Stu's Star Stuff



Speeding out to Neptune

ur next stop as we speed outward from the sun takes us to Neptune. Named for the Roman god of the sea (Greek would be Poseidon) Neptune is the eight planet from the sun. At a distance of about 2.8 billion miles it is 30 times farther out than Earth.

Neptune is a gas giant, but it is the smallest of the four gas giant planets. It is about 31,000 miles in diameter, making it about four times larger than Earth and three times smaller than Jupiter.

Its bluish hue may give one the impression of water, but in fact it is just Neptune's thick atmosphere. In order to see Neptune, you have to use binoculars or a telescope and you need to know just where to look. It should appear like a tiny circle, instead of pointlike, as stars do. You may even notice the blue color.

Neptune travels very slowly around the Sun - one Neptune year equals 165 Earth years. However, Neptune spins more quickly than Earth, with its day lasting just over 16 hours.

Neptune was discovered in 1846, by Johann Gottfried Galle. Doing the math one can see that it has completed only one orbit around the sun since it's discovery and is therefore nearly at the same place in which it was first observed. Additionally, it is unusual in that its existence was known before it was discovered. Mathematicians realized after Uranus's discovery that another large planet must exist beyond it because of the way its orbit was affected.

The moon Triton was discovered with Neptune. It is Neptune's largest moon and the only large moon in the solar system to orbit opposite its planet's rotation. It has a south polar cap and geysers of dark nitrogen. It may have been a dwarf planet like Pluto before being captured.

Neptune's other large moon, Nereid, was discovered in 1949. It may have been an asteroid or other captured object because its orbit is the most highly eccentric orbit of any planet or satellite in the solar system. There are 11 other named moons as well.

Most of what we know about Neptune comes from Voyager 2. It found that the planet has at least thirteen moons and a thin ring. The ring is made up of four dusty rings and brighter ring clumps. The Great Dark Spot is a hurricane-like storm on the planet that has been raging at least 400 years. Voyager 2 discovered a smaller bright cloud that raced around the atmosphere. It was named Scooter. Neptune has the fastest measured winds in the solar sys-

tem at more than 1200 miles an hour.

Try for Neptune in the constellation Aquarius, the Water Carrier. But you'll have to wait for fall or even winter to do so. It is to the east of The Great Square of Pegasus in the late night sky. OK, that's it. We're done. Or are we? We'll see next week. Enjoy the show. It's free.







ick a sport, any sport! This week has been All Star Sports Week up at camp, and we're trying out lots of different sports. We've had a basketball program all week, we played the 3rd annual Tannadoonah Cup Soccer tournament, and we had a World Series of Kickball, too! Throw in a little Football, some Ultimate Frisbee, Wiffle Ball, and even a Running Club in the mornings.

This week we have 89 total campers, and 44 of them are boys. So we're nearly 50/50 boys and girls this week, We even had to switch the cabins all around to make room for so many boys. The last week of camp (August 1-7) we're exactly even with 40 boys and 40 girls. For the season, we're at 60% girls, 40% boys, which is as close to even as I think we've ever been.

Next week (July 25-31) will be Christmas in July. We'll be celebrating the holiday season all week, and on Thursday night (July 29th) we'll be going Christmas Caroling around the lake! We'll divide into two groups and sing camp songs to residents on the North and North-East shores, and the Cove and South-West shore. We plan to leave camp around 7:30pm, and we'll have about 40 campers and 10 staff in each group!

We're up to 464 regular campers for the season (compared to 433 last year and 457 the previous year). And we've got 539 total beds filled (compared to 490 last year and 491 the previous year)! We're so excited to be nearing our goal of 550 total beds filled this year!

This week was our second week of the Counselor in Training (CIT) program. Each group of CITs comes to camp for two weeks. Last week and this week the returning CITs were here, and this week and next week the new CITs are here. So this week they overlapped, and we had a total of 10 CITs here for the week. The CIT program is a great way for older campers to learn about what it takes to be a counselor at camp. They get to shadow the counselors, help at activities, help in the cabins, and coordinate the week's evening activities.

Don't forget to come out for the Hog Roast event next weekend (Saturday, July 31st). We want to thank you all for your support of our Camp Fire programs by throwing a really great party!


Local Banks


