from May through September your
Birch Lake Yacht Club Board of Directors
meets at the Yacht Club to conduct the regular business of the Yacht Club. All members and guests are welcome to attend.
The meetings only last about an hour.

So as not to conflict with the July 4th weekend, the July meeting was moved forward to last Saturday, 6/27/09. A number of worthy subjects were discussed:

- The minutes of the previous meeting, prepared and distributed by Sandy Vitale, were accepted as read.
- Holly Troeger reported the Club's budget is in the black, and through 6/26/09 we had 117 paid members.
- Thanks to the efforts of Fred Friehofer, with Artie assisting, we have one more

storage/shelving system and one less dead tree at the Yacht Club.

- Mike Lutz agreed to remove an old broken down air conditioner from the premises.
- Bob Waddle will acquire and install, at least on a trial basis, some sound deadening material on the ceiling of the Yacht Club.
- Rick Russworm and Terry Dugan gave reports on water quality. The Water Quality Committee remains active and moving forward. The Eurasion Millfoil treatment was quite successful. Recent informal ecoli testing continues to indicate some concern in the stream flowing into the lake on the northeast side by the Klappaufs (which the committee is pursuing) but no traces have been detected any where else on the lake. A suggestion that weed treatment areas be marked (perhaps by orange buoys), was received positively.

- Rick advised that the Porter Township is still negotiating towards the favorable outcome of providing the best reasonable ambulance service for our area.
- Bob and Sandy Baucus have placed order forms for the scented candles fundraiser in area mailboxes. 16 sets of coasters have been sold. (Both will be on sale at the pancake breakfast).
- Publisher Phil Vitale advised ad sale collections have already exceeded the annual cost of printing the Barker.
- Times for July 4th weekend activities are as follows:

4:00 pm Sat., July 4th - Boat Parade starts at Bender's (south side) Dock. (Committee is chaired by Carla Chester & Ilene Golden).

Dusk pm Sat., July 4th - Fireworks begin (to be shot off from Camp Tannadoonah). (Jim Bolinger spearheads this activity).

8:00 am Sun., July 5th - Pancake Breakfast at Camp Tannadoonah (Linda Harman is the head Pancake Planner).

- During the early morning of Wednesday, July 24th someone had the audacity to steal the outboard motor off of Sue & Pat Williams' row boat on the south side. Please report any strange activities and secure your belongings.
- Steve Quinlan pointed out that the relatively high lake water levels increase the chances of large wakes damaging adjacent private property (i.e. docks, shorelines, etc.). Scott Troeger suggested those causing such damage are civilly liable to the

victims. We ask that all boaters try to be considerate of others where and when they create large wakes. Residents who see boats operating inappropriately and/or doing damage could try to get a tape of the boat with its registration numbers and forward it on to the Sheriff's Dept., Marine Division. They can, and often do, contract the boat's owners. If a call is made while the infraction is taking place, the Marine Division might actually come out and witness the activity for themselves and take corrective action.

- I learned that for buoys marking swimming areas to have any legal effect, they must be registered and, at present, the only swimming buoys on the lake that are registered are those put out by Camp T.
- Karen Brovold recently found an insulin syringe along one of the shorelines. We would all be well served to keep an eye out for dangerous foreign objects.

I risked boring you with all this tedium for 2 reasons: maybe you wanted to know or were interested and once again, we have established there are a lot of good people doing a lot of good work, donating a lot of their time, for your benefit on a regular basis. Don't they deserve your support? Thanks!

Subsequent to Saturday's meeting and before this column went to press, Holly advised of 14 more membership dues being received. Thanks to all who have done their duty. We hope to have your stickers in place by the time you get this Barker. This puts us at 131 to date. While that is a respectable number, for which I

am grateful to all who have contributed, it's not nearly high enough. Each week we distribute close to 225 Barkers. Wouldn't it be grand if 80% of that number, say 180 households, would show their support of each other and our common goals by sending in their check for a meager \$25.00. Isn't \$25.00 / year the best annual property maintenance / improvement investment anybody here can make? Don't we want to show the outside world that we are all in this together?

The number 180 has some other magic to it also. I have been told the Diamond Lake Homeowners Association, with 3 to 4 times as many residents, (all with much deeper pockets than ours no doubt) is pleased with its annual membership of 175 or so. We already know our body of water is larger than theirs, our lake more beautiful and, our people more fun. Shouldn't we exceed them in all other worthwhile measurable goals as well? Checks for dues and other contributions will be accepted at the Pancake Breakfast.

I know Sunday was a little tough on sailors and others who might have liked to use the water more. But wasn't it a magnificent day and overall a magnificent weekend?

We look forward to seeing you at all the July 4th weekend festivities. In the meantime, together let us all enjoy and protect the miraculous healing waters of Birch Lake.

Bull Dandy

A bull is as tough as a walking brick with a volcanic brain. I can say without reservation, a bull should not be trusted. As a veterinarian, this was confirmed many times by tales of herdsmen narrowly escaping serious injury or death from their angry herd bull, an animal they had raised from a docile calf surprised them by becoming a huge hulk with devastating horns and temper.

My own personal encounter with a friend-turned-foe occurred one

afternoon near the town of Shipshewana, IN in 1955. The area north of Shipshewana is sandy and ideal for the pasturing of beef cattle. It was with a Hereford bull named Dandy that my experience occurred.

Dandy was a tame bull and never gave me any trouble when I worked with him as the herd veterinarian. He always stood still for blood testing and medication.

After making several morning calls, one of which was a placental removal, I was called to Dandy's farm to see some of the cows. The farmer, his young farm hand and I walked out into a large grassy pasture to see some of the beef stock that were suffering from foot rot.

Foot rot is a condition of cattle that cracks and infects the foot into the deep layers around the hoof. It is quite painful and causes the affected animal to limp with pain.

There were several cows in pretty bad shape. As we wandered around the field here and there checking each animal, Dandy became interested in what we were doing. His movements were of curiosity and we gave very little thought that his harmless shuffle would be any more than that.

We spent an hour counting and singling out the ones for treatment and started to walk back to the fence encompassing the pasture. Dandy followed close behind. We suspected he wanted an extra portion of grain at the barn.

Dandy seemed especially curious about me, getting close enough to sniff my outstretched hand. I scratched his curly forehead and shooed him off. We continued walking toward the fence gate. I turned again to see Dandy dogging our footsteps with much more interest. This time his large eyes had a different glint. When I shooed him off, he bounced away stiff-leggedly and lowered his head while pawing the earth and throwing clods of dirt and turf over his back.

It was obvious his tone had changed rapidly from a placid pussy cat to the staunch guardian of the herd. He took on the appearance of "a Piece of the Rock." It dawned on me in a flash that the object of his attention was ME. I was carrying the odor from the previous call.

He wanted to eliminate his rival. He hooked his horn in my direction and braced himself for a charge. I had hoped the owner and the farm hand would stay with me as our combined presence might deter a possible attack.

I yelled, "OK boys, don't run, don't run." The request had hardly passed my lips when they broke and

ran ... with me following close behind.

I could hear the ta-boom ta-boom of heavy feet behind me. I dared not look back for fear of losing precious time in my flight to put something between me and my determined pursuer. I ran toward the fence gate, but I sensed it was too far and I knew Dandy would get me before I reached it.

Over to the right was a calf creep. A calf creep is a low-roofed portable feeding structure. The stalls are just large enough for the calves to crawl in and out. The adult animals cannot fit.

I made for it, boot buckles awhippin'. I didn't have time to think of the consequences, but I knew Dandy was gaining on me.

I reached the calf creep and with a mighty leap I belly-whopped onto the slightly inclined roof and spun around to see Dandy puffing his sweet acetone breath in my face. I could feel the mucous mist on my skin. I scurried to the other side of the roof, planning to jump down, make it to the fence, and be done with the pursuit.

Dandy knew what I was up to and met me on the other side. We eyed each other for a short time each fully aware of who had the upper hand, and what we had on our minds – fight for him and flight for me. I was hoping he might soon give up and forget his distaste for me, but regrettably his burning anger would not be cooled. Maybe a plan of luring him away would let me escape.

One of the others who had reached the fence to safety, ventured out to distract Dandy but he would have no dissuasion from his quarry and paid no attention.

Maybe a little cow chop (ground grain)might make him forget. It was worth a try.

Sure enough, he went for the grain offered by the owner. Surely he would forget me now.

I made a fake attempt to get off the calf creep but Dandy returned to the spot below me. And dared me to come down.

Another attempt was made to lure him further away and he did leave only to return. "Let's try again," was my next

This time the grain was offered even further away. Never did he take his attention away from me. His dilated eye seemed to track me like a radar antenna.

He was far enough away now – I could make my move. I jumped off the roof and ran as fast as I could. I was practically flying as I vaulted the top of the fence and flipped over

on the other side.

Dandy and I were eyeball to eyeball.

Dandy knew me from then on. Whenever I went to his farm, he would bellow as soon as I got out of my car. We were never close after that incident. We were mortal enemies, you might say.







UBoat Commander's Corner 🔈 🎉

DNS — Did Not Sink!

A three hour tour ... a three hour tour. The weather started getting rough the tiny ship was tossed ...

When you see a sailing score of DNS, it stands for did not start. DNF indicates the contestant did not finish. Though I may have been scored DNF, I am issuing a public appeal to alter my result for last weekends 1st race to DNS ... did not sink. I should add that during the extended episode I re-crossed the start line making considerable sternway (so, performed an undo of sorts).

Maybe it was a little aggressive to shakedown my just launched MC in the "fresh" air (not). Maybe I sailed with too little humility / too much hubris (nah / well maybe). Sailing is partly about living on the edge and ... s*** happens. I flipped (and flipped, and flipped again) despite best efforts of no less than five boats lending aid, so, was unable to resume racing. I did have ample opportunity to survey the bottom of my MC and dagger boards.

Learnings: though an MC can be righted by one person, once it swamps and fills with water it loses all form stability and is as happy to roll back over as stay upright. Neil Troeger wrapped a PFD around the masthead which reduced angst re: turtling the boat. The decision to abandon efforts to right the boat should have been done earlier, in favor towing to shore and working in the shallows.

Think noodles. In addition to a few aging foam blocks, I have bundles of noodles to add buoyancy. Why? Because the MC (and all scows for that matter) comes from the builder with inadequate flotation. Yes Virginia ... they can sink! The MC Class scantlings suggest every boat should add foam. Sadly, the Class org site is down at present, so I can't provide the number of cubic feet recommended. More is better.





I recall when Dennis Conner, Mr. America's Cup, had just launched USA-77 in southern California. This was their race boat for the Cup in Auckland, NZL, 2003. With sponsors and media alongside, to celebrate the launching, 77 blew a rudder gasket and went to the bottom. When ribbed about his new boat sinking, the unflappable DC replied that technically it was a swamping and

grounding since 10-12' of the mast remained above water. Note to self: add flotation.

I'd like to list all those who came to my aid ... but, it's actually hard to remember everyone ... and a few of you fellows I'd never met ... and, I promised Editor Phil to keep this brief enough so he wouldn't have to publish it in chapters. Thank you all for helping me save my boat. The Cap'n is sposed to go down with the ship and ... well, let's not go there. Did I mention about added flotation?

Last: I'll be back out there ... sailing on the edge, first opportunity. Hopefully I won't do a repeat performance, but, ya never know. All tow boats be advised: I will take the weight penalty (as if it matters, at my size) and will keep a tow line onboard for your convenience.

The skinny on the Red Planet, Mars

very summer many of us receive e-mails concerning a close encounter with the planet Mars.

Some snippets include:

"The Red Planet is about to be spectacular."

"Earth is catching up with Mars for the closest approach between the two planets in recorded history."

"On August 27th Mars will look as large as the full moon."

And finally, "NO ONE ALIVE TODAY WILL EVER SEE THIS AGAIN."

Some things never go out of style, and this "Mars Spectacular" message may be one of them. It's yet another example of a widely circulated e-mail containing information that was once true but which continues to be forwarded around year after year, long after the information it contains has become outdated.

Mars did make an extraordinarily close approach to Earth several years ago, culminating on August 27, 2003, when the red planet came within 35 million miles of Earth, its nearest approach to us in almost 60,000 years. At that time, Mars appeared approximately 6 times larger and 85 times brighter in the sky than it ordinarily does. (The earlier message quoted above was often reproduced with an unfortunate line break, leaving

some readers with the mistaken impression that Mars would "look as large as the full moon," without realizing that the statement only applied to those viewing Mars through a telescope with 75-power magnification.)

Although Mars' proximity to Earth in 2003 was a rare occurrence, the red planet comes almost as near to us every 15 to 17 years. To the unaided observer, Mars' appearance in August 2003 wasn't significantly larger or brighter than it is during those much more common intervals of closeness. During our last several trips around the sun we've passed by Mars a couple other times, but not quite as close. Our next close encounter will not be until January when the distance will be about 61 million miles.

Disappointed? Don't be. If Mars did come close enough to rival the Moon, its gravity would alter Earth's orbit and raise terrible tides. Not only that but Mars' inhabitants might get ideas about coming to Birch Lake.

Look for Mars (and Venus too) in the east at first light. Venus is the "morning star," so it shines fiercely through the brightening twilight. Mars is next to Venus. It's only about one percent as bright, but its orange color helps it stand out.

Venus is dropping toward the Sun, but it will remain in view until around Thanksgiving.

Mars is heading in the other direction -- it's climbing away from the Sun. So it'll rise earlier and grow brighter throughout the summer and fall. Mars will put on its best showing late this year and into January.

Enjoy the show. There's a holiday special on this week, so it's free.

Safe Swimming

With the big holiday coming up and the weather being sunny and warm, we will all want to be spending a lot of time in the water.

As we have talked about earlier, we want to assure folks that the waters of Birch Lake are safe for swimming and lounging around in, especially due to some concerns that arose, but that defined testing did not validate last year.

Thus, we have been doing some random sampling for E coli this year and reporting the results in the Barker, with nothing thus far remotely approaching levels for concern.

Remember, that for a single time sample, people are to stay out of the water if levels are at the 230-250 colony forming units per 100 ml of water sampled.

The highest in the lake, and found at only a single site this spring was 20 per 100 ml.

Thus in anticipation of the holidays, on June 26, 10 sites around the lake were sampled with duplicate samples taken at each site.

The testing equipment uses the Micrology Labs Coliscan EasyGel system in which 5 ml of sample is mixed with a defined gel/nutrient material, poured onto a sterile petri dish, and incubated at 95 degrees farenheit for 24 hours. There are dye agents that turn blue in the presence of E coli and magenta in the presence of non E coli



coliforms.

Since we are not using the full 100 ml of sample, the sensitivity of the system will only show E coli if it is present at 20 or more colony forming units per 100 ml.

Since this is less than 1/10th of the safety level, this is considered a reliable screen for potential problems. Nine of the sampling sites were from the lake proper, and as shown in the diagram below, E coli was undetectable in the

duplicates from each sampling site.

This means that E coli levels were less than 20 colony forming units per 100 ml at each of these sites.


The samples from the stream taken between the road and the lake (site 5), showed over 300 colony forming units in one sample and over 600 in the other. This confirms observations from last year that the stream had E coli in it, but was shown not to be human after genetic testing.

Of interest, one of the lake sampling sites was adjacent to a pier very close to the stream. E coli was undetectable at this site.

Thus, the dilution factor etc. from the water coming into the lake from the stream obviated whatever bacteria was washing into the lake.

At a recent Yacht Club Board meeting we discussed this and decided to evaluate the stream further regarding its watershed and potential sources of the E coli, albeit non human. It should be



remembered that measurable E coli will come from the fecal material of all warm blooded animals inclusive of birds and mammals, i.e. ducks, geese, gulls, dogs, deer, etc.

Additionally, and as a reminder, the presence of E coli does not mean that any illness inducing pathogen is in the water.

E coli levels are indicators. The higher the E coli level, the higher the probability that there might be something else as well.




Eurasian Milfoil Update

Last week Progressive AE conducted a follow up aquatic plant survey. They surveyed the entire lake for invasive species and inspected the areas that were treated for eurasian milfoil. They were pleased with the results other than two small areas by the boat landing. They will consult with Professional Lake Management to determine what or if something should be done at this time.

Progressive AE will be back out at the end of July to survey again.

During the first survey Progressive AE took samples of milfoil that was suspected of being a hybrid. As of yet we do not have the results. The first step is to do DNA testing to determine if it is native milfoil, if it is not it is sent for further DNA testing. We probably will not have the results until the end of summer.

Beware the dreaded Duck Itch!

Swimmer's itch (or Duck Itch) is a patchy red skin rash associated with itching on the parts of the body that have been in the water. Swimmer's itch is usually not severe. After the initial itching it will disappear without treatment. The itching occurs within 48 hours and may last up to 7 days. Rarely, it can be severe if a large proportion of the body is affected.

The cause of swimmer's itch is the trematode parasites of aquatic/migrating birds. The life cycles of these parasites involve snails as the first host and aquatic birds or some mammals as the final host. A larval parasite called a "cercaria" is released by snails and causes dermatitis when it mistakenly penetrates a person's skin rather than it rightful host, usually a duck. Swimmer's itch occurs in both freshwater and in the marine coastal environments.


Common lore is that this is caused by "duck fleas."
This is not correct.
Trematode parasites cause swimmer's itch. In unusual

circumstances, different algae, chemical pollutants and sewage may cause dermatitis that is indistinguishable from cercarial dermatitis, so it is important, when visiting the pharmacist or physician, to mention that the itching may have been acquired by swimming or bathing.

Treatment options include washing immediately in salt water, acetic acid (vinegar), methyl alcohol or dilute (1:10) household ammonia. Benadryl spray helps to reduce itch and pain, and may kill the nematocysts. It is a self-limited eruption that rarely persists beyond 10-14 days.

At one time or other in the past 70 years, since it's major cause was first identified in Douglas Lake, Michigan, it has been reported in almost every country in the world.

Swimmer's itch occurs when several factors converge at the optimal time. In summer, 1) the water temperature reaches the appropriate level for snails to reproduce



and grow rapidly, 2) migrating aquatic birds infected with the trematode parasite return from their winter habitats or domesticated aquatic birds return to full activity and 3) the frequency of swimmers and bathers reaches its peak during this period. Over the past ten years, the temperatures of the freshwater bodies in temperate zones have increased and migrating aquatic bird populations have generally increased, creating a greater risk of swimmer's itch.

There is no widely available blood test that gives specific indication that cercaria have caused the itching. The best confirmation of the cause is based on knowing from other people that swimmer's itch occurs in the place where one swam or entered the water.

Treatment may not be

necessary when there are only a few itching spots. An antihistaminic or mild corticosteroid cream purchased over the counter in pharmacies can be beneficial. If the initial itching is severe, scratching can cause abrasions and skin infections may develop. If the symptoms persist longer than 3 days, a dermatologist should be seen. Prescription medications may help reduce the itching.

Swimmer's itch is caused by many factors. Since the disease is really a disease of aquatic birds, efforts to eliminate swimmer's itch should focus on reducing the possibilities of birds getting infected. In lakes, snails that harbor the parasite can be killed by chemicals, but the possible environmental effects of the chemical mean that this approach cannot be recommended. A newer approach has been to place a drug for treatment of the parasite into food bait. Indirectly, it is important that the vegetation in the lake be kept to a minimum so snails do not have a good environment to grow.






the cove. Following the passing of Linda's Dad in 1999, they purchased his property and began construction in 2005 on his lot.


