
The house was built in the early 70's and remained basically untouched for almost forty years. Along with adding eleven hundred square feet to the house, a major part of the renovation included changing the direction, height and pitch of the roof to create a fifteen foot high interior ceiling. All the dark paneling was removed and the house was painted in light colors. With these changes the house now had a clear view of beautiful Birch Lake.

The Magros were able to retain many of the original wood ceilings; a feature of the house that they really admired. Also remaining is the original circa 1970 chandelier in the stairwell. A new screened porch and deck were added and the house now comfortably accommodates the family of eighteen, soon to welcome grandchild number nine. "Our kids and grandkids have really enjoyed Birch Lake. and for us the house truly exemplifies its name, Tutto Bene (everything is good) which reflects our view of life" They hope their family will enjoy Birch Lake for many years to come



Salmon with Brown Sugar Glaze

Might I suggest a fine Pinot Noir to compliment this awesome Salmon recipe

Prep Time:5 Min

Cook Time:10 Min; Ready In:15 Min Servings 4

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

■ 4 (6 ounce) boneless salmon fillets

■ salt and ground black pepper to taste

Directions

1. Preheat the oven's broiler and set the oven rack at about 6 inches from the heat source; prepare the rack of a broiler pan with cooking spray.

2. Season the salmon with salt and pepper and arrange onto the

prepared broiler pan. Whisk



together the brown sugar and Dijon mustard in a small bowl; spoon mixture evenly onto top of salmon fillets.

3. Cook under the preheated broiler until the fish flakes easily with a fork, 10 to 15 minutes.

What a great sailing day!

What a wonderful sailing day we had on Memorial Day. It was nice to see a few boats out enjoying the steady warm breeze from the south. We did not hold a Memorial Day regatta as there were not enough boats ready to race.

Harold and I did set out the marks to let those who did get a boat launched take advantage of the opportunity to practice running a course.

I certainly needed the practice setting out the marks as I forgot to put on the smaller weights that make the marks stand upright. We also use a large hex nut as a weight permanently tied to the end of the line to help any extra line tail sink. This prevents a floating line from snagging on a sailboat's rudder or boards. However, I'll tell you, when the rope reels are spinning when dropping the mark's anchor, those hex nuts certainly have a way of hitting you in the worst possible place. Note to self, use your foot as a brake to keep things under control.

I'd like to thank all of the sailors who were able to make last Saturday's Start of the Season meeting. We reviewed the course layout, starting times, scoring and rules. The meeting minutes and course layout are being published separately here in the Barker. am weather permitting. All are welcome.

The season starts this week on Sunday, June 5 at 11

Start of Season sailors' meeting minutes

The sailors decided to keep the course the same; the layout will be as large as is practical for the wind conditions. The starting line/gate will remain closed except for finishing; this includes the Sunfish. The start signal is the same: 5 minutes for MC's, 10 Minutes for Sunfish.

The start time will remain the same: 11 Eastern, Noon if no wind earlier.

Harold Cranmer will set out the marks, Fleet Captain Jeff, will be his backup.

The Fleet Captain will contact everyone if we are not racing. 11 am Eastern will be the go/no go deadline; this gives Harold time to set out the marks if we decide to have races at Noon. If you plan on sailing and you have not already updated my contact sheet, please let me know the best way to contact you.

Sustained winds of 20 MPH will be the upper limit for holding the races.

The season will start June 5. The Kids' Regatta or Couple's Regatta are simply for fun and are unofficial events; they will not be included in any scoring or race completion counts.

From June 5 until Sept. 5, all official races including July 4 and Labor Day Regatta races will be included in the regular season scoring. 2/3 completion of all races will be necessary to qualify for the season. Did Not Finish (DNF) or Disqualified (DSQ) do not count as a completed race and will be scored one place less than the last placed boat. The square of 40 scoring system will still be used. Regattas will also be scored separately for recognition using the Low Point System as specified in the Racing Rules of Sailing 2009-2012, Appendix A. All races will be counted towards a boat's final score.


Committee boat service will be scored for all races that day as your season average rounded up. If your season average place is 4.8 as of the date of service, you will receive a 4th place finish for each race that day. All races that day will count towards the 2/3 completion of races for the season.

The July 4 regatta will be scheduled for Sat. and Mon. with Sunday as the rain date; this is to accommodate the Pancake Breakfast at the camp.

Within one minute of the start, barging rules are in effect, which means that a leeward boat can force a windward boat on the same tack to head up even if that requires the windward to go over the starting line prematurely or to tack to avoid the committee boat. Prior to that, a boat may need to give way to another to avoid the committee boat as it is considered an obstruction. If you are on the wrong side of the starting line at the horn, i.e. On the Course Side (OCS), you need to return completely below the starting line before beginning racing. You do not need to round the pin end or committee boat.

Fouls are to be cleared with a 360 degree turn in the leg that they are committed, when clear of other boats. Hitting the mark can be cleared on the following leg from that mark to the next. You do not need to re-round the mark that was touched.

Fouls are to be determined based on the honor system as communicated between the sailors. When in doubt, do your 360 turn. Blatant fouls not cleared that have a significant impact on finish placements may result in a DSQ. The Fleet Captain may contact the parties involved to arbitrate an agreement as to the rule infractions and determine appropriate redress. (This is the part of the job that I hate the most. Please, please, please do your turns!)





Plenty of action in the eastern pre-dawn sky

f you're an early riser check out the action in the eastern pre-dawn sky. The two brightest objects in the night sky, after the Moon, line up like a pair of celestial headlights in the eastern sky the next couple of mornings. Actually though, they're not exactly in the night sky -they're immersed in the morning twilight. Still, they're so bright that if you have a clear horizon, you should be able to pick them out.

The brighter of the two is Venus, the dazzling "morning star." (Morning star? Isn't it the evening star? Hmmm... Maybe it's two stars in one? Or of course not a star at all. We'll get to that soon. (And, parenthetically, I don't like parenthetical remarks (Stanley ;0)))) Tomorrow, fainter Jupiter stands to its left.

Although they look a lot alike, there's not really much resemblance between the two worlds.

Venus is a ball of rock that's about the same size as Earth. It shines so brightly because it's close by, and because it's topped by an unbroken blanket of clouds. They reflect more than half of the sunlight that strikes them.

Jupiter is much farther than Venus, but it's also much larger -- about 10 times Venus's diameter. It is a big ball of gas. But like Venus, it's wrapped in bright clouds.

Venus and Jupiter are headed in opposite directions. Jupiter is pulling away from the Sun as seen from Earth, so it's moving higher into the sky each morning. Venus is dropping toward the Sun. So after tomorrow, the two worlds will quickly pull apart, with Jupiter above Venus.

And while you're looking at Venus and Jupiter, look for a third world that's close by. Mercury is to the lower right of Venus, very low above the horizon. But it's tricky to find. Binoculars will help you pluck it from the waxing morning twilight. Keep looking up people. The show is there all the time. And best of all, as you know, it's free.

<u>Camp Tannadoonah</u>

Oh what a difference

hat a difference 5 years makes! This summer will be my 6th year as camp director. I've been reflecting back on my first

summer as camp director a lot lately, and thinking about how different things are at camp these days.

Here are some of the notable changes: In 2006, we finished the summer with 357 campers. That's just 46% capacity. This year, on May 31st, we have 413 campers registered for camp. Last year, we had just 328 registered campers on this date and we finished the summer with 495. So if we have the same growth from now until the end of camp as we did last year, we should finish the summer with 580 kids! That would be 75% capacity.

We have increased the number of campership opportunities for underprivileged campers, as well. In 2006 we had just 5 scholarship slots available. This year we hope to have enough funds for at least 60 partial or fully funded scholarships.

In 2006 we offered the following list of activities to the campers: swimming lessons, canoeing, kayaking, sailing, fishing, tennis lessons, archery, sports & games, nature, drama, and crafts. This year we have all of those activi-

In 2006 I struggled to find counselors to fill my staff, and ended up having a very rough summer with just 11 counselors who made it from beginning to end. This year I had filled all 20 counselor positions and 3 dishwasher positions before the first of April!

In terms of facilities, in the past 5 years, we have built the amphitheater built a small low ropes course, replaced roofs on 7 buildings, finished the surfacing of the tennis courts, replaced the sports shed, built the Murphy Memorial wall, and this year we are getting brand new mattresses for all of the camper beds. The nurse's cabin has a new floor this year, as well. We also did a major remodel of the shower house, getting new partitions, new lining on the walls of the showers, a new ventilation system, and non-slip floor mats throughout. Many of these projects would not have been possible without the help of our many lake resident volunteers!

Unfortunately we've also seen a rise in the cost of camp, from \$275 to \$425. Most of that cost is because of increases in the cost of insur-




ance, food, and supplies. However, some of it is needed to cover the increased staff (a major safety factor!), added activities, and improvements to camp. This year, however, we have made that cost an all-inclusive rate - so campers do not have to pay extra for any of the activities they wish to participate in, except for waterskiing. In the past, certain activities like tennis lessons, photography, or jewelry making cost \$20-\$25 extra per week.

So there have been many changes over the last five years, and we're very proud of how far we have come. We hope that 2011 moves us even further in the right direction!


