As of Tuesday, July 10th, we are still waiting for the State of Michigan to grant a permit to treat our Eurasian Milfoil. Once the permit is issued the herbicide treatment will begin in days.

Contributions are still being accepted for our Invasive Species budget. Thanks to everyone for their cooperation and patience.

The Birch Lake Yacht Club Board of Directors would like to clarify that our contract with Tony Groves and Progressive AE includes his initial survey of the lake, contacting the herbicide application company, assisting with the acquisition of the DEQ permit and a follow-up survey later in the season. The Board will then review the progress of control and recommend further actions for next year.


One Book, One Lake







I could go on all day listing the people that I could thank, but my sister-in-law already told me that she read War and Peace in college. So, I will finish with my immediate family:



Regular Season Scoring

SB- Safety Boat will be scored at End-of-Season as Committee Boat Service
DNS - (Did Not Sail) does not count for or against any sailor; however a minimum of 2/3 of total season races must be completed to qualify in class CB - Any sailor who volunteers to operate the Race Committee Boat and/or act as Starter will receive the point equivalent of a First Place finish for that

day and will be counted in final season totals DNF - (Did not Finish) will equal Last Place of Class minus 1 place (i.e. 5 boats race in class, DNF equals 6th place)

DQF - (Disqualified Foul/CB Ruling/Other) will equal Last Place of Class minus 1 place (i.e. 5 boats race in class, DNF equals 6th place)

GCDQ - (Gross Misconduct Disqualified) will count as zero points for that race or day (CB ruling)
Season points are determined using the Square 40 Scoring System (1st place equals 40 squared, 2nd place equals 39 squared, etc.)

Season place is determined by totalling season points and dividing by races completed. DNF does not count toward required season race minimum



Asteroids in our galaxy

t the dawn of the 19th century, Giuseppi Piazzi found what many thought was a major catch: an object orbiting the Sun between Mars and Jupiter. It was hailed as a new planet, and named Ceres, for a goddess of agriculture.

As it turned out, though, Piazzi's discovery wasn't a major planet, but a minor one -- the first asteroid. Astronomers have since discovered tens of thousands of objects in a wide band known as the asteroid belt.

The asteroids are left over from the formation of the planets. They might have come together to form a planet, but Jupiter's gravity kept pushing them apart.

Ceres is the largest of the bunch. It's a bit more than a quarter the diameter of the Moon, and it contains about a third of all the mass in the asteroid belt. That makes it a prime target for scientific study.

Gravity has shaped Ceres into a ball, like the planets. And it's given Ceres a layered structure, with the heaviest rock and metal sinking to the center, and lighter materials floating to the surface. Ceres probably has a thick layer of frozen water, plus a surface layer of frozen water, ammonia, and other ices.

Images from telescopes on the ground and in space reveal only a few features on Ceres -- a few bright and dark spots. They show that its surface is relatively smooth, and that its impact craters are likely to be wide and shallow.

Every now and then a celestial boulder as big as several city blocks will sneak up on Earth. Some will pass within 10 million miles behind our planet. And some have passed much closer: as little as two million miles away.

It turns out that our region of the solar system can seem uncomfortably crowded. So far, astronomers have discovered about 3,000 near-Earth asteroids big chunks of rock and metal that cross or come close to Earth's orbit around the Sun.

Astronomers want to know as much as they can about these objects - how big they are, what they're made of, and what their orbits are like. In part, that's because these objects can provide new insights into the formation and evolution of our solar system.

But there's a more pragmatic reason for studying near-Earth asteroids: About a quarter of them are at least one kilometer in diameter - big enough to cause widespread destruction if they hit our planet. In fact, impacts by large asteroids may have exterminated much of the life on Earth more than once.

Smaller asteroids have caused destruction on a smaller scale. One that


was perhaps a hundred yards in diameter exploded above Siberia a century ago, flattening hundreds of square miles of forest.

So far, none of the asteroids that astronomers have discovered and plotted pose an immediate threat. But a few have created some nervous moments. So get out there and enjoy the show while it lasts. You never know when it might end. But at least it's free.

In the meanwhile, Ima sent in these two yummy-sounding recipes for a hot day at the lake.

No Drip Ice Pops

"Made with plain yogurt and sugar-free gelatin, these are good for dieters too!"

8 ice pops

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 (3 ounce) package fruit flavored gelatin mix
- 1 banana
- 1 cup plain yogurt

DIRECTIONS

Combine boiling water and gelatin in a blender and pulse until gelatin is dissolved. Blend in banana until smooth, then blend in yogurt. Pour mixture into popsicle molds or small, plastic drinking cups and freeze until hard. (If using drinking cups, freeze until firm, insert popsicle sticks, then freeze completely.)

Penny's Smoothie

"Banana, blueberries and peaches blended with yogurt and fruit syrup. Use any flavor of syrup

to taste. (You can even use sugar free syrup) My kids like to freeze this for ice pops."

INGREDIENTS

1 banana

1/4 cup yogurt

2 tablespoons all fruit blueberry syrup

1/8 cup milk

DIRECTIONS

In a blender, combine banana, frozen blueberries, frozen peach slices, yogurt and syrup. Blend until smooth. add rice milk and blend to desired consistency. Pour into glasses and serve.
