

Ingredients


- 2 cups boiling water

- 1 (8 ounce) tub COOL WHIP Whipped Topping, thawed, divided


■ 1 cup fresh strawberries, halved



Some Reminders

Watching the results of the heavy rains we have had recently, we are reminded of the adage that if it is around the lake it will get into the lake. Remember we live in a basin with relatively steep sides and lots of impervious asphalt, shingles, driveways, and patios, which just increase the volume and velocity of surface water flow into the lake. Additionally, since the flat land we build on is narrow, we have little in the way of yard space. As such our ability to create good buffers between the land and the lake, (i.e. something that slows water flow down and helps restrict stuff getting quickly into the lake) is limited. Thus, remember especially the following:

1. In a perfect world, lake water-quality-wise anyway, none of us would ever use any fertilizer. If yours is less than a perfect world, and you feel you must use fertilizer, please make sure it does not contain any phosphorous. Remember phosphorous is one of the key "limiting" nutrients whose presence directly bears on the amount of plant and algae growth. In the spring there is usually plenty of nitrogen in the lake,

and so the amount of phosphorous controls the growth opportunities for plants and algae. Thus it is key to keep it out of the lake. Phosphorous is so trouble-some that fertilizers containing phosphorous are outlawed in Wisconsin and a number of other states. In addition to avoiding fertilizer with phosphorous, if you wash yourself or your dog in the lake (definitely not recommended), please make sure to use a non phosphorous soap.

2. Many folks will burn leaves and sticks to get rid of them rather than bag them up etc. Others burn for more leisure related reasons (like sitting around a campfire, an enjoyable summer evening activity). However, remember that by burning you have accelerated the rate in which leaves and wood become a rich fertilizer with minerals. These undesirables can easily run off into the lake with a good rain. If you do burn, especially on the street, but even if in fire pits, which can fill with ashes, once the fire has cooled, please shovel the ashes into a bag and throw it into the trash.

3. Take a look at the end of the yard as it transitions into the lake. Probably, like most of us, you have a slightly to steeply sloping lawn that then tumbles over a concrete seawall or some rocks directly into the lake. We desire each inch of our precious yard space due to this narrow strip of buildable land we

have around the lake. However, think about whether or not you could actually build a bit of a buffer to slow down water runoff. Remember this runoff in a big rain is carrying all the dirt, oils, lawn stuff, dog poop, etc. with it into the lake. So look to see if you can plant some things on the waters edge for a foot or maybe more into the yard that is more than grass and which might buffer the



interaction between land and water. Due to limited space, what is practical may be an issue, but please examine the following web sites for some ideas that you might be able to utilize:

(www.raingardens.org and www.shoreline.msu.edu).

The latter is from the Michigan State University extension service, which frequently make presentations at Michigan Lakes and Streams Association events.

Lake Aging

From the time of their inception, virtually all lakes are undergoing an aging process. Give our lake a few thousand years and it will eventually fill in with sediment due to continued growth of weeds and algae and become a wetland.

The lake is deep, but yes, this will really happen. While this march to death might be short lived in comparison to other geologic phenomenon, and take only 10,000 years or so, we are fortunate that this is not something that we or our great great grandkids will see. What we want is for this process to be glacially slow and permit us the clean clear water we have now for as long as possible.

Next week we will provide some data from 10+ years ago and last year that will permit us to see if there has been any measurable change. This will be in the form of a dissolved oxygen profile in the deep basin of the lake from similar dates in 1989-1991 and 2009. These profiles effectively indicate the plant and algae productivity of the lake and can give us an idea as to the potential rate of sedimentation in the lake.

Stu's Star Stuff



On to Venus — two stars in one

was going to break the pattern but at least for this week I'll stick with it. Today's stop on our journey brings us back home to the planet we all know best, Earth. Earth is the only planet whose English name does not derive from Greek/Roman mythology. The name derives from Old English and Germanic. There are, of course, hundreds of other names for the planet in other languages. In Roman Mythology, the goddess of the Earth was Tellus - the fertile soil. The Greek name is Gaia, terra mater - Mother Earth.

It was not until the time of Copernicus (the sixteenth century) that it was understood that the Earth is just another planet. We are the third planet outward and our orbit takes us EXACTLY one astronomical unit (AU) from the sun. No coincidence as the definition of AU is the average distance of Earth from the sun. AUs are one of the ways space scientist's measure distances across the vastness of space. Light years are another. Measuring distances in miles in outer space would be as useful as having inch markers on the interstate between New York and Los Angeles. Still, we are just the right distance from the sun, about 93 million miles, to make things livable.

Earth, of course, can be studied without the aid of spacecraft. Nevertheless it was not

until the twentieth century that we had maps of the entire planet. Pictures of the planet taken from space are of considerable importance; for example, they are an enormous help in weather prediction and especially in tracking and predicting hurricanes. And they are extraordinarily beautiful.

Birch Lake is one of countless examples of an Earthly feature that appears nowhere else in the known universe - liquid water - covering 71 percent of the Earth's surface. Water gives us life, another unique feature of Earth. Sorry, but yes, Martians are a myth. I hope that in my lifetime we will learn that we are not alone. But I won't be holding my breath - another unique feature - a life sustaining atmosphere.

The presence of free oxygen is quite remarkable from a chemical point of view. Oxygen is a very reactive gas and under "normal" circumstances would quickly combine with other elements. The oxygen in Earth's atmosphere is produced and maintained by biological processes. Without life there would be no free oxygen.

I could go on and on with fun facts such as Earth's core is hotter than the surface of the sun, or boring stuff on plate tectonics or editorials about greenhouse gasses and light pollution. But for now, look for Earth most any time of the day or night just below your feet. And, let's all enjoy, and be thankful for, our little piece of Earth here at Birch Lake.





Camp Tannadoonah

Staff week at Camp T

t's staff week at Camp and we're off and running! I think we're going to have a really great staff this summer. We have a total of 19 counselors (7 boys and 12 girls), as well as me, Miss Sue (the assistant director), Miss Peggy (the cook), 2 dishwashers, and a nurse each week. This year's staff is a little smaller than last year, when we had 22 counselors. This year we tried to cut expenses, and plan for a moderate sized week, then get extra people to help out during the really big weeks.

As a follow-up to the meeting we held at camp last weekend, I thought it might be interesting to break down where the funds from each camper go. This year it costs \$397 to send a camper to camp for a week. Our budget is based on a total of 500 campers at an average cost of about \$350-\$375. This average is lower than the basic cost because we

offer discounted rates (such as an early bird), and we also have day campers (\$275), mini week campers (\$275), and other lower weekly rates such as CITs.

So if we hit our goal of 500 campers, here's where that \$350-\$375 goes:

\$96 Camp Staff

\$80 Council Overhead

(office, executive director, National dues, ACA dues, payroll taxes, office staff, office supplies)

\$50 Food

\$35 Council Debt

\$30 Insurance

\$20 Program supplies

(t-shirts, craft supplies, archery supplies, candy, photos, etc)

\$20 Utilities

\$20 Maintenance

\$10 Advertising, promotions, postage Total = \$361

As you can see, the Camp Staff is

our biggest expense each year. We're not paying our staff an exorbitant amount, by any means. The counselors work 6 days a week, 24 hours a day, with only short breaks, for nearly 2 months. If you break it down, the average counselor makes just over \$1 per hour! Because we want to ensure the safety and positive experience of each and every camper, staffing is one area where we really can't afford to cut expenses.

Shifting gears, we still have many more requests for campership funding than I am able to award, so if you are interested in sponsoring a camper, please contact me as soon as possible. We have lots of openings for the first week of camp which starts Sunday, as well as Jungle Week (June 27-July 3) and mini week (July 7-10).

Camp needs \$25k this year!

Thanks to everyone who attended the meeting on Saturday to discuss Camp Fire and Camp Tannadoonah. To recap, we reviewed our financial history (we've got about \$96k in debt) and a \$25k deficit this year (we started 2010 about \$17k in the red, and an \$8k budget deficit). \$24k of our annual operating budget goes to repay that debt. If we can reduce our debt load, that frees us up to spend more on our programs and facilities.

As we discussed, Camp Fire has turned the corner and has developed a lot of positive momentum. However, we're still trying to get out of the hole we're in — which means we're looking to raise an additional \$40k to help overcome this year's deficit and reduce our debt. A number of attendees volunteered to help coordinate various fundraising activities. Please keep an eye on the Barker for more on those.

We sincerely appreciate the support we've gotten from the lake community, and we look forward to your help in overcoming this obstacle and moving ahead for many years to come. -**Chas**


