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Why we're celebrating

The Declaration of Independence IN CONGRESS, July 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.--Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world...

TIMELINE

June 11 — Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston appointed to a committee to draft a declaration of independence. American army retreats to Lake Champlain from Canada.

June 12-27 — Jefferson, at the request of the committee, drafts a declaration, of which only a fragment exists. Jefferson's clean, or "fair" copy, the "original Rough draught," is reviewed by the committee. Both documents are in the manuscript collections of the Library of Congress.

June 28 — A fair copy of the committee draft of the Declaration of Independence is read in Congress.

July 1-4 — Congress debates and revises the Declaration of Independence.

July 2 — Congress declares independence as the British fleet and army arrive at New York.

July 4 — Congress adopts the Declaration of Independence in the morning of a bright, sunny, but cool Philadelphia day. John Dunlap prints the Declaration of Independence. These prints are now called "Dunlap Broadsides." Twenty-four copies are known to exist, two of which are in the Library of Congress. One of these was Washington's personal copy.

VEGGIE TORTILLA ROLL-UPS

Cream cheese complements crunchy red bell pepper and olives in a vegetarian appetizer.

Prep Time: 15 Min Total Time: 3 Hr 15 Min Makes: About 30 servings *INGREDIENTS*

1 package (3 oz) cream cheese, softened

1/2 cup sour cream1/2 cup finely shredded Cheddar cheese

1/4 cup finely chopped red bell pepper2 tablespoons sliced ripe olives, chopped1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley3 flavored or plain flour tortillas (8 to 10 inch)

DIRECTIONS

Even though the races were canceled, I do still want thank Irene Steffen, Mike Sheffieck, and Karen Brovold for volunteering to run the committee boat.







Lake Aging and Us

We commonly use the term eutrophication to describe the process of aging of a lake as well as to provide a gauge relating to quality of a lake. The three stages of eutrophication are oligotrophic (early), mesotrophic (midway), and eutrophic (final). As we have previously described, eutrophication is a continuous process related to an overall increase in the organic matter of the lake. This organic matter is a summary collection of all living organisms (from bacteria and algae to weeds and ultimately to big fish) plus the formerly living but now decayed organisms which end up creating a lot of the sediment at the bottom of the lake.

A true oligotrophic lake will have little of the above. Thus, it will have a rocky or sandy bottom, possibly many species of algae, water weeds, and fish, albeit few in numbers, clear water, low level of nutrients (phosphorous and nitrogen), and little nutrient matter getting into the water from relatively unproductive farmland in the area. We might say that the quality of these lakes is great from the perspective of esthetics, i.e. clear clean looking water. However, a fisherman might take issue with this as they can spend a lot of unproductive time on the lake. These lakes are most commonly seen in the upper part of the lower peninsula and the upper peninsula.

The gradations from oligotrophic to mesotrophic, and then eutrophic are really only increases in the amount of organic material that we find in any particular lake. Thus, more algae (less clarity), more fish, more weeds, and more sediment. There are no real well defined lines that truly describe the different trophic levels, but rather ranges in which we place different lakes. Eutrophication may also be defined as natural and or cultural. The natural process is the result of the addition of organic matter in the form of leaves, pollen, seeds, nutrient runoff from woods and fields etc. which then provides the food stuff and nutrients for algae and all the rest of the

food chain. On the other hand a more rapid eutrophication can result from the cultural aspect. This is the result of human impact on the shoreline where we build houses with lawns, roads, reduce the wetlands, and enhance agricultural practices that make runoff more nutrient laden. We cannot do much about the natural process.



One only has to get out on the lake early in the morning when the lake is still in the spring and look at the coating of pollen and seeds that have fallen in a single night. Cultural eutrophication is another matter. We are not going to remove our homes and lawns, but we can alter practices that reduce runoff and fertilizers etc. The replacement of septic systems 20 years ago was of great importance and we now hope that the sewers will have eliminated nutrients getting into the soil from our home uses. However overall shoreline impact will increase eutrophication beyond the natural slow rate. We just hope to minimize this as much as possible.

As far as trophic status is concerned, our lake is in that transition from oligotrophic to mesotrophic. Characteristics of this status include: reasonable clarity of the water, sandy to marly sediment for the bottom of the lake, most weeds are scattered and not in dense beds with the exception of some very localized areas, very modest nutrient levels so far, and reasonable productivity relative to plant and algae growth, with a fish population that ranges from cold water trout that requires cold, well oxygenated, water to the typical warm water bass and bluegill populations. There is nothing wrong with this classification right now as it truly provides full scale recreational opportunities. However, 10, 15, 20 years from now we would like to see it relatively unchanged from the current conditions. We will look at some parameters from the past in a later issue to see what the future may hold.





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Earth systems on Earth blow themselves out in a few days or weeks. On the solar system's giant planets, though, weather systems can last for decades. The record holder is Jupiter's Great Red Spot, which was first observed no later than 1830 -and perhaps a good bit earlier. This oval storm system is wide enough to swallow two Earths, and the winds at its perimeter blow several times faster than the strongest hurricane ever recorded on Earth.

As the Great Red Spot demonstrates, Jupiter is a world of superlatives. It is the largest planet in the solar system, big enough to swallow more than 1,300 Earths, and bigger than some types of stars, and more massive than the solar system's other known planets and moons combined. It rotates faster than any other planet, it produces the most powerful magnetic field, and it offers the largest and most interesting assortment of moons, more than 50.

Despite its great size and its brightness in Earth's night sky, however, much about Jupiter remains poorly understood. Scientists must infer quite a bit about it from observations by the spacecraft that have visited the planet.

Jupiter has rings like Saturn's, but much fainter and smaller. They were totally unex-

pected and were only discovered when two of the Voyager 1 scientists insisted that after traveling 1 billion miles it was at least worth a quick look to see if any rings might be present. Everyone else thought that the chance of finding anything was nil, but there they were, although they are far darker and skimpier than those of the flashier planet Saturn. The rings may consist of material that was "sandblasted" off the surfaces of Jupiter's moons by collisions with meteorites.

Jupiter does not have a solid surface. Jupiter and the other outlying planets are composed of gas, mostly hydrogen and some helium, some in liquid form. Since Jupiter has no solid surface, no human will ever walk on the planet. In fact, any attempt to visit the Jovian system will require heavy shielding. Jupiter's magnetic field captures electrically charged particles from the Sun and from the planet's volcanic moon Io. These particles create strong radiation belts. Around Io's orbit, the radiation belts are powerful enough to kill an unprotected human in a few minutes. That adds one more item to the list of Jupiter's superlatives: deadliest radiation belts.

Look for Jupiter in the southeast sky early in the morning. It will be the brightest object in that part of the sky. A good pair of binoculars will reveal some of Jupiters moons.

Did anyone see the Moon slide through Earth's shadow early last Saturday morning? Should have bought tickets. Next week, Saturn. Enjoy the show. *-Stu Spratt*

Picture this — 1960 (or '61) — an unusually tall female office worker at the toll road looks up to see an unusually tall toll road electrician enter the room - there are sparks — heart sparks, not electrical sparks — and a match was made. Three or so years later they married and a happy family began.

Shortly after they met, Don became an apprentice electrician, then a journeyman electrician and then electrical foreman on many large jobs in the South Bend area where they lived, with their two children, Barbara and Rick.

Lind had been visiting Birch Lake since she was a small child because her mother was very good friends with (then) Birch Lake residents, the Kensills. In 1966 her parents bought a home on Birch Lake and their visits increased, including renting a cottage for many summers. Each year they would stay a little longer until Don officially retired in 1999 and they could begin splitting their time equally between their homes. And though they do love their time in Florida where they are active in all kinds of social events, including weekly breakfasts and parties, line dancing, bingo, karaoke, volleyball and club maintenance, nothing can keep them away from the lake each summer! And here, nothing can keep away the kids and six grandkids (ages 19 - 4) that

love them and the lake. They visit frequently and join them on camping trips around the state.

We, the residents of Birch Lake, are all thankful that the Harmans return each summer because, besides being good friends and good neighbors, they are the gurus of our 4th of July pancake breakfast, having organized and run it every year since 1998. In addition, Lind is our line dance instructor and a Yacht Club board member and Don has spent many summer days working on the Yacht Club building and helping up at camp. Don has also served as Commodore for Birch Lake Sailing and hosted the Kidz Regatta for several summers.

I am honored to count this great couple as our best friends for the last 38 years. I can't think of any that are more deserving to be this year's Grand Marshalls! Congratulations! Love ya both!

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INFORMATION REGARDING BIRCH LAKE

Editor's Note: The following was forwarded to me from Mary Deitle, a longtime Birch Laker ... Mary was born — 98 years ago — in the main "cottage" up on the hill at what is now known as Camp Tannadoonah. Her parents owned and operated a summer resort there, and used the following as their informational piece to prospective renters. She said that she believes the brochure to be approximately 100 years old. Thanks Mary for the great read!

BIRCH LAKE is in Michigan, 4 1-2 miles from Vandalia, 4 miles from Jones and 2 1-2 miles from Newburg, a flag station without a depot where all trains stop to take on and let off passengers.

POST OFFICE is Vandalia, Mich. from which point there is daily rural free delivery.

VANDALIA is 112 miles from Chicago on Michigan Cent., about three hours ride from Chicago. Trains leave Ill. Cent. depot at 7:10 A.M. arriving Vandalia 11:30 A.M. and at 3 P.M. arriving Vandalia 6:30 P.M., but during the summer months, June, July and Aug. the Mich. Cent. put on a special train leaving chicago, at 2 P.M. and arriving Vandalia at 4;45 P.M. This special train returns Monday morning at 6 A.M. arriving in Chicago at 9:10 A.M.

Other trains returning are at 6:30 A.M. arriving Chicago 9:55 A.M. 1:30 P.M. arriving Chicago at 4:55 P.M. and on Sunday evening at 6 P.M. arriving Chicago 9:45 P.M.

FARES: The regular fare to Vandalia is \$2.11 each way but from the last Friday in April until the latter part of September

the Michigan sell a WEEK END ticket good on all trains and good from Friday until Monday at special rates for Round Trip.

BIRCH LAKE is oval in shape, about 1 1-2 miles long by a mile wide. The water is exceptionally clear and cold, the lake being fed entirely by dense springs in the bottom of the lake and around the shores. There is no inlet. The temperature of the water is about the same as that of Lake Michigan, a trifle warmer perhaps; that of the various springs is about 48 degrees, the year round.

THE BEACH shelves off very gradually to deep water, making it absolutely safe for bathing purposes for both grownups and children. In fact one can wade around the entire shore.

BIRCH LAKE is surrounded by high bluffs having an elevation of from 50 to 75 feel. Between the shore line and the bottom of these hills is a wide stretch of level ground and almost the entire shore as well as the bluffs are densely wooded.

THE OUTLET is a beautiful wooded passage, 1/2 miles in length, leading to a large mill pond on the banks of which is the town of Williamsville, a small village where supplies of all kinds can be had and this point is easily accessible by boat or by road from all parts of the lake. This outlet furnishes sufficient water to operate quite a large flour and feed mill at Williamsville, can easily accommodate row boats and is :one of the most beautiful spots on the lake, affording a delightful retreat on very hot days, as both sides are lined with trees, the branches meeting overhead.

FISHING Large and small mouth black bass, salmon bass, and all kinds of pan fish, such as blue gills, perch, rock bass, croppies, frogs, etc. abound. Ciscoes are also plentiful.

OTHER LAKES ADJACENT afford an excuse for enjoyable trips and furnish excellent fishing, and frogging.

SCENERY No prettier spot can be found in Michigan is the verdict of the majority of the people who have visited Birch Lake. The drives from Vandalia, Jones and Newburg are a source of delight to everyone who loves nature an her happiest mood. These roads wind along the shores of various small lakes and through what are almost primeval forests and road weariness is impossible.

Many enjoyable side trips can be taken in auto or buggy or hayrack to various points of interest. The St. Joseph River, Corey Lake, Diamond Lake, Bear Lake, Shavehead Lake, Donalds Lake and numerous other places.

Long distance and local phone, doctors, nurses, supplies, etc.

SUMMER TEMPERATURE Hardly a night but what a blanket can be used comfortably and on the bluffs there is

nearly always a delightfully cool breeze.

These cottages are located on the top of a bluff at an elevation of 75 feel, easy of access from the lake. All are comfortably furnishes and everything is ready for the occupant except bed linen and covers, table linen and cutlery. These are not furnished. The beds are a special feature. They are not the kind you have been used to getting in a summer cottage. They are the best iron bedsteads, woven wire supported steel springs and real felt mattresses.

Cooking stoves are three hold perfection Oil, blue flame and are the best made. If you prefer gasoline stove, will be furnished.

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

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<u>Camp Tannadoonah</u> Animals emerge in Week 2

eek two of camp is underway and we're having a great time up here! We have 67 campers this week. This week is Jungle Safari week, and we've been playing lots of games involving animals. On Sunday night we played variations on our usual group games - instead of "Giants, Wizards, and Elves" we played "Giraffes, Tigers, and Monkeys"! "Spud" was changed to "Lion", and "Ride that Pony" was "Ride that Zebra"!

On Tuesday night our counselors became jungle animals, and we had an Animal Hunt. The counselors had to find places to hide around camp, and the campers went to find them. Then they got "punished" for being found by having to do goofy or gross stunts. Tuesday night was Capture the Giraffe (instead of Capture the Flag).

We're up to a total of 429 campers so far, compared to just 370 on this date last year. And we didn't reach 429 last year until the first day of the last week of camp last year (8/1/09)! So we're definitely going to beat last year's numbers and hopefully hit our goal of having over 500 this year.

The number I am reporting is our total number of full-pay campers - it does not include spots that we donate or barter, or spots that go to our staff children (who pay a lower rate). It does include camperships as long as they are fully covered by donations. If I include the total number of bunks filled, we're already at 498, and last year our grand total was just 490, so we're already above that! This is great news, but we want to keep on going! So keep spreading the word and sending new campers our way.

One thing I have noticed the past few years is that we have a pretty consistent rate of returning campers. About 60% of our campers return from the previous year, and that figure doesn't seem to change much. What really fluctuates is the number of new campers. This year we have 180 new campers so far (out of 429). That means that 58% of our campers so far this summer are campers who attended camp last year. Last year we only had 154 new campers, so that accounts for a good part of our increase this year.

We're all looking forward to the pancake breakfast again this year, and hope to see many smiling faces up here at camp on Sunday morning! Last year the Harmans reported that we served a record number of breakfast-goers, with over 500 people attending. Let's see if we can beat that this year! All of the funds that are donated from the breakfast go




