

### Here's a little history:

I recently found this article in a 1984 Birch Barker, that was **excerpted** from the September 6, 1970 Birch Barker. The reminiscence was written by Floyd Fulmer. This article takes on special significance because I think we have determined that in 2012, the Birch Lake Yacht Club will celebrate 50 years in their new clubhouse.

Birch Lake conservation club was organized more than a quarter of a century ago. Monthly meetings were held in various homes. Through the efforts of this early organization, Birch Lake was made an experimental lake with a resident conservationist working in cooperation with the Department of Conservation and the University of Michigan. Trout were introduced to the lake, but after several years, it was found that they were detrimental to the natural fish of the lake — bass, bluegills,perch, etc. — and after several years, they were discontinued. Fishing improved!

As the population of the lake increased, other interests besides fishing developed, such as boating and swimming; the name of the club was changed to Birch Lake Community Club. Sailboats appeared on the scene. The first organized sailboat races were held here about 25 years ago (1945).

The name of the organization was next changed to Birch Lake Yacht Club and the club-house was built on land donated by the Howards and financed by subscriptions ranging from \$5 to \$500. With the new club house, Bingo and dancing became popular. Travel and fishing films were shown, melon feasts and ice cream socials were enjoyed by all.

The Birch Barker made it's appearance about this same time. Three issues were printed the first year with only a couple of pages. The first annual Birch Lake Dinner was held at the Mishawaka Conservation Club in 1950 with 135 attending.

# **Water Quality Committee Report**

# **Blue Green Algae**

s a very warm and sunny summer moves into its latter stages, Friday, August 6th's report of a greenish scum extending about 30 feet out into the lake on the east side was not unexpected. Inspection revealed this to be evidence of a localized blue green algae bloom. We tested for ecoli and found none. Blue green algae are not really algae but a form of bacteria called Cyanobacteria that can exist as individual cells or in chains. Although bacteria, they have chloroplasts and can thus use the sun for photosynthesis — the process in which plants capture the sun's energy and convert it into chemical energy and are capable of converting nitrogen gas into usable nitrogen for growth, not something most other algae and bacteria can do. Unlike other algae, blue green algae are not part of the normal food chain and are not eaten by other organ-

Blue green algae are present in all waterways, but the growth and density are normally accelerated and a problem only in high nutrient (especially phosphorous) waters that have lots of agricultural or sewage runoff. Birch Lake is not a high phosphorous lake, but we do have zebra mussels. A study conducted in concert between MSU and the DEQ illustrated that the presence of zebra mussels is associated with elevated blue green algae growth even in low nutrient lakes. The reason for this association is not clear, but another reason why we do not like invasive species such as zebra mussels.

Although individually microscopic, when present in large numbers, blue green algae can cause water discoloration and, if on the surface, create a streaky colored (green, brown, bluish) scum. At Birch Lake, we have observed these surface blooms in the later part of

warm summers, on the windward side of the lake, after a breezy day, but a calm night. Normally during the day when they are photosynthesizing, the blue green algae control their relative buoyancy and are distributed in the water column. At night without the sun, they can lose their degrees of buoyancy and float to the surface. If present in large numbers they produce the surface scum or bloom. As the day proceeds in the presence of wind and sun, the algae become dispersed and the bloom goes away, or at least in lakes like ours it does since the areas affected are small.


Should we be concerned by the presence of the algae in our lake? Probably not, since they are there and you cannot get rid of them, and the blooms are small and isolated. However, a few words of caution and warning. These algae do produce some chemicals that are toxins to humans, pets, etc. Normally the concentration is so low as to have no effect, but some cautionary notes would be to avoid swimming in an area that actually has a bloom. Wait until it has been dispersed by wind and waves. Also try to avoid ingesting the water. Do not let your pets drink from the shoreline when you see a bloom. The presence of a bloom does not mean that there is a high concentration of

potential toxins, but it is better to be on the safe side, since these will disperse. Should we ever see large scale blooms that occur daily for extended periods, we will do a toxin test. The USGS has done some spot monitoring in the state of Michigan on



a variety of waterways, and toxin levels are normally well below the World Health Organization levels at which risk increases.

Can we manage or get rid of blue green algae? Getting rid of the blue green algae would require poisoning the whole lake, and would only reappear with the first goose or gull coming in from another lake. The best management is maintaining best practices by reducing nutrient runoff into the lake, i.e. leaves, grass, fertilizer, road runoff, etc. (Hopefully you have heard this message before). The presence of the sewers should reduce potential continued phosphorous leaching from septic fields and dry wells into the lake.

# Perseid meteor shower

he annual August Perseid meteor shower peaked on Wednesday night this week? Did you see it? Yeah, I know what you're thinking..."Now you tell me." I seem to always report these things after the fact. It's not that they aren't predictable. I think after writing Star Stuff for nearly 10 years my passion isn't quite what it once was. I apologize. Anyway, here is some interesting information relating to the Perseids...

Every August the skies above the Northern Hemisphere are peppered with little bits of space debris that create the Perseid meteor shower. The debris is tiny, ancient and packs a wallop. Let's find out why.

Meteoroids (which is what they're called while in space) are fast. They enter Earth's atmosphere (and are then called meteors) at roughly 133,200 mph. Most are the size of sand grains; a few are as big as peas or marbles. Almost none hit the ground, but if one does, it's called a meteorite.

Comet Swift-Tuttle, whose debris creates the Perseids, is the largest object known to make repeated passes near Earth. Its nucleus is about 6 miles (9.7 kilometers) across, roughly equal to the object that wiped out the dinosaurs.

Back in the early 1990s, astronomer Brian Marsden calculated that Swift-Tuttle might actually hit Earth on a future pass. More observations quickly eliminated all possibility of a collision. Marsden found, however, that the comet and Earth might experience a cosmic near miss (about a million miles) in 3044.

When a Perseid particle enters the atmosphere, it compresses the air in front of it, which heats up. The meteor, in turn, can be heated to more than 3,000 degrees Fahrenheit. The

intense heat vaporizes most meteors, creating what we call shooting stars. Most become visible at around 60 miles up. Some large meteors splatter, causing a brighter flash called a fireball, and sometimes an explosion that can often be heard from the ground.

Comet Swift-Tuttle has many comet kin. Most originate in the distant Oort cloud, which extends nearly halfway to the next star. The vast majority never visit the inner solar system. But a few, like Swift-Tuttle, have been gravitationally booted onto new trajectories, possibly by the gravity of a passing star long ago.

Perseid meteoroids (and if you've been following along, you know these are things in space before they hit Earth's atmosphere) are anywhere from 60 to 100 miles apart, even at the densest part of the river of debris left behind by comet Swift-Tuttle. That river, in fact, is more like many streams, each deposited during a different pass of the comet on its 130-year orbit around the Sun. The material drifts through space and, in fact, orbits the Sun on roughly the same path as the comet while also spreading out over time.

As Earth rotates, the side facing the direction of its orbit around the Sun tends to scoop up more space debris. This part of the sky is directly overhead at dawn. For this reason, the Perseids and other meteor showers (and also random shooting stars in general) are usually best viewed in the predawn hours.

Comet Swift-Tuttle was last seen in 1992, an unspectacular pass through the inner solar system that required binoculars to enjoy. Prior to that, it had last been seen in the year it was "discovered" by American astronomers Lewis Swift and Horace Tuttle, 1862. Abraham Lincoln was President.

Swift-Tuttle's orbit has been traced back nearly 2,000 years and is now thought to be the same comet that was observed in 188 AD and possibly even as early as 69 BC.

Swift-Tuttle is due back in 2126 (as you know now, it won't hit us) and astronomers think it might become a spectacular naked-eye comet like Hale-Bopp. If historical calculations are correct then the 2126 appearance will mark the comet's 3rd millennium of human observation, assuming someone is in fact around to see it.

OK, so we missed the meteor shower. Again, my apologies. But what can we see?

The Moon and the planets Venus, Mars, and Saturn put on quite a show this evening. The planets align to the right of the Moon. They are fairly low in the sky at sunset, and they all drop from view by a couple of hours after sunset. The brightest is Venus, the "evening star." Mars is just to its upper left, with Saturn a little farther to its upper right. Mars looks slightly orange, while Saturn is pale yellow. All three will appear low in the western sky just after sunset. Over the next weeks watch the relative motion of three bright planets against a well marked background of stars, and to see the very different speeds at which they move: Venus traversing four constellations and Mars two, with Saturn hardly moving at all. Get out there and enjoy the show. It's free you know.




rent cottages on various lakes during the summer.





It's less about what might come after and more about the community culture that could cease. Taps is lights out ... to be followed by Reveille in the morning. To the extent we are able (those who are willing), let's keep helping our friends on the hill.


