Holly is currently out of town. As of 8/4/09 our membership total was up to 158. Well done.



~Birch Lake Recipes~

This week's recipes come straight from the Deb Taghon's "OUT OF THIS WORLD" recipe box.

Charred Corn Salad

- 2 Tbs fresh lime juice
- 1Tbs fresh orange juice
- 1 tsp diced chipotle chili in adobo plus 1 Tbs adobo sauce
- 2 tsp salt
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp honey
- ¹/₄ c olive oil
- 6 ears of corn, husks and silks removed
- 1 can (15 oz) black beans rinsed and drained
- 2 Tbs chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 cups cherry or grape tomatoes quartered
- $\frac{1}{4}$ c red onion

Dressing:

Whisk together the lime juice, orange juice, chipotle chili and adobo



sauce, 1 tsp of salt, garlic, honey and ¹/₄ c olive oil until smooth. Set aside Prepare a hot fire on the grill

Rub the ears of corn with 2 Tbs of olive oil and salt. Grill corn turning occasionally, until charred in spots, 10 - 15 minutes

When corn is cool enough to handle, remove the kernels from the cobs and place the kernels in a large bowl. Add the black beans, chopped cilantro, tomatoes, and onion. Stir in vinaigrette. Serve at room temperature. Serves 6 - 8 people.

And for desert.....

Frangelico Crème

- 3 (8 oz) pkg. cream cheese
- 1 ¹/₂ c superfine sugar
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- ¹/₄ c Frangelico liqueur
- 2 c. whipping cream

Beat egg yolks, superfine sugar, and vanilla until light and pale. Add softened cream cheese and Frangelico; mix well. Refrigerate. Whip whipping cream until stiff. Fold into cheese mixture. Chill

This recipe makes about 6 cups. When I make it for a smaller

group I cut the recipe into 1/3 Yum! Thanks Deb

he legends of the constellations are often tales of sadness — tales of lost lovers, and lives cut short. Yet no legend is sadder than that of Lyra, the harp, which climbs high overhead on summer nights.

The legend tells the story of Orpheus, who was given a harp by the god Apollo. Orpheus's music was sweeter than that of any other mortal man. It could soothe any savage, bring joy to the heart of the weary. It was even said that rivers changed course to stay near its beauty.

Orpheus married the lovely maiden Eurydice. But after their wedding, as she walked with her bridesmaids, she was bitten by a snake and died.

Orpheus was so stricken with grief that he journeyed to the underworld to win her return. His music not only gained him entry to Hades, it caused Pluto to soften his heart and grant Orpheus's wish. But there was one condition: Eurydice would follow Orpheus, who could not look back until both had gained the upper world.

Despite his anxiety, Orpheus followed his instructions — until he reached the surface. Before Eurydice could take the final steps into the light, he turned to gaze upon her. She vanished, with only one word to her love: Farewell.

Crazed with grief, Orpheus wandered

the hills of Greece until he was murdered. The Muses buried him, and Apollo placed his magical harp in the sky — as Lyra.

Lyra is high in the sky as night falls this month, marked by its brightest star, Vega.

It's the fifth-brightest star in the entire night sky.

Vega's one of our nearest stellar neighbors — just 25 light-years away. In other words, the light we see from Vega tonight actually began its journey toward Earth near the end of Ronald Reagan's first term as president.

Vega is a white star, which means that its surface is hotter than the Sun's. But Vega generates light the same way as the Sun: Nuclear reactions in its core convert hydrogen into helium.

While the Sun and Vega are similar in some ways, in one way they're quite different: They spin at very different speeds.

The Sun rotates just once a month. Vega, on the other hand, spins twice a day. In fact, if the star spun just a bit faster, it would fling itself apart. Because of that high-speed rotation, Vega bulges out at the equator. It's about 23 percent fatter at the equator than through the poles.

Here on Earth, we see Vega nearly pole-on. Because of that, it took astronomers awhile to measure Vega's thrillride rotation — a rotation that gives the star a bulging waistline.

Look for Vega and the rest of the summer triangle, Deneb and Altair this weekend. Vega is easy to pick out on any summer night. This week, it's high overhead as darkness falls, and low in the northwest at first light. Send me a dollar and enjoy the show. It's a bargain. -Stu Spratt



The Testing Continues

Full Moon Part II — Last week we mentioned the algae bloom (August 12) in the area of the stream in the northeast part of the lake. With that present we tested for E coli the (1) Stream, (2) 10 foot south of the stream along the sea wall, (3) just south of the first pier in the middle of the algae bloom, and (4) adjacent to the second pier south of the stream also in the middle of the algae bloom. The following data were recorded from these sites from which two samples were taken at each site, so two numbers will be shown for each.

- (1) 440 and 520
- (2) ND and ND
- (3) ND and ND
- (4) ND and 60

At the same time of that testing, Gordon wanted to test some stuff in front of his seawall. Gordon, in his efforts to provide the best turtle habitat he can, especially for the babies, does not rake out the detritus that accumulates from the prevailing southwest breezes which collects and degrades by his seawall. He thought there was a little bit of decaying raccoon poop there and we decided to test adjacent to that (1) about 17 inches away (2), and in a clear area next to his pier about 10 feet away. Again two samples were taken at each location.

(1) 480 and 840

- (2) 160 and 200
- (3) 20 and 20

Thus, again the stream had E coli in it and once in the lake it was basically non detectable unless you had some poop in the area, as indicated by Gordon's. Rotting detritus also makes an area for propagation to some degree.

What a Difference a Rain Makes

We tested again the morning following all that rain (August 17) to see any effect a swollen raging stream had on

things. Thus we tested (1) upstream as the stream emerges from the woods and goes by any homes, (2) the stream between the road and the lake, (3) adjacent to the pier just south of the stream, and (4) in the detritus by Gordon's seawall. Duplicates of each sites were taken.

- (1) Over 2000 for both
- (2) Over 2000 for both
- (3) 880 and 700
- (4) 260 and 180

Thus it would appear when the wetland flushes, more E coli is brought into the lake as expressed by the stream counts and the counts at a location adjacent to the stream which under normal flow conditions is non detectable. The location by Gordon's seawall stayed the same as last week, and is not surprising based on its microenvironment.

INVASIVE SPECIES UPDATE Aquatic Plant Management Program

Back in May Progressive AE conducted an aquatic plant survey on the entire lake. A number of samples were taken of suspected Hybrid Milfoil and sent in for DNA testing. We are waiting for results.

Also identified were Eurasian Milfoil sites that were set up for treatment. In June Professional Lake Management treated two sites. One was on the east

side of the lake and one was by the landing. Progressive returned three weeks later for re-inspection and surveyed the entire lake again. They found two additional small patches of Eurasian Milfoil by the landing. Professional Lake Management treated these area, and things look good. Currently the east side site has other species growing. This is a good sign since Eurasian Milfoil is so

dense that it does not allow anything else to grow.

We are fortunate that we caught the Eurasian Milfoil problem while it is still easy to manage. As far as the Hybrid Milfoil, until we receive the results of the DNA testing, it is unclear if it is a problem. As previously reported, we will not have these results until the end of summer; however, what we are seeing does not have the density nor does it mat at the water surface so it is not a problem at this time.

Purple Loosestrife Management Program

Once again we have had a successful year controlling the spread of Purple Loosestrife. During the months of July and August plants were removed from three properties on the lake.

We have seen considerable improvement since the Purple Loosestrife Program was started in 2000. At that time we had ten sites that encompassed all shores of Birch Lake. Several of these sites were very dense.

Bruce and Rick inspect the shores of our lake and are responsible for direction and proper removal of any plants that are found. The success of this program is because of the help we get from concerned residents on the lake who have helped keep an eye out and have assisted with the removal.

REFLECTIONS

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
