Always just in time, we rush to the safety of our windows and porches just as the approaching downpour cascades across the lake, masking the opposite shore in a blur of dancing white.



A huge thank you to everyone for all of their help. And thanks to everyone who attended, it wouldn't be successful if we didn't have you come and join in the fun.



Team Steffen Wins "Best Team Uniform" In This Year's Event



Blue Cheese Crescent Spirals

INGREDIENTS

Spirals

- 1 can (8 oz) Pillsbury® refrigerated crescent dinner rolls or 1 can (8 oz) Pillsbury® Crescent Recipe CreationsTM refrigerated flaky dough sheet
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted 1/4 cup crumbled blue cheese (1 oz) 1/4 cup chopped pecans Sauce

Stu's Star Stuff



Interesting facts about Neptune

eptune is brightest for the year and remains in the sky all night. But the fourth-largest planet is so far away you need a telescope to see it.

After the discovery of Uranus in 1781, astronomers had a difficult time accurately describing the planet's orbit. Uranus seemed to be pulled by the gravity of an unseen planet. Working independently, two mathematicians calculated the position of such a planet and passed it on to astronomers. When German astronomer Johan Galle aimed his telescope at that position in 1846, he quickly detected the new world.

Galle had discovered the solar system's fourth-largest planet. It is a soothing bluegreen orb that looks like a giant marble spinning through space. Its color is the result of methane in its upper atmosphere, which absorbs red light, allowing us to see only the blue end of the spectrum.

Neptune probably has a rocky core wrapped in a layer of frozen water and other ices. The core is fairly large, so Neptune is actually the third most massive planet in the solar system. Traces of other elements form clouds at the top of its thick atmosphere. Neptune's rotation stretches the clouds into bands that completely encircle the planet.

We can't see a lot of features in Neptune's atmosphere, but the features that astronomers can detect appear to come and go in a hurry. When the Voyager 2 space-craft flew past Neptune in August 1989, for example, it discovered the Great Dark Spot -- a dark, oval-shaped storm system as big as Earth. But when Hubble Space Telescope looked at Neptune five years later, the Great Dark Spot had disappeared.

Voyager also found that Neptune produces more heat than it receives from the Sun. One theory says that a "rain" of liquid hydrogen falls onto the planet's core, releasing heat as it falls.

Several rings of rocky material that is darker than chimney soot encircle Neptune. The rings may have formed when a comet slammed into a small moon, destroying both the comet and the moon. The debris then spread out to form rings. Today, this material is merging to form larger clumps. Within about 10,000 years, the ring material may coalesce to form a moon -- a moon reborn from the ashes of its own demise.

Some other interesting facts include - Distance from Sun - 2.8 billion miles, diameter - 30,776 miles, length of day - 16 hours 7 minutes, length of year - 164.8 Earth years, known moons - 13.

Look for Neptune (with your telescope) to the lower left of Jupiter this evening. Jupiter rises in the east not long after night fall and is the brightest object in that part of the sky. Saturn is currently fading in the

western evening twilight but next week the Moon, Mercury, and Saturn line up left to right very low in the west about 30 minutes after sunset. You may need binoculars to see the planets. Until next week, enjoy the show. It's free, and one of the many reasons I love Birch Lake.



Phosphorous Data

As has been discussed over the years, phosphorous is the primary growth limiting nutrient in the lake that can lead to additional algae growth, plant growth, and consequent aging of the lake.

What would be desired is a phosphorous level below 10 (I will not get into the units). but you definitely do not want above 30. The bar graph on this page shows the data as available over the past 10 years. There are two bars for each year and these reflect the samples taken in the spring and late summer. The spring sample is collected after the lake turnover and mixing, thus, if you would sample anywhere in the lake and at any depth, the data should be the same. The

summer sample is taken following true stratification leading to a non-mixing between the warmer surface water and the colder deeper water. Thus, differences between spring and summer are not unexpected.

What is interesting is that in looking at this graph, the early data show a higher spring than summer level of phosphorous, while in the later years of this data collection, the reverse was true. In 2008, there was no spring sample taken. The data in 2009 shows only the spring sample. The summer sample will be taken in a couple of weeks. However, in doing a side by side for other things with Ralph Bednarz from the DEQ, he sampled for phosphorous. This was in June and the level then was 9.

Whether the shift in spring summer has meaning is unclear now and will be an item of discussion with folks who might be able to tell us more as we collect further data in future years.

Full Moon


It is August, dog days are here, the moon has been full, thus that must mean we will see some stuff on the lake in various places after warm calm nights. Usually this is in the northeast section where prevailing winds may gather stuff, additional phosphorous from the stream may make conditions for algae growth a bit more robust, and this can increase anxiety lev-



els of those who see this.

Today, Tuesday August, 11. we sampled multiple locations around piers in the area. The stuff was an algae bloom of some sort. The initial samples will be tested for E coli, but we want to identify the stuff. An individual at a company called Phycotech in St. Joseph is one of the best in the area for analyses of this type. She is out this week, thus a sample today would not be as well preserved as one taken the same day it would be taken in. Thus, we have asked some folks in the area to alert us starting next week if the same conditions arise, so we can obtain a suitable sample for analysis. If we do not see this again, well, is that a


