



Difference of solstice and equinox

hat is the difference between a solstice and an equinox? Four days during our calendar year—two solstices and two equinoxes—mark the beginnings of the four seasons. At the extremes are the winter and summer solstices, with the vernal and autumnal equinoxes occupying the midpoints. The solstices and equinoxes also mark four important points in Earth's orbit around the Sun. It's Earth's position in its orbit—and the orientation of its tilted axis at these points in its orbit—that defines the seasons.

The solstices are six months apart and mark the days when the northern and southern hemispheres receive either maximum (summer) or minimum (winter) sunshine. In the north, the summer solstice, tomorrow, is the longest day of the year; the winter solstice, six months later, is the shortest day of the year. The two equinoxes occur roughly midway between the solstices: the autumnal equinox in September and spring equinox in March. At these times, day and night are roughly of equal length.

The times of the solstices and equinoxes were important to ancient agrarian (meaning agricultural or farming) cultures, since these observations warned of changing weather conditions. For instance, the spring equinox signals the beginning of warmer weather.

The full Moon that we saw two weeks ago is known as the Flower Moon, Rose Moon, or Strawberry Moon. But another good name might be the Short Moon, because it's on display for less time than any other full Moon of the year — only about eight or nine hours from most of the Lower 48 states.

Keep in mind that the full Moon does just the opposite of what the Sun does in our sky.

As we've mentioned, the summer solstice marks the longest days of the year, so the Sun remains above the horizon for a long time — 14 or 15 hours for most of the country. It also appears farthest north for the year, so it sails highest across the sky.

But the Moon does just the opposite. Since the days are long, the nights are short. As a result, the full Moon is in view for only a few hours. And since the Sun climbs high in the sky, the Moon remains fairly low. It's still well above the horizon, but not as high as during the winter months, when it sails overhead.

Those at more southerly latitudes will see the most moonlight — around nine

hours. But those in Montana, Minnesota, or other northerly states will see the Moon for less than eight hours. And from Anchorage, Alaska, the Moon will barely hang around long enough for a cup of coffee — it'll set less than three hours after it rises. Get your dollar out and come enjoy the show. I'll be around to collect. It isn't free anymore.

Gordon and Terry spent the morning of June 15th on the lake with Ralph Bednarz from the DEQ, doing a variety of side by side tests. The purpose of the side-by-sides is to validate the accuracy of the testing by us lake volunteers so that the accumulated data from all the tests at all the lakes can have real meaning.

For this session, we did Secchi Disk readings, chlorophyll measurements, and dissolved oxygen and temperature measurements from the top of the lake to the bottom in the 95 foot area.

Ralph did the same sampling and thus a basis for comparison with what Gordon and Terry obtained.

In addition Ralph took samples for total phosphorous and nitrogen, i.e. a measurement of the available nutrients. We should have the laboratory values back in about a month or so regarding chlorophyll and the nutrients.

In another article we will detail the dissolved oxygen and temperature measurements, put in graphs, and try to explain what they might be telling us. Ralph believes this data is a great indicator of the developing productivity and thus aging of a lake. But it needs to be captured over a period of years and weather cycles so we can look at patterns.

Although a chart (secchi disk readings) is probably not necessary for those of you who have been here weekly since early spring, both by actual measurement and visualization, the lake has become less transparent over the past few weeks. Recently it was down to 13 feet, but today it seems to be recovering a bit and was measured at a bit more than 16 feet.

nwill be very interesting to see the chlorophyll data from today to see if increased concentrations of algae are the reason for the turbidity. That is probably part of the reason since with increased water temperatures and more sunlight, you would expect to get some algae bloom, but limited


due to nutrient levels.


We asked Ralph about this today and he indicated that some of the drop in transparency might be due to marl precipitation in the water with an increased temperature. Our lake is in part a marl lake, in which calcive precipitates from the water coming in from springs that contains dissolved limestone. With the loss of acid from the incoming water and the temperature change, you car get microscopic particulate material that eventually sinks to the bottom, but can make the water more cloudy than expected based on algae levels.

Additionally, with an early spring algae blocm (phytoplankton), you can then have an increase in the little bitty animals that eat the algae, i.e. zooplankton, further decreasing the ransparency at least for awhile.

When we receive the nutrient and chlorophyll levels later this summer, we will provide that lata with some interpretation regarding transparency changes.

Lake Living and Safety

Unlawful and dangerous

Lake Living and Safety is a new Barker feature being provided by the Birch Lake Yacht Club's Homeowner's Association and Safety Committee.

Each week we will feature one or more informational pieces dealing with boating, lake living and safety for our Birch Lake neighbors.

This week we are looking at additional safety issues regarding operating a personal watercraft (jet skis). Please make sure you help keep your family, friends, neighbors and visitors safe on our waters.

On the water:

Unlawful and Dangerous Operation Michigan law designates these dangerous operating practices as illegal:

- · Reckless Operation of a vessel or reckless manipulation of water skis, a surfboard, or similar device is defined as operation which disregards the safety or rights of others or endangers the person or property of others. Some examples are:
- · Weaving your vessel through congested waterway traffic or swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision
- Jumping the wake of another vessel unnecessarily close to the other vessel or when visibility around the other vessel



is restricted

- · Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with your vessel
- \cdot Causing damage from the wake of your vessel
- Failure to Regulate Speed is operating a vessel at speeds that may cause danger to life or property of any other

person or at speeds that will not permit you to bring your vessel to a safe stop. It is illegal to operate a vessel:

- · In excess of 55 mph
- · At greater than "slow, no wake speed" when a person is in the bow of a

Lake Living and Safety

vessel without proper seating

· Faster than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions (weather, vessel traffic, etc.)

Improper Distance is operating at greater than "slow, no wake speed" (except in channels that are not posted) and or operating such that the vessel or persons being towed are within 100 feet of:

- · A shoreline (if operating in water less than 3 feet deep)
- · Any moored or anchored vessel
- · A dock or raft
- · Any marked swimming area or per-

son(s) in the water

"Slow, No Wake Speed"

The slowest speed at which it is still possible to maintain steering and which does not create a wake

- Improper Distance for PWCs means that, if operating at greater than "slowno wake speed," PWCs also must:
- Stay at least 200 feet from any Great Lakes shoreline.
- · Not cross within 150 feet behind another vessel other than another Pwc.
- · Improper Direction is defined as the failure to operate in a counter-clockwise

direction except in areas marked by well-defined channels or rivers.

- · Boating in Restricted Areas is defined as operating within a restricted area clearly marked by buoys, beacons, diver-down flags, etc.
- · Riding on the Bow is illegal if the vessel is not equipped with bow seating and the vessel is operating at greater than "slow, no wake speed." Persons also are not allowed to ride on the gunwale. While underway, persons on a vessel may not sit, stand, or walk on any portion of a vessel not designed for that purpose.






