Needless to say this 4th of July weekend was priceless for one Kyle Kinzler and just further added to his growing legacy on Birch Lake.



Fruit Pizza "Fun" INGREDIENTS

- \cdot 1/2 cup butter, softened
- \cdot 3/4 cup white sugar
- · 1 egg
- \cdot 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- \cdot 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- \cdot 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- \cdot 1/4 teaspoon salt
- · 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese
- · 1/2 cup white sugar

· 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).

2. In a large bowl, cream together the butter and 3/4 cup sugar until

smooth. Mix in egg. combine the flour, cream of tartar, baking soda and salt; stir into the creamed



mixture until just blended. Pressdough into an ungreased pizza pan.3. Bake in preheated oven for 8 to10 minutes, or until lightly browned.Cool.

4. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese with 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla until light. Spread on cooled crust.

5. Arrange desired fruit on top of filling, and chill. Fun!

The second brightest object in the sky

ot long ago we talked about the brightest object in the sky, the Sun. This week it's the second brightest object in the sky ... the Moon.

Earth's partner in its yearly trek around the Sun, the Moon, is geologically dead. Dried lava fields called "maria" --Latin for seas -- cover its surface, along with impact craters. The maria formed about four billion years ago, when giant asteroids punched holes in the Moon's crust, allowing molten rock to bubble to the surface, where it cooled and hardened.

Earth and the Moon are more like a double planet than a planet and a moon. The Moon is quite large in comparison to Earth -- about one-quarter of Earth's diameter. The two gravitationally interact with each other, most famously causing Earth's ocean tides.

The interaction has other important consequences. Over time, the Moon's rotation has become tidally locked, so that the same side of the Moon always faces Earth. And the Moon acts to stabilize a "wobble" in Earth's axis. (We've talked about that before.) Over billions of years, this has led to a much more stable climate, which was friendly to the evolution of life. The Earth-Moon interaction also slows Earth's rotation by about two milliseconds per day per century.

The Moon probably formed in a "big whack." The theory arose after scientists analyzed the rocks brought to Earth by Apollo astronauts and Soviet Luna probes, as well as the readings of seismometers left on the lunar surface to record "moonquakes."

Their studies showed that the Moon's composition closely resembles that of Earth's crust and mantle. From this, scientists concluded that a Mars-sized body hit Earth within a few million years of its formation. The impact vaporized much of the material in Earth's crust and mantle and blasted them into space, forming a ring around the planet. This material quickly coalesced to form the Moon -- Earth's steady companion in its neverending trek around the Sun.

The Moon, Venus, Mars, and Aldebaran stage a beautiful show next weekend. The Moon is above the others on the morning of the 17th, beside Mars on the 18th, and to the left of Venus on the 19th. Aldebaran stays to the right of Venus. Look for them early in the morning. Next week, info on a planet we don't really see much of at any given moment. Until the, enjoy the show. It's a good value for your entertainment dollar.

Blue Green Algae

Last year we had one small documented bloom of blue-green algae over in a isolated spot of the northeast corner of the lake. It was documented by laboratory analysis, but we do not know if we had other occurrences that went unknown.

Although blue-green algae is basically ubiquitous in waterways, blooms, i.e. extensive overgrowth that actually form a scum on the surface, are primarily limited to high phosphorous containing bodies of water during the hot summer months. Thus, a bloom on Birch Lake is unexpected and curious.

Blue-green algae is not really algae at all, but a type of bacteria called cyanobacteria. This bacteria has two unique properties in that it has chlorophyll so it can photosynthesize like plants, and can fix gaseous nitrogen to use in growth. Most plants need nitrogen in the form of ammonia or various nitrates, etc. and cannot use gaseous nitrogen. Thus in the late summer when nitrogen levels in bodies of water may decrease, but still have high phosphorous (not Birch), this provides a perfect opportunity for blue-green



algae to out compete other algae and overgrow.


So with our lake being low nutrient (especially phosphorous), would we see any blue-green algae blooms. There is no clarity here, but it may be due to the zebra mussels. Work between Michigan State and the DEQ demonstrated that blue green algae populations were uncharacteristically elevated in some waters with lower phosphorous, and the common factor was zebra mussels.

In some controlled experiments, this observation was also borne out. It is speculated that the zebra mussels may selectively filter some algae and not others leading to a imbalance and a competitive advantage for some blue-green algae species, especially one called microcystis. Microcystis can produce a toxin that if in sufficient concentration can cause some skin reactions for swimmers, and produce systemic toxicity if used as drinking water (dogs, farm animals). Last year the USGS did a survey of 41 lakes to test for this toxin, and although found in some cases, was at levels 10 times less than what the World Health Organization would deem as the lowest level of concern.

However, should in the later summer you see what might be a blue-green algae bloom (most likely greenish looking scum covering a area of water when there is no wave action and the water is quite warm) avoid swimming in the area until it has dispersed due to wave action etc. If you look at all the stuff you have seen so far this year, that is not blue-green, but our everyday junk that accumulates on the lake from the air and the lake combined.

Errata

Last week we reported on E coli and stated that in the body of the lake that no detectable levels were found. That is still true. However, on the table site 4 was listed as having detectable E coli levels. That is not true. The duplicate samples from site 4 were both non detectable. The two detectable samples were the duplicates from the stream midway between the lake and the road.


