COMMODORE'S COMMENTS (CONTINUED)

Commissioner, Bruce Campbell, related how last September's record rain events had combined with the long winter and rainy spring to leave standing water in places that 60-year residents had not seen previously. Many, if not all, bodies of water in the county are very high.

Coincidentally, a few days prior I had called this same gentleman and Mr. Louis Csokasy, the new manager of our County Road Commission trying to get some information on the new Lake Harvey (across Harvey Rd., just east of Robbin's Lake Rd). Prior to this phe-

nomenon, I had thought all lakes were only getting older, usually shrinking in size and that no new ones were created without an ice age, volcano, or other cataclysmic event. Shows what I know!

After my phone interviews I can report to you that:

- Both public officials were responsive and informative.
- They both attributed the lake's formation to the same factors discussed in the newspaper article.
- Neither would predict exactly when the waters might recede from the Harvey Rd. pavement.
- The warmer, drier weather and the releafing of the trees, which then absorb more ground water, should accelerate the

process.

■ There are no natural or easily man made outlets for either of the two now combined ponds

Most interesting though was the response to my query of why the dirt piles were placed on both sides of the water encroachment, backing up the road closed signs. Were they really needed? The Road Commission decided to do so in response to all those that drove past the "road closed" signs, ventured into the water, and then saw fit to call the Road Commission and complain after their vehicles stalled out.

It's almost time. Mark your calendars. The doors of the Yacht Club will be opened to all lakers for the first time this season for the Commodore's Party. We may be still lacking a definitive theme, but wasn't the wildly successful Seinfeld show about nothing? (Please call with your suggestions.) 

Let's get out there and sail

he wind was blowing, the water was smooth, but there was only one lonely sailboat out on the water Memorial Day weekend. I don't know where the rest of you sailors were (probably trying to remember where you put the rudder last fall) but at least I had a chance to get out there for a couple of hours. Now, if I could only remember what all those ropes and pulleys in the bottom of the boat are supposed to do...

This is the plan for this year:

- •Regular season races will be every Sunday from May 31 to August 31, except for regattas on the 4th of July and Labor Day weekends. (We have an extra week this year, since memorial Day was early and Labor Day is late. Maybe we'll do something different with the extra week...)
- •Races will start at 11:00 a.m. (if the wind has picked up by then, otherwise we will push it back to 12:00 Noon). Hopefully, Harold Cranmer will agree to set the marks prior to the races again this year. If the races are canceled for the day I will try to contact everyone by phone.
- •The course that we sail will be the same as last year -- a triangle course with windward finish for Sunfish (4 legs) and a triangle-windward-leeward course with windward finish for MCs (6 legs).

For MCs, the starting gate will be closed for legs 4 and 5. See diagram below.


- •The 5-minute warning for MCs will be the 10-minute warning for Sunfish. The starting signal for MCs will be the 5-minute warning for Sunfish.
- •The penalty for a foul will be a 360° turn, when clear of other boats, in the same leg of the race where the foul was committed.
- •For the regular season races, scoring will be the square of 40 system, as before (1st place gets $40 \times 40 = 1600$ points, 2nd place $39 \times 39 = 1521$, etc.). Adjustments will be made for serving on the committee boat and number of races completed.
- •The rules that we follow for the races are as published by US Sailing and ISAF (see http://www.ussailing.org/rules/). There a couple of new rules this year. The one that will matter most to is Rule 18 which governs the amount of room we must give other boats when rounding the marks, and the size of the "zone" around the mark (now three boat lengths).

The first race of the season will be this Sunday, May 31, at 11:00 a.m., weather permitting. New sailors are always welcome. (Old sailors are welcome, too. This is an equal opportunity fleet.)

Committee Boat volunteers needed: As of the Barker deadline, I still need to find someone to start the race this weekend. If anyone is interested, please let me know. 476-2615. Otherwise I might be calling you. My darling wife Patty has been signing people up for Committee Boat duty for the rest of the summer. Please see below. There are still slots available if you want to start one of the races. It's a good excuse for spending some time on the water while claiming to do something worthwhile. Contact Patty at 476-2615.

Another house favorite — Ham Roulette



Hope all ate well over the fabulous Memorial weekend. What great weather for family, friends, food and fun.

Here is another house favorite:
The ingredients in this recipe have long shelf life's except for the ham. I buy the ham in thick slices for rolling. I put a

piece of wax paper between the slices and put it into the freezer. When I want to make this I just pull out what I need separate the ham and it thaws quickly.

Ham Roulette

- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 4 sour pickles, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard

Chopped chives (I buy the dried in the spice isle)

5 slices deli ham, not too thin

In a small bowl, mix together the cream cheese, pickles, mustard, and chives.

Spoon 1/5 of the mixture onto each ham slice, then roll ham slices up carefully. Wrap each roll in aluminum foil, and refrigerate for 2 hours minimum.

When you are ready to serve, unwrap the ham roulettes, and slice. Serve chilled.

Stu's Star Stuff



Morning Star, Evening Star ...

he planet Saturn is a delicate giant. Although it is the second largest planet in the solar system, it's the least dense -- less dense than water. Chemical compounds in its upper atmosphere color its cloud bands in subtle shades of ivory, yellow, and tan. And broad, lacy rings encircle Saturn, making it the most beautiful planet in the solar system.

Like its larger sibling, Jupiter, Saturn is a ball of hydrogen and helium gas wrapped around a dense, rocky core. Saturn spins so fast that it bulges outward at the equator, so the planet is much thicker at the equator than through the poles.

Saturn's clouds are colored in subtle shades of yellow and tan, and contain ammonia, methane, and other toxic compounds. They are buffeted by winds of up to 1,000 miles, and they contain violent storm systems that produce lightning blasts a million times more powerful than those on Earth.

Saturn's most prominent feature, though, is its extensive ring system. Galileo discovered the rings in the early 17th century. In his small, crude telescope, though, they looked like "bumps"


on the side of the planet. Five decades later, Dutch astronomer Christaan Huygens, who had recently discovered Saturn's largest moon, Titan, detected a bit of space between Saturn and the bumps. He deduced that the bumps were really planet-circling rings.

Today, astronomers know that thousands of individual rings make up Saturn's ring system. Some rings are made of small bits of frozen water, others contain tiny grains of dust, and still others are a mixture of the two. In all, the rings are only a few hundred feet thick. Several small moons orbit inside or just outside the ring system. These "shepherd" satellites help keep the ring particles in place, but they also sculpt some rings into odd shapes, with twists and kinks.

Saturn's rings probably formed when a small moon or a comet passed close to Saturn and was pulled apart by the planet's gravity.

Look for Saturn to the upper left of the moon this evening at nightfall and tomorrow to the upper right. Saturn looks like a bright golden star. It spends the first eight months of the year in Leo, the lion, then moves into the neighboring constellation Virgo, the virgin. It disappears behind the Sun in late August, then returns to view in the morning sky in October.

The show's still exciting, and a good bargain for only a dollar. See you there. - Stu Spratt

INVASIVE SPECIES

PURPLE LOOSESTRIFE:

The Birch Lake Water Quality Committee started the Purple Loosestrife Management Program in 2000. The program has been a great success. In 2000 we had 10 sites on all shores of Birch Lake. Some of which were very dense. We continue to monitor for Purple Loosestrife each year and remove the plants that we find. Typically we find two or three sites per year. This occurs in July and August when the plant blooms. If you see the plant or suspect a plant might be Purple Loosestrife, please call a Water Quality member to check it out.

What is it?

Purple loosestrife is a plant that was accidentally introduced in to the United States and then distributed as an ornamental. It is most easily identified during its flowering period from July to September. This spike shaped "purple" flower can be seen in ditches, streams, rivers, lakes, wetlands, and other moist, shallow water sites. This plant is an upright, hardy perennial, four to eight feet tall and most often found in a group.

Effects:

Purple loosestrife invades marshes, ditches and lakeshores, quickly replacing cattails and other native wetland plants. These plants form dense stands that ducks, geese, muskrats and frogs cannot use for food or cover.

Spread:

Purple loosestrife will grow from the roots of an established plant, however, the plants spread mainly by seed. Having up to 300,000 per stalk, these tiny seeds can live in the soil and water for many years and can be transported great distances by humans, animals and water. The seeds can be transported to other wetland areas via the mud on birds and ducks feet, in the fur of muskrat, mink and beaver, or on the shells of turtles. Humans can also unknowingly transport the seeds via the mud on their shoes, boots, waders and clothing.

EURASIAN MILFOIL:

We were part of a Michigan Lake & Stream program that mapped the aquatic plants in Birch Lake. Howard Wandell provided professional assistance to the Birch Lake Water Quality Committee. The mapping project revealed that Birch Lake had a moderate plant population consisting of a good variety of species none of which dominated. At that time the survey determined that we did not have Eurasian Milfoil. In 2007 Eurasian milfoil was discovered at three sites. Progressive AE provided professional assistance and is still

under retainer. Professional Lake Management treated the sites in 2007 and 2008. May 18th, 2009 Progressive AE surveyed the lake for invasive aquatic plants and inspected the Eurasian milfoil sites. It looks as though they will treat two of the sites again this year although we have not received the official report. We already have the permits and notification has gone out to the possible homeowners sites that are affected. Progressive AE also took several samples of suspected Hybrid milfoil for DNA testing. The Hybrid is still under investigation. Any negative effects have not yet been determined.

Growth characteristics:

Eurasian milfoil is an aggressive, tall-growing exotic aquatic plant from Europe and Asia. It is capable of growing to the surface in 12 to 15 feet of water. At the surface, it forms a dense canopy of vegetation over other plants. Many native plants may be reduced in abundance by the Eurasian milfoil canopy. Consequently, this plant can form dense colonies covering much of a lake's littoral zone. Being an exotic, it has few natural biological control agents, so it can dominate a like for many years. A few biological control agents have been found. Some lakes have seen significant declines in Eurasian milfoil after 10 to 20 years. Control of other aquatic plants reduces competition and appears to allow Eurasian milfoil to maintain a greater coverage for a long period.

Habitat

Eurasian milfoil may be found throughout the littoral zone, out to a depth of 20 feet.

Nuisance traits:

Its tall growth pattern conflicts with many recreational activities. In dense conditions, it is a serious localized and lake wide problem. It is not a significant food crop for waterfowl, other birds or aquatic mammals. It readily regenerates from detached fragments and spreads rapidly.



Each week we will feature one or more informational pieces dealing with boating, lake living and safety for our Birch Lake neighbors.



Boating Regulations and Safety

PFDs (life jackets)

According to Michigan Law, all boats are required to have at lease one personal flotation device (PFD, life jacket) for each person on board.

In addition, the following apply:

- The pfds must be type I, II or III
- The pfds must must be USCG approved
 - The pfds must be wearable
- The pfds must be of the proper size for each person on board (based on body

weight and chest size

- Michigan's PFD law permits a vessel less than 16 feet long (or a canoe or kayak) to choose to have either a wearable PFD (Type I, II or III) or a throwable PFD (Type IV) for each person on board.
- In addition to these regulations, Michigan law requires that one Type IV USCG-approved PFD must be on board boats 16 feet long or longer, and it must be readily accessible.
 - Michigan law also requires that all

children under 6 years of age must WEAR a USCG-approved Type I or II PFD when riding on the open deck of any boat.

- Any person riding, driving or being towed behind a Personal Watercraft (PWC, Jet Ski) must WEAR a USCG-approved Type I, II or III PFD (inflatable PFDs are not allowed on PWCs).
- All PFDs have to be in good, functional condition and must be readily accessible

PFD types and uses



Type I Offshore Life Jackets are used for rough or remote waters where rescue may be difficult or time consuming. They provide the most flotation and will keep the face of an unconscious person out of the water.

Type II Near-shore vests are good close to shore in calm waters when a quick rescue is likely. A Type II vest may not turn the face of an unconscious person up out of the water.





Type III Flotation Aids or fullsleeved jackets are also good for calm waters where quick rescue is likely, but are not good for rough waters since they will not turn the face of an unconscious person up out of the water.

Type IV Ring buoys and throwable cushions are not designed to be worn, but rather to be thrown to a person who can hold onto it until help

Type V devices like vests, deck suits and hybrid PFDs are used for special activities like kayaking, windsurfing or water skiing.

Boat Safety Check Planned

The Homeowner's Association is awaiting a date from the Cass County Sheriff's Dept.'s Marine Division for a Boat Safety Check on Birch Lake (watch future Barkers for the date and time).

The inspectors will be look for the following items:

- 1. Boat Numbers
- 2. Registration/Documentation
- 3. PFDs
- 4. Fire extinguisher
- 5. Ventilation
- 6. Backfire flame arrester
- 7. Sound signaling device (horn)
- 8. Navigation lights
- 9. Overall boat condition
