

Stu's Star Stuff

Pesky objects in the night

ack in the 1960s, after a weak-sister team managed to beat his Longhorns, Texas coach Darrell Royal compared the other team to a cockroach. The problem isn't what the cockroach carries away, Royal said, but what it falls into and messes up.

It's not just the pending football season that brings the comment to mind -- it's a pesky object in the night sky: the bright Moon. Its glare fills the sky with light. It's not nearly as much light as the Sun, but it's enough to mess up the view of faint stars, galaxies, and other objects.

When there's a bright Moon in the sky, astronomers turn their telescopes toward relatively bright targets that shine through the glare. They have to wait until the Moon sets to go after fainter targets.

Telescopes in space don't have that problem. Most of them don't look directly at the Moon, but with no atmosphere to scatter the moonlight, they can look just about anywhere else. In fact, they don't have to worry about the Sun, either -- as long as they don't look right at it, they can continue their observations of the universe all day -- and all night.

This week the bright gibbous Moon (gib-


bous means approaching full) is near the "spout" of the teapot (one of my favorites) formed by the brightest stars of Sagittarius. It's surrounded by the Milky Way. But the Milky Way is so faint that it's tough to make out. Like many other faint wonders of the night sky, it's "messed up" by the glare of the bright Moon.

What else is our there? The planets Venus and Mars are low in the southwest at nightfall. Venus is the brighter of the two; it's the brilliant "evening star," so you just can't miss it. You can't miss Mars right now, either, because the Red Planet stands almost directly above

Mars looks less than one percent as bright as Venus does. That's because Mars is smaller and much farther away than Venus is, and because its surface reflects much less sunlight. Venus is one of the most reflective objects in the solar system -- its clouds bounce two-thirds of the sunlight that strikes them back into space. By contrast, Mars reflects less than one-sixth of the sunlight that strikes its surface.

Despite the contrast, though -- or perhaps because of it -- Venus and Mars form a beautiful duo, shining in the western sky at nightfall and through much of the evening. Look for the teapot in the south, Scorpius the scorpion with its red heart, Antares, also in the south and the planets in the west. And enjoy the rest of the show. It's free.



Water Quality Committee Report

Ask Dr. Terry

ear Dr. Terry, The recent Gulf of Mexico oil spill was certainly a monumental and tragic event. Could you provide us with some insight regarding the volume of Birch Lake and how it might relate to the Gulf and the spill?

Thank you, -JPH

The oil spill was indeed tragic. But, you did not need me to tell you that. For you, I simply want to provide some perspective. The question really is how much oil would we have to add to Birch Lake to equal the leak in the gulf. Birch Lake has a volume of about 3.2 billion gallons. The gulf has a volume of about 643 quadrillion gallons. The spill has

been estimated to be about 4.9 million barrels or in the neighborhood of 206 million gallons. Although the oil in the gulf was not equally dispersed due to currents. winds, etc., the equivalent amount of oil that you would have to put into Birch Lake to equal the 4.9 million barrels in the gulf would be about one (1) gallon.

Since the leak occurred over about



100 days, this would be the equivalent of adding about 1 1/4 ounces of oil per day in the lake. We are not interested in testing the effects of such an addition to the lake, so please be careful when you put gas or oil into your boats. Unfortunately, we may already have more than a few ounces of gas getting

into the lake each weekend.

Answers to FAQs

ver the course of this year, I've talked with many lake residents who have a number of questions and concerns about the camp's situation. To help everyone understand things better, I wanted to present the questions I received most often.

Why is this year so rough?

Actually, this year is much better than previous years — we just didn't show all the cracks before. The crisis actually started in the early 1990s, and the council fell back on safety nets such as selling assets, cashing out investments, and incurring debt. This spring, we forecasted a budget deficit we couldn't overcome without outside help. And we believed that we could make up the difference without putting us deeper in a hole. So we laid it all out on the table and asked for help.

Is Camp in danger of closing this year?

Not really. If we fall short, we will be forced to rely on some of the familiar safety nets such as not paying bills, cutting staff hours, or spending against next year's income. None of these are sustainable, but they can get us through another year. Our goal is to get out of this cycle and return our attention to the mission of our organization. But if we

can't, we won't last much longer.

Why can't you split off from Camp Fire?

The River Bend Council is chartered with the Camp Fire USA national organization and that charter and our bylaws require us to remain a Camp Fire USA council. If River Bend Council were to close or if we cease to operate as a Camp Fire USA council, its assets (i.e, the camp) would be turned over to the national organization. That said, Camp Fire USA used to be a very strong brand with a deep alumni base. Our relationship is one of a franchise - we pay about \$11,000/year and we benefit from the name and history.

How can I guarantee that a donation will go to Camp?






