Board for the Porter Township Wastewater Collection and Treatment System.

Sewer Construction Status. For any who may not have read Bob King's article in the online Birch Barker which was emailed on April 21, 2005, here is a brief summary of the status of the sewer project based on information provided by Tom Duneau of Wightman Petrie. More information is available at the Wightman Petrie web site www.wightman-assoc.com and at Porter Township's web site www.portertownship.org. In addition, sewer contractors will be available to answer questions at a public meeting at the Porter Township Hall Saturday, June 4, at 9 a.m. (Michigan time).

- The sewer force main has been installed to Birch Lake.
- Lift stations are currently being installed around the lake.
- Installation of the gravity sewer lines around the lake is scheduled to begin in late Fall 2005. The installation of the gravity lines won't be completed until Spring 2006.
- \blacksquare Sewer hook ups will begin in Spring 2006 when the gravity lines have been installed.

The above schedule is tentative, as there are many variables that could change it.

Although sewer hook up will not begin until Spring of 2006, beware of contractors claiming to be approved by the Township or Sewer Board. The Township and the Sewer Board have not and will not approve any particular contractor. Contractors hired to perform sewer hook ups should be licensed and bonded.





Seven sisters' rattles

o many ancient North
American cultures, the rattlesnake was a powerful symbol of life and death: death, because its bite can be fatal, and life, because it periodically "renews" itself by shedding its skin. People tried to capture this power by using the skins or rattles in special ceremonies. And they honored the snake by placing it in the stars.

One example is the Pleiades star cluster. It stands high in the east around 9 or 10 p.m. The Pleiades looks like a tiny dipper of six moderately bright stars; in fact, it's often mistaken for the Little Dipper. It's actually easier to find by looking out of the corner of your eye, because it looks like a bright little "cloud" of light.

The Pleiades was especially important to the cultures of southern Mexico and Central America, because

its annual journey across the sky coincided with the growing season. Every 52 years, the Aztecs held a special ceremony in mid-November to celebrate its passage overhead at midnight—an event that marked a time of renewal for both heaven and Earth.

The Maya of the Yucatan revered the Pleiades as well. To them, the little star cluster represented the rattles of a rattlesnake. Mayan priests carried short sticks with rattles attached to them, and some Mayan art shows a god carrying a staff shaped like a rattler. The Pleiades may even have played a role in Mayan calendar cycles.

Earlier, we said that SIX stars outline the group's dipper shape, not seven. It's hard to say, then, why Greek mythology has the cluster as the SEVEN Sisters. Six members of the cluster clearly stand out. If you begin to look at fainter stars, several more pop into view -- not just one. So it's hard to envision the Pleiades as exactly SEVEN sisters.

One story says the seventh sister married a mortal, and her luster was dimmed as a result. But some have suggested that perhaps one of the stars appeared much brighter when the Pleiades were named.


Look for the rattles or the sisters high in the east in mid-evening, and passing overhead after midnight. Or just check out the back of a Subaru. Their logo is a representation of the Pleiades.

Either way enjoy the show. It's free.
