approach, and the children scream and laugh noisily on the corner this morning awaiting their bus, I prepare to pass the torch and Captaincy to the new 2008 Fleet Captain, Bill Luecht. Congratulations and thanks to Bill for taking over my favorite job for the past two years. It has been a challenge, pleasure, frustration and honor to serve as Fleet Captain. I hope someday to be honored with the position of Fleet Captain again or perhaps to serve as Vice-Commodore and eventually Commodore. Thanks to all for everything and please help Bill with all things sailing as much as you have helped me and my Fleet Admiral, Erica and our Fleet Cabin Boy, Dominic.

We will be having a Couple's Regatta, tentatively set for the second Saturday in September at about 3 or 4 PM. This time and date gives couples a chance for something to do together on the much quieter weekend after Labor Day, better sailing winds and still great weather, and it is also close to a dinner time and maybe a glass of wine. Definitely the perfect finish to a perfect lake day.

While shut out of regular season sailing by Mother Nature once again, the Kids Regatta was great fun. Standings for regular season are the same as last week and we only have one more day, this Sunday, to finish the regular season, so every race counts this weekend! Back to the Kids Regatta, although I didn't have a kid aboard, I still had the best sail of my year. I guess the "kid" aboard was me! I was just out for the sake of the wind and sail, no other reason, and my two laps around the course were my personal sailing highlight of my year.

Although it is warm, and humid, or perhaps because of the wet, sticky weather, I start to think of the crisp winds of autumn, whispering and roaring in glorious waves of ambers, reds and gold flowing on the trees surrounding the lake. Fall is fast approaching and thoughts of college football, bonfires and a little nip of warm cider or an Irish coffee start to creep into my sailing dreams. In anticipation of the shortening days and growing, darkening nights, I thought I would include a little more sailing lore, that of the more eerie kind, for those that love a good story or two. So here is a story from my Navy days...

The Crew of the USS Constellation (1797), still on watch?

Three ships of the United States Navy have borne the name USS Constellation, in honor, according to the US Congress, of the "new constellation of stars" on the flag of the United States.

- I. The original Constellation, a 38-gun frigate, was the second ship to be commissioned in the United States Navy; the first US Navy vessel to put to sea; and the first US Navy vessel to engage, defeat, and capture an enemy vessel. Built in Baltimore at David Stoddards Shipyard in Canton, a hamlet just east of Fells Point, MD and launched on September 7, 1797, the Constellation set sail under the command of Captain Thomas Truxtun.
- II. The second Constellation was a sloop of war that served from 1855 to 1933, and is preserved as a National Historic Landmark in Baltimore, Maryland. From 1854 to 1991, the Navy maintained that the second ship was the same as the first; this resulted in considerable damage to the ship, especially when as a museum ship she was "restored" to her "former appearance" as a frigate.

III. The third Constellation (CV-64) was a Kitty Hawk-class steam turbine propelled aircraft carrier which served from 1961 to 2003. I served on this ship myself in various deployments in 1999 and 2001. "Old Connie" was a hideous, garbage heap of a ship when I was aboard, but the crew was a close-knit family of 4,300 and "the Boat" had a real feeling of home. The only "ghosts" onboard this ship were of sea bags full of dirty laundry from only God knows when! You knew what deck you were on by the smell alone.

It's the original Constellation though, my boat's grandmother, if you will that I'm talking about today... Sitting proudly at rest in Baltimore Harbor, the original USS Constellation emits an aura of peace of and security. Where once men died under the hail of grapeshot and thrashing blades, children now walk gleefully with their candy.

During her 175-year history, much blood has flowed over her wooden beams. So what or who, among the countless who have met death on her deck, was the ghostly apparition that was photographed in the fo'cstle in 1955? Lt. Cmdr. Allen Ross Brougham, USN, the man who snapped the photo, believes it is a captain returning to inspect his ship. To a Catholic priest and former Navy Lieutenant who came face to face with the ghost, it is an old salt, unwilling to leave the beloved sea.

Legends of ghosts and other strange occurrences have long been told about the United States Navy's first ship. But the first indication that they were more than the reminiscences of old sea dogs came at 8 bells (Midnight) on a cold December night in 1955. Commander Brougham had his camera set. Waiting patiently, he allegedly caught the ghost forever on film. At 11:59:47 P.M., to be exact, the Navy officer "detected a faint scent in the air-a certain something not unlike gunpowder." Then before him, he said, appeared a "phosphorescently glowing, translucent manifestation of a late Eighteenth Century or early Nineteenth Century sailor, complete with gold stripe trouser, cocked hat and sword." He barely had time to snap the shutter before the eerie figure vanished, he said.

There is also a famous story concerning the experience of a Catholic priest and also former US Navy Officer who visited the Constellation in 1964. When the priest arrived, there was no member of the Maryland Naval Militia to take him aboard for a tour. So, being familiar with ships, and very eager to explore, he went below by himself. While



wandering beneath the deck, he said, he was startled by an ancient chief petty officer dressed in the uniform of the time of the Constellation's glory, who happily volunteered information about history of the ship and the proper names for the equipment, even including a few personal stories about the ship. After thanking his guide, and well entertained by the period performance of the old chief, the priest went above deck where he met several of the regular tour guides. He congratulated them for having such a knowledgeable man as the one who led him around. The real guides were pale and horrified. "We have no one below," they protested. In haste, the guides and the priest rushed down the narrow stairway, but as the priest reached out for the old guide, he smiled sweetly and vanished into the air, leaving only a wispy scent of rum, gunpowder and tobacco.

There are many examples of ships in horror literature and ghost stories of the 19th and 20th century. Is there something naturally frightening about a ship? They can be creaky and strange. Perhaps it's the fact that once a ship sets sail, we are cut off from the rest of the humanity. We are dependent on a little floating world. We must stay with the ship in order to survive, for we can not survive very long in the water. And if we should discover something on board the ship, something inhuman or otherworldly, we can not

Stu's Star Stuff



Lunar eclipse coming

he other day my reader said to me,
"You know what we haven't had this
summer, Stu? A good old fashion
eclipse." I thought, that's right. So why
don't we have one? How about next week?

A total eclipse of the Moon will occur during the early morning of Tuesday, August 28. The event is widely visible from the United States and Canada as well as South America, the Pacific Ocean, western Asia and Australia.

An eclipse of the Moon can only take place at Full Moon, and only if the Moon passes through some portion of Earth's shadow. The shadow is actually composed of two cone-shaped parts, one nested inside the other. The outer shadow or penumbra is a zone where Earth blocks some, but not all, of the Sun's rays. In contrast, the inner shadow or umbra is a region where Earth blocks all direct sunlight from reaching the Moon.

If only part of the Moon passes through the umbra, a partial eclipse is seen. However, if the entire Moon passes through the umbral shadow, as it will on Tuesday, then a total eclipse of the Moon occurs.

A total lunar eclipse is a beautiful event. The Moon slowly enters Earth's long shadow, so it looks like there's a progressively bigger "bite" missing from it until it almost disappears. As the Moon slides deeper and deeper into the shadow the Moon's disk can take on a dramatically colorful appearance, from bright orange to blood red to dark brown and (rarely) very dark gray.

Both lunar and solar eclipses have made big splashes over the centuries. Many cultures thought of them as omens of bad fortune, or signs of displeasure by the gods. Eclipses have even stopped wars. And knowledge of an impending eclipse saved one famous explorer and his men.

Christopher Columbus was on his fourth expedition to the New World when he and his crew were stranded on Jamaica. They survived by trading with the natives for food. But when the Spaniards mistreated some of the locals, they cut off the supplies.

Columbus knew there would be a total lunar eclipse on the night of February 29th, 1504. He told tribal leaders that his God was angry with them, and would take away the Moon. When the eclipse began, the leaders begged him to restore the Moon. He promised to do so -- if he and his men received the supplies they needed. The leaders agreed, the eclipse ended, and Columbus and his crew survived until they were res-

cued a few months later.

This part of the show doesn't happen very often, so be sure to check it out. It begins around 4:51am here at the lake and ends a little after 8:00am. And best of all, it's free.

5 SUPERSTAR SPICES

Ground cayenne adds heat and a slightly smoky aroma. The cayenne chile is one of the hotter chile peppers available, thanks to a hefty dose of capsaicin. This compound, which gives all chile peppers their heat, may boost metabolism slightly.

Coriander is a seed of the cilantro plant, and its smoky citrus flavor is indispensable to Indian Cuisine. It's used whole, coarsely crushed, or ground. Because it complements other spices so well, it finds its way into many Indiana seasoning blends.

Cumin seeds have an aromatic, peppery flavor popular in many cuisines, including Mexican and Southwest American. They're also said to help with digestion, so some natives of these areas chew a few whole seeds after a meal.

Mustard seeds are pungent, slightly bitter, and tiny. Most recipes call for very little (little dab will do ya). Mustard seeds stimulate blood flow and helps to improve circulation and warm the skin, easing painful muscles and sore joints. As a stimulant, it helps to improve digestion and metabolize fat.

Ground turmeric adds a distinctive yellow hue and musky flavor. A member of the ginger family, turmeric has antibacterial properties and also contains a compound called curcumin, which has been shown to destroy breast cancer cells in laboratory studies

RECIPES

INDIAN EGGPLANT - BHURTHA

"This is a traditional North Indian (Punjabi) Bhurtha made with eggplant and tomato, and seasoned with cumin, turmeric garlic and ginger."

4 servings

INGREDIENTS

■ 1 eggplant

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin seeds
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 teaspoon chopped fresh ginger
- 1 large tomato peeled, seeded and diced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon ground coriander
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, or to taste
- **■** ground black pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat the oven's broiler. Rub oil on the outside of the egg plant, or coat with cooking spray. Place under the broiler, and cook until the flesh is soft and the skin is blistering off, about 30 minutes. Turn as needed for even cooking. Cut the eggplant in half lengthwise, and scoop the flesh out of the skin. Discard the skin; chop up the flesh, and set aside.
- 2. Heat the oil in a large skillet or wok over medium-high heat. Add the cumin seeds, and let them crackle for a few seconds and turn golden brown. Be careful not to burn them. Add the onion, ginger and garlic; cook and stir until tender. I don't let the onions get very brown. Stir in the tomato, and season with turmeric, ground cumin, ground coriander, cayenne pepper, salt and black pepper. Cook and stir for a few minutes.
- 3. Place the eggplant pieces in the skillet, and cook for 10 to 15 minutes so some of the moisture evaporates. Taste, and adjust seasonings if desired. Garnish with fresh cilantro, and serve.

Variation

You can also add peas to this dish. Stir in 1/2 cup of frozen peas when you are simmering the tomatoes.

ICED TEA III

"Cool, refreshing, and abundant summer drink. Serve in a tall glass over ice."

16 (8 ounce) servings

INGREDIENTS

- 6 black tea bags
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 gallon boiling water
- 1 (6 ounce) can frozen lemonade concentrate DIRECTIONS
- 1. Place the tea bags and sugar into a 1 gallon glass jar. Fill with boiling water. Let steep for 2 hours at room temperature. Remove and discard tea bags. Stir in lemonade concentrate. Refrigerate until cool.



Water Clarity is a measure of water quality related to the chemical and physical properties of Birch Lake. As phosphorus from fertilizers enter the lake, more algae are produced and Water Clarity decreases. Call Bob 476-2773 or Dave 476-1001 for "O" phosphorus fertilizer if needed.

The annual means can be compared to evaluate changes or trends in the trophic status of the lake. The mean, or average, is simply the sum of the measurements divided by the number of measurements taken weekly (with a Secchi disk) from May until the last week in September.

Viable data below is an indication of a high water quality index at Birch Lake from 1999 to 2006 Results of the 2007 Water Clarity measurement will be reported to you when received from the DEQ in 2008.


