





## Don't believe the weathermen ...


ave you ever realized that you were making a mistake but couldn't change things as it was already too late? All of the weather predictions I had read said south winds at 9 mph by race time. Boy. were they wrong. I kept expecting the wind to fill in as predicted, so Harold and I set the marks out based on the forecast. I know that many of you were surprised that we were setting the marks, but came out anyway. By the time I recognized the wind was going to stay very, very light for the start of the races, it was too late to get to shore and call anyone to push off for an hour. I really should remember to bring my cell phone and call list before getting on Harold's pontoon. The light winds did not entice enough Sunfish sailors to come out to qualify for an official race (minimum needed are 3 boats per class). Erica and Mike, who did come out, stayed and sailed the course for fun.

Both Phil and I healed up enough to sail again. Bob. however, hurt his knee in last week's second race and took our place on the committee boat. Like any athletic competition, you can get injured if things don't go right. Whether it's getting your tiller extension caught, slipping on a line, or having a quick 90 degree wind shift catch you and your boom by surprise, things can go wrong very quickly. (Note I've experienced all of these things this year.) Between the second and third races. Dave Olson scared the committee boat when he had cut his head and was bleeding profusely down his face. 



This summer we enjoyed a trip through the solar system; our home sweet home. A middle-aged star, planets large and small, moons of almost endless variety, and a whole lot of leftovers make up our own little cosmic oasis of light and life. It's an oasis that we are still striving to understand — and that humans may someday explore in person.

In the winter of 1504, astronomer Nicolaus Copernicus watched as the planets Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn grouped close together in the evening sky. As he tracked them from night to night, he was troubled, because the planets bunched closest to each other about 10 days later than predicted by reference tables of planetary motions.

The tables, compiled centuries earlier, presumed that Earth was the center of the universe, with the Sun, Moon, planets, and stars all orbiting our planet in complex patterns. As Copernicus tried to decipher why the tables were wrong, he discovered that it was more than just a case of faulty numbers: The perceived layout of the universe was wrong. Copernicus realized that Earth and the other planets orbit the Sun, the Moon orbits Earth, and the "fixed" stars are all far, far away, and, most importantly, that Deb was actually the center of the universe.

Copernicus started a revolution in human understanding of the solar system and Earth's place in it.



It doesn't take any science background to step outside and enjoy the crescent Moon, the planet Venus, or the bright stars in the night sky, only an interest in the universe around us and a curiosity about what it all means.







### Hard to believe it's over

Barker of the year already! It seems like just last week that we were moving our stuff over to camp and getting ready for the start of the summer.

We want to give a HUGE thank you to everyone who helped plan and all those who participated in the Fun Fest and Silent Auction this weekend. It was a great success, and we are very thankful for all of the contributions we received. Thank you to those who donated items, spent time organizing the event, bid on items, helped distribute items and collect donations, and helped with the cleanup! We really appreciate all that you guys do to help camp.

The Fall Dinner on Saturday night was a wonderful success as well! I don't remember ever attending a Fall Dinner that was so well-attended. The dining hall looked beautiful, and it was great see so many friends and neighbors throughout the evening. I'm sad that we won't see many of you again before you close up your cottages.

I wanted to quickly recap the summer again. We had a grand total of 571 camper beds filled for the summer. That's a 16.5 percent increase from last year, and 54 percent increase from my first summer (2006)!

Overall, we were just shy of 75 percent full for the summer, and we had two weeks that were completely full. We were able to give financial aid to a total of 93 campers, compared to 66 last year, and just 5 my first summer.

Thanks to the generosity of our lake neighbors, we were able to raise nearly \$25,000 to support Camp. These funds will help us overcome the deficit in our budget, and will allow us to start next year with a better outlook. We're still not completely out of the woods yet, due to a lot of accumulated debt, but we're moving in the right direction!

Even though the summer camp

season is over, we're not completely closed down yet. We still have some upcoming events at camp:

Fall Camp Weekend (September 17-19). The Fall Camp weekend is a mini weekend filled with summer camp fun. The cost is \$75 for the whole weekend (or \$50 if your camper only wants to attend one night).

Family Camp Weekend (October 1-3). The cost is just \$25 per family member, and campers of ALL ages can attend! Join us for a laid back weekend of outdoor fun.

We also have work days tentatively scheduled for October 3 and October 23. If you're able to come out and help us close up camp for the fall (even for just an hour or two!). let me know so we can get you on our volunteer list.

Thank you again for all that you do for Camp Tannadoonah! We're already working on next year's schedule, and June can't get here fast enough!
