





Tannadoonah Tidbits

ow, it's been quite a week up here at Camp

Tannadoonah! We have a completely full camp this week - 107 campers! In fact, we even had a waiting list for the session. That's the first time that's ever happened since I've been the director up here.

The theme for this week is Survivor Week. On Sunday evening we divided the camp into 8 tribes, and tie-dyed bandanas in a different color for each tribe. While the tribes were tie-dying their bandanas, they competed against each other in a game we call "Tannadoonah Auction."

In the Tannadoonah Auction, we call out a category, and each team has to nominate one representative from their team who best fits the category. For example, we might ask for the camper with the longest hair, or the camper with the cleanest shoes, or the camper with the smallest ears, or the camper who can do the best Donald Duck impression. It's generally a big hit with the campers, because everyone gets to show off their unusual talents or features.

On Monday night we had our cookout night and cabin night, and on Tuesday we played a very crazy game of Capture the Flag. With over 120 people on the field (campers and counselors) it got pretty wild! We divided the tribes into the "cool colors" and the "warm colors" to come up with 2 big teams.

Wednesday night's evening activity was a Counselor Hunt, which is like a big game of hide-and-seek. Each tribe was seeking their tribe counselors, and at the end all of the counselors who got found get "punished." They might have to walk barefoot through some gross, slimy stuff, or they might have to feed each other pudding while blindfolded. It's very messy, but definitely fun to watch!

With this big a group, the waterfront has been really busy! Those residents who are up here on weekday mornings probably noticed all the commotion when more than 30 campers showed up for the first morning of Polar Bear swim at 7am! I could hear them all the way up in Main Lodge. We also had 34

campers sign up for sailing! That's the most we've had in several years, and we had to put in one of our Sunfish Sailboats to accommodate all the sailors.

Our total number for the summer is currently at 401 officially. We're still right about the same as last year's numbers, which I consider a victory in the current economic climate. On this date last year we had 409 registered campers, and finished the summer with 457. There are

still openings for our remaining 3 weeks of camp: Robin Hood Week, It's a ZOO Week, and Fairy Tale & Super Hero Week. If you know of any potential campers, tell them to sign up soon!

for life. Earth is teeming with fish, mammals, birds, reptiles, insects, and even some oddball "extremophiles" — life forms that live in extreme environments like deep inside ice at the poles or around hot springs at the bottom of the ocean. Today, the diversity of life on Earth and its hardiness at adapting to extreme environments prompt many scientists to think life could thrive elsewhere in our solar system or on planets and moons around other stars in our Milky Way galaxy.

But it was only in the sixteenth century, around the time of Copernicus, that people began to see Earth as a planet at all — akin to the "wanderers" that were seen crossing the night sky against the stable background of stars. Since then, telescopic and probe-based studies of other bodies in the solar system have put our remarkable home into a broader context

We know that Earth is the largest of the "terrestrial" planets in our solar system — the four rocky planets close to the Sun

Earth is tilted on its axis at 23.5 degrees, which creates the seasons. When one hemisphere is tilted toward the Sun, it experiences summer. The hemisphere tilted away experiences winter. Spring and fall occur when a hemisphere is between these two extremes.

Earth is the only planet where the normal temperature range allows water to

exist on its surface as a liquid. In fact, oceans cover 70 percent of Earth's surface

This is an extremely important factor for life as we know it.

Earth's atmosphere is another factor that makes life possible. Consisting of 78 percent nitrogen, 21 percent oxygen, and traces of other gases, it provides protection from most of the Sun's harmful radiation. It also protects us from most of the meteors that head for the planet; they burn up in the atmosphere before they can hit the ground.

The solid portions of Earth form three layers. The top layer is the crust, and is made of silicates — rocks like quartz, feldspar, and others. The mantle lies beneath the crust, and contains most of Earth's mass. The mantle is made primarily of silicon, magnesium, and oxygen. The mantle wraps around a two-layered core: a partially molten outer layer of iron and nickel and an inner layer of solid iron. As Earth rotates, these layers spin at different rates, which generates our planet's magnetic field.


Earth's seven continents sit on large tectonic plates that float atop the mantle. Eons ago, the continents were joined together into a single land mass scientists have coined Pangaea. Starting about 200 million years ago, the plates began to drift apart, causing the continents to separate. They are still moving today, albeit extremely slowly. and one plate is forced to slide underneath another.

Water Quality Tidbits

Gordon and Terry were out doing the July chlorophyll and dissolved oxygen/temperature profile for the lake on Tuesday the 14th.

The Secchi disk reading for the week was 16 feet on Monday afternoon and just shy of 16 feet on Tuesday. The chlorophyll sampling uses a continuous sample of the water column from twice the Secchi depth to the surface, so about a column of 32 feet.

We plan to set up the graphics for the dissolved oxygen and temperature profile from May to the current readings. We still have significant oxygen down to about 70 feet where it starts to drop rather sharply to almost anoxic at 91 feet. The thermocline starts at about 20-22 feet with a temperature at about 71 F (21.6 C) and drops quickly to 49 F (9.8 C) at 32 feet. Over the next 50 feet the temperature only drops



another 10 degrees F or 4 C.

We share the oxygen/temperature probe equipment with Corey and Eagle Lake. We were talking to the tester on Eagle lake and the Secchi disk reading has dropped to 5 feet there from a record in June of 24 feet. He says the lake looks green. Also, below 18 feet the oxygen drops to levels we do not see until after 85 feet.


When he dropped the equipment off on Monday, he commented on how blue Birch Lake looked. Thus, we may see it as a bit cloudy, but I guess we have to look at it in comparison. It should be remembered that Eagle lake is a rather shallow lake and thus subject to more warming and productivity.


Eurasian Milfoil Update

On inspection of the Eurasian Milfoil patch on the east side, it appears that the treatment has worked very well. There are lots of plants but not Milfoil which is a good indicator because Eurasian Milfoil crowds out all other plants. As far as the patch by the public landing, it was retreated by Professional Lake Management on July 9th.

Purple Loosestrife Watch

Purple Loosestrife is emerging. It has been sighted at two locations on the west side. One site has been removed and the other should be removed before you read this. If you see a pink purplish flowering plant on your property that you think may be Purple Loosestrife, please call a Water Quality Committee member and we will check it out.




