



### Here's a fine way to cool off

#### **White Peach Sangria**

#### Ingredients

- · 1 (750 milliliter) bottle dry white wine
- · 3/4 cup peach flavored vodka
- · 6 tablespoons frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed
- · 1/4 cup white sugar
- · 1 pound white peaches, pitted and sliced
- · 3/4 cup seedless red grapes, halved
- · 3/4 cup seedless green grapes, halved

#### Directions

1. In a large pitcher, combine dry white wine, peach vodka, lemonade concentrate and sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add sliced peaches, red and green grapes.

2. Refrigerate sangria until well chilled, at least 2 hours, or overnight to blend flavors. Serve over ice, and use a slotted spoon to include sliced peaches and grapes with each serving.

### **Water Quality Committee Report**

### **Dissolved Oxygen**

Oxygen is the "stuff of life", necessary for the primary energy producing metabolic reactions of living cells. When oxygen is absent, life ceases to exist (with the exception of some deep sea bacteria, etc.). If you want to test this hypothesis try holding your breath. Reducing the amount of available oxygen negatively effects living matter.

Contrary to what you might expect, plants do not need oxygen in sunlight but do need it at night. Oxygen gas dissolves in water, but there is less oxygen in a liter of water than in a liter of air.

Even in our deep lake, during the late fall or following ice out in the spring, when the temperature of the lake is similar from top to bottom, the lake churns and the amount of oxygen is the same from top to bottom. As the sun shines and the weather warms, the surface of the lake warms as well. Since warm water is lighter than cold water, a very distinct layering effect occurs, very similar to putting oil on water. The warm surface is separated from the cold bottom by a middle layer called the thermocline. What the layering does is eliminate the mixing of the lake so, during wind and storms, only the surface is recharged with oxygen by interaction with the air. The area below the thermocline only has what it had at the beginning of the spring. During the summer, algae grows, then dies sinking to

the bottom. There it is degraded by bacteria which need oxygen for this process. In a lake that produces low amounts of organic matter, with little algae, this usually means little use of the oxygen and when you measure over the summer, little of the oxygen is lost from the bottom. In eutrophic lakes (those in their final stages), the oxygen below the thermocline is lost rapidly.


We share equipment for measuring dissolved oxygen and temperature in the lake with Corey and Eagle Lakes, and do sampling about every three weeks or so. This involves measuring the oxygen and temperature every few feet from the surface right down to the bottom of the lake in our 95 foot basin. From these measurements a profile or graph is produced. The rate of oxygen loss in the area below the thermocline during an individual year and especially changes from year to year are good measurements for determining changes in water quality. One might be reminded of the canary in the coal mine. We plan to do these measurements for many years into the future to track and evaluate any changes.


Below are two graphs. One from August 19, 2000 and the other from August 12, 2009. The circles represent oxygen concentrations and the triangles temperature. You can see the thermocline that develops at about 20 feet and extends to around 40 feet, and




being August the oxygen concentrations dropping below the thermocline. Although comparisons are difficult, just by looking at single snapshots from different years, it is encouraging that the rate of oxygen loss from below the thermocline is no worse from measurements taken nine years apart.

Just as a note, you see that in the thermocline the oxygen concentrations actually increase. This is due to an increased abundance of colder water loving algae producing oxygen. This is not good since it means more algae, but also it is good since it means that the lake permits enough light to reach these deeper areas to permit this particular algae to produce its oxygen. In this case anyway, it means there are no absolutes of good or bad.





West Sider Steve Quinlan is recording the lake temperature every every 30 minutes. The Temperature sensors are at the end of his pier, 50 feet out into the lake. The temperature sensors are 1 foot, 2 feet, and 4 feet deep. The graph above shows the data collected from from last week





### Stu's Star Stuff

### Poor, poor pitiful Pluto

International Astronomical Union (ridiculous I know, who doesn't?) then you wouldn't know that on August 23, 2006, it was decided that the solar system contains only eight planets. Pluto, which since 1930 had been classified as the ninth planet, was dropped from the list. Poor Pluto. Poor Pluto. Now we need to come up with a new way to remember the planets. Perhaps, My Very Educated Mother Just Serve Us... Nothing. Or maybe, Man Very Early Made Jars Serve Useful... I don't know, something that starts with an N.

But even if Pluto is no longer considered a planet it is still in orbit around our sun, along with countless other things way, way out there. So let's learn a little more about it, shall we?

As we learned last week the most-distant official planet is Neptune. It's about 30 times farther away from the Sun than Earth is.

But Neptune doesn't mark the solar system's edge. A vast magnetic "bubble" generated by the Sun extends far beyond Neptune's orbit. It deflects particles and radiation from other stars, making the solar system a little safer place for us to be.

Beyond that is the doughnut-shaped Kuiper Belt, which contains billions of icy comets. Its most prominent member is Pluto, which is classified as a dwarf planet.

Pluto is smaller than seven of the solar system's moons, including our own Moon. In Roman mythology, Pluto (Greek: Hades) is the god of the underworld. The planet received this name (after many other suggestions) perhaps because it's so far from the Sun that it is in perpetual darkness.

Pluto was discovered in 1930 by a fortunate accident. Calculations which later turned out to be in error had predicted a planet beyond Neptune, based on the motions of Uranus and Neptune. Not knowing of the error, Clyde W. Tombaugh at Lowell Observatory in Arizona did a very careful sky survey which turned up Pluto anyway.

Pluto has not yet been visited by a spacecraft. Even the Hubble Space Telescope can resolve only the largest features on its surface. A spacecraft called New Horizons was launched in January 2006. If all goes well it should reach Pluto in 2015.

A few other facts include that Pluto has at least 3 moons, Charon being the largest; it's orbit is highly eccentric, meaning it is sometimes nearer to the sun than Neptune; like Uranus it rotates on it's side and like most of the other planets I've never been there.

Although on occasion some have suggested that I go to Hades.

That concludes our trip through the solar system. Or does it? I can think of at least two things that we have forgotten and we see them almost every day. We'll get to one next time. Until then, enjoy the show. It's free. But you know that already. *-Stu Spratt*






