



We then had a strategic planning session, a board meeting, and an excellent dinner prepared by Miss Peggy. It was a fun afternoon and a great opportunity for the board to put their heads together and plan for some upcoming Camp and Camp Fire events. Speaking of Camp events, we are planning to host a Hog Roast up at camp on Saturday, August 1st. We're hoping this will be a fun way to get people together and just hang out at camp to enjoy some great food and drink. Thank you again to everyone who has helped out with getting camp ready for this summer - we really appreciate all the assistance from everyone around the lake!



ate on clear summer nights a long stream of stars stretches from north to south across the sky. When Sagittarius, aka the Tea Pot is visible the stream could be imagined to be steam coming from the spout. This stream is actually an edge-on look into our Milky Way galaxy. So just how big is it?

On a scale of 1 to 10, our galaxy is about a 6 or 7. The 1's would be dwarf galaxies, some of which actually orbit the Milky Way. The 10's are giant spirals and elliptical galaxies that form the cores of super-clusters of galaxies. Our galaxy contains at least 200 billion stars. The dwarf galaxies contain millions of stars, and the giant spirals and ellipticals contain upwards of a trillion stars.

The luminous material of the Milky Way stretches about 100,000 light-years across, with our Sun situated about 27,000 light-years from the center. Astronomers are limited to seeing whatever glows in space, but they think a large chunk of the Milky Way may be invisible, and as yet unmeasurable. Our galaxy actually could be much bigger.

Sources differ, but the number of galaxies in the universe could be as "few" as 10 billion or as many as 100 billion. Recent discoveries of extremely faint dwarf galaxies, including one right next to the Milky Way, and the remarkable number of older galaxies detected in the Hubble Deep Field photos would seem to favor the larger of the two estimates.

The Milky Way is the second-largest galaxy in what astronomers call the Local Group. The slightly larger Andromeda Galaxy and many smaller elliptical and irregular galaxies also populate the group, which spans about 6.5 million light-years. The Andromeda Galaxy is the most-distant object that's readily visible to the unaided eye -- about two and a half million light-years away. But don't try looking for it just yet. Besides it being little more than a fuzzy smudge of light it won't be readily visible until autumn.

But there are many other wonders to behold in the night sky. Especially in the un-light-polluted skies over Birch Lake. So pays your money and takes your chances. Enjoy *-Stu Spratt*

# **Water Quality Committee Report**

**Blue-Green Algae - Later on this** summer, probably about the July 4th weekend, we will have a discussion on blue-green algae, i.e. what they are, what they look like, and any issues related to this bacteria that behaves like an algae and is normally associated with high nutrient (especially phosphorous) lakes. Last summer we had one small documented isolated bloom so we want folks to know what to look for. Blooms would be an unusual occurrence in our low phosphorous lake.

Secchi Disk readings - For those who have been here every weekend, you may have noticed that the water has lost some of the great transparency we saw earlier in the spring. This is validated by the Secchi Disk readings as seen below.

3/21 (26"), 4/9 (25'), 4/26 (35'), 5/15 (36'), 5/19 (27'), 5/26 (21'), and 5/31 (14')

We will produce a graph that will be

added to weekly to illustrate the weekly transparency changes. Why the large drop over just a couple of weeks? More sun, warmer weather, massive insect hatches, lots of tree pollen in the lake. Thus a possible early algae bloom. Gordon and Terry will be doing a side by side testing with Ralph Bednarz of the DEQ on June 15 for chlorophyll (indicator of algae) and dissolved oxygen. We will show Ralph the current data trends and obtain his thoughts, and pass them right on to you.

Lake Stratification - We are doing the dissolved oxygen this year. This involves passing a oxygen and temperature probe through the water column in the deep part of the lake and taking measurements every 2.5 or 5 feet depending on depth. In a shallow lake you would not expect to see much difference in temperature or amount of dissolved oxygen from top to bottom. This is because wave action etc permits mixing of the total water columy. In deep takes like ours, you will see a definite thermocline develop indicating the depth where mixing stops. We are seeing this happen now in the 15-20 foot range where the temperature drops rapidly. On May 31, the temperature was relatively constant from the surface to 15 feet, then a 16 degree drop

down to 30 feet. From the 30 foot level to 88 feet it only dropped by another 7 degrees. So effectively from below thirty feet, there will be no additional oxygen from the surface mixing into this water. The ability to keep oxygen in this lower level of nonmixed water is a index of lake productivity, 1.c. migration from oligotrophic to mesotrophic. We will follow this over the course of the summer and provide some hopefully clear graphs to demonstrate how our lake is doing, and what it means.

**E coli** -- Terry did a little more spot sampling to screen a couple of places on the lake this past week. He took two sets of duplicate samples from about 2 foot of water by the public park on the south side and about 30 feet south of the stream inlet in the northeast corner. One set of duplicate were from his kayak and the second set of duplicates were after getting out of the kayak and stomping around 1 bit. There was only one sample from the public park that had a single colony. Due to the sensitivity of the assay, this would be a E coli count equivalent to 20 per 10 ml in 1 of 8 samples. If you want an area checked, live Terry a call and be will do a screen.



# Lake Living and Safety Operating a PWC safely

Lake Living and Safety is a new Barker feature being provided by the Birch Lake Yacht Club's Homeowner's Association and Safety Committee.

Each week we will feature one or more informational pieces dealing with boating, lake living and safety for our Birch Lake neighbors.

This week we are looking at the safety issues regarding operating a personal watercraft. Please make sure you help keep your family, friends, neighbors and visitors safe on our waters.

#### **PWCs and you**

Although a personal watercraft (PWC) is considered an inboard vessel and comes under the same rules and requirements of any other vessel, there are specific considerations for the PWC operator.

#### **Steering and Stopping a PWC**

■ PWCs are propelled by drawing water into a pump and then forcing it out under pressure through a steering nozzle at the back of the unit. This "jet" of pressurized water is directed by the steering control-when the steering control is turned, the steering nozzle turns in the same direction.

For example, if the steering control



is turned right, the nozzle turns right and the jet of water pushes the back of the vessel to the left, which causes the PWC to turn right.

Remember-no power means no steering control ... You always must have power in order to maintain control. If you allow the engine to return to idle or shut off during operation, you lose all steering control. The PWC will continue in the direction it was headed before the engine was shut off, no matter which way the steering control is turned. ■ A PWC has no brakes. Always allow plenty of room for stopping. Just because you release the throttle or shut off the

engine does not mean you will stop immediately.

#### **Ignition Safety Switches**

■ Most PWCs and powerboats come equipped by the manufacturer with an important device called an emergency ignition safety switch. This is a safety device that is designed to shut off the engine if the operator is thrown from the proper operating position .

■ A lanyard is attached to the safety switch and the operator's wrist or PFD. The safety switch shuts off the engine if the operator falls off the PWC or out of the powerboat. If your vessel does not come equipped with an ignition safety switch, you should have one installed. ■ It is illegal to ride your PWC without attaching the lanyard properly between the switch and yourself

#### **Reboarding a Capsized PWC**

After a fall, the PWC could be overturned completely. You should be familiar with the proper procedure to right the PWC and to reboard from the rear of the craft.

■ Most manufacturers have placed a decal at the rear or bottom of the craft

that indicates the direction to roll your PWC to return it to an upright position. If no decal exists, check your owner's manual or ask the dealer. If you roll it over the wrong way, you could damage your Pwc.

■ Practice reboarding with someone else around to make sure you can handle it alone. Don't ride your PWC if you are very tired because reboarding would be difficult. Also, avoid riding where there are strong currents or winds, which could hamper your reboarding efforts.


