

amp has officially started for the season! This week was Holidaze Week at Camp Tannadoonah, and we kicked off the summer with a big group - 88 campers! It's always so much fun when camp is nearly full. More kids = More fun! Plus this week the weather has been quite warm, which makes the waterfront activities much more enjoyable.

We're still just slightly ahead of last year's numbers on this date. We have a total of 367 registered, compared to 358 on this date last year. Two years ago on this date just 300 campers had signed up, and we finished the summer with only 351. So we're way ahead of that pace!

Since it was Holidaze Week, we celebrated a different holiday each day. The dining hall got decorated, Miss Peggy made holiday foods to fit the theme, and evening activity was also related to the theme on most nights.

Sunday we celebrated Valentine's Day; Monday was St. Patrick's Day; Tuesday was Easter; Wednesday was the Fourth of July; Thursday was Halloween; Friday was Thanksgiving; and Saturday was Christmas. Tuesday we had Easter Eggs, Ham and Cheesy Potatoes, and evening activity was a giant Easter Egg Hunt. Wednesday we had a picnic on the



lawn and played Capture the Flag. Thursday we went Trick-or-Treating, Friday we had Thanksgiving Dinner, and Saturday morning we woke up to Christmas Music instead of Reveille.

Starting this year, we are required to check every camper before they can stay at camp, and this first week we underestimated how much time that would take, and we didn't have enough people to help. If you'd like to join us for dinner at camp on a Friday evening, please let me know and we will reserve a space for you. It's always fun to see the campers and experience a real camp dinner.



Stu's Star Stuff



How the constellations got their names

ost constellation names are Latin in origin, dating from the Roman empire, but their meanings often originated in the distant past of human civilization. Scorpius, for instance, was given its name from the Latin word for scorpion, but ancient Egyptian hieroglyphs from before 3000 B.C. refer to the star group as "Ip," the scorpion king. Orion, the hunter, bears a Greek name, but had been seen as a hunter-hero figure since the times of ancient Babylon.

Of course, many of the constellation names are more modern -- Telescopium, the telescope, being a rather obvious newcomer, along with Stanislovski, the Sloth and RFK1700, the Imaginary Clock. All can be seen flying high overhead on any weekend night regardless of clouds. But in fact, by the 19th century the night sky had become crowded with overlapping and often contradictory constellation boundaries and names as different schools of astronomy prepared their own versions of star maps. To clear up the confusion, names and boundaries were "officially"

assigned to 88 constellations by the International Astronomical Union in 1930, providing complete coverage of the entire sky. Two of the above mentioned may not have been included.

The names of the days of the week also have some interesting backgrounds. They relate to several of the astronomical objects we see each day/night in the sky. **Sunday** - Sun - (God's Day) - Dimanche, Domingo

Monday - Moon - (Luna) - Lundi, Lunes Tuesday - Tiw - Mars - Mardi, Martes Wednesday - Woden - Mercury -Mercredi, Miercoles

Thursday - Thor - Jupiter (Jove) - Jeudi, Jueves

Friday - Freya - Venus - Vendredi, Viernes


Saturday - Saturn - (Sabbath) - Samedi Sabado

Look for Saturn, which looks like a golden star, to the upper right of the Moon this evening. Regulus is to their lower right. Regulus is the brightest star in Leo, the lion. To find Leo, imagine a leak in the bottom of the big dipper. It

would drip onto Leo's back.

Water Quality Committee Report

In this space each week, we usually try to describe various issues related to Birch Lake water Quality.

A lot of this is in regards to the testing that has been ongoing for the past many years and then often relating the results of the tests to classifications about lakes.

Thus we have and will talk about the nutrients such as phosphorous and nitrogen, chlorophyll as a measure of algal growth and thus a reflection of the nutrient load and productivity of the lake, and dissolved oxygen and stratification of the lake.

As you look at the results collectively you can measure against some established criteria to say we are an oligotrophic lake etc.

We have always taken great solace by saying that we are in that oligotrophic classification and thus better than others.



However, the classifications are really a measure of the normal aging process of inland bodies of water.

All lakes will age, and with change bring additional characteristics that some may like and others may not.

The real key is rate of change and how much impact we (humans) with all our activities bring to this rate of change.

In order to lend some perspective to this, we would like to actively encourage you to look at a couple of write-ups that are on the Michigan Lakes and Streams website.

The first gives a great relatively

short analysis of the classification system, the fact that things are a continuum, and what this continuum means in terms of the things we like to do on the lake.


The second is a great discussion on this whole business of the mixing and stratification of lakes, how it happens, why it happens. This will provide a great backdrop for our future discussions regarding the dissolved oxygen and temperature measurements we will be doing this summer.

When we put the graphs together and publish those we will remind you of this website. If you cannot find the ten minutes to look at these items, have your kids or grandkids do it and tell you all about it.

Skiers and operators

Lake Living and Safety is a new Barker feature being provided by the Birch Lake Yacht Club's Homeowner's Association and Safety Committee.

Each week we will feature one or more informational pieces dealing with boating, lake living and safety for our Birch Lake neighbors.


This week we are looking at additional safety issues regarding operating a personal watercraft (jet skis). Please make sure you help keep your family, friends, neighbors and visitors safe on our waters.

Requirements for Towing Skiers

■ Every vessel towing a person(s) on water skis,

a surfboard, or a similar device must have a person, in addition to the vessel operator, observing the towed person(s) at all times.

- It is illegal to tow persons on water skis, surfboards, or any device of this type between:
- One hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise if towed behind a boat
- One hour before sunset and 8:00 a.m. if towed behind a PWC
- Persons being towed must stay at least 100 feet away from:
- Any moored or anchored vessel
- A dock or raft



- Any marked swimming area or person(s) in the water
- Those being towed behind a PWC must wear a U.S.

Coast Guard-approved Type I, II, or III PFD. Inflatable PFDs may not be used.

Who May Operate a Boat

Those less than 12 years of age:

- May operate a boat powered by a motor of no more than 6 horsepower (hp) legally without restrictions.
- May operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 6 hp but no more than 35 hp legally only if they are directly supervised on board by a person at least 16 years of age.
- May not operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 35 hp legally under any conditions.

Those 12 to 15 years of age:

- May operate a boat powered by a motor of no more than 6 hp legally without restrictions.
- May operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 6 hp legally only if they:
- Have passed a boating safety course approved by the Department of

Lake Living and Safety

Natural Resources and have on board their boating safety certificate

■ Are accompanied on board by a person at least 16 years of age.

Those 16 years of age or older may operate any boat on the waters of Michigan.

Who May Operate a Personal Watercraft (PWC)

Those less than 12 years of age:

■ No one under the age of 12 years may operate a PWC legally.

Those 12 and 13 years of age may operate a PWC legally only if.

- He or she obtained a boating safety certificate prior to January 1,1999, or
- All of the following conditions are satisfied:
- The operator is accompanied solely by his or her parent or legal guardian and
- Both the operator and the parent or legal guardian have obtained a boating safety certificate and ...
- The PWC is equipped with a lanyard-type ignition safety switch and

the parent or legal guardian has the lanyard attached to his or her person, clothing, or PFD and ...

■ The PWC is designed to carry at least two persons.

Those 14 years of age or older:

■ A person born after December 31, 1978, may operate a PWC legally only if he or she has obtained a boating safety certificate.

Those born on December 31, 1978, or earlier may operate a PWC legally without restrictions.


