Silent Auction




Silhouette in the Barn

It is with some reluctance that I relate this story because at times veterinarians get into messes that can't be avoided. The type of things that happen can be so grossly unpleasant they can't be related and yet not offend people. But here it is.







Seagull days of summer?

he winds were light again. It certainly seems as though "The Dog Days of Summer" are here. (a.k.a The Seagull Days of Summer for you fans of my last year's columns. There has to be someone who has read them. Hello, hello! Anybody out there? Can anyone hear me??) Anyway, we were able to finish two races. In the MC's, both Phil and Harold won their first race of the season. In the Sunfish, Peter Soldoto came in third in the second race. It's nice when the finish places get shaken up a bit. Congratulations to them all.

Although I am beginning to heal, I wasn't sure I could always duck the boom. My Beloved Spouse has told me that I should stop hurting myself. I thought that maybe I'd start by not getting hit in the head. Although some might think it could knock some sense into me, I decided to join the committee boat crew.

I do enjoy watching from its stationary elevated position. You can more easily see the full course and the changing winds. It's also fun to see the tactical moves each boat takes, both offensively and defensively.

When I purchased my boat, the first thing I had to learn was how to sail and then came racing. For those who have never tried it, sailing is not the same as racing. Racing involves rules, a specific course, and an emphasis on speed to reach the finish line. It also has those pesky things called competitors. Learning how to avoid or involve myself with them was the next key thing to learn. I spent a lot of time reading and studying different sources for this. One of the best that I found for a novice is "Getting Started in Sailboat Racing" by Adam Cort and Richard Stearns. Although it is based on the prior version of the racing rules, the vast majority of the book is still valid and extremely helpful for someone just starting out.

Over time, the final and most challenging area is learning the Birch Lake winds. The hills and the lake's bowl-like shape constantly affect the direction, strength and consistency of the winds. Ask any sailor about this after they've hit that fluky area near the windward mark.

I want to thank Bad Patty Luecht, Good Patti Russwurm, and Bob and Sue Waddle for putting up with my tack-by-tack analysis on the committee boat. After hearing it, they will probably not let me back on so I'd better sail next weekend.

DSQ (Disqualified) scores as one place worse than last place (if 5 boats finished, you would have finished 6th, will be scored as 7th place). DNF, DSQ not counted toward minimum number of races needed.

CB - sailor who serves on Committee Boat receives their season average place as of that date - counted toward season total.

Season Points are awarded on Square of 40 system (1st = 40 squared = 1600, 2nd = 39

squared, etc.)

Season Place = total season points/number of races attempted

Crew - Counted toward completed races. Points go to skipper of boat.



BASIC RIGHT-OF-WAY SITUATIONS

Same Tack Boats Converging on Different Points-of-Sail

Leeward Boat has Right-of Way

In this example, both boats are on *Port Tack*. As they converge, the *windward* boat (Red), which is sailing downwind, has to *Keep Clear* of the *leeward* boat (Green).

Wind Direction

NOTE: Once again this rule applies for two boats near each other on the same tack. However, remember that any approaching Starboard Tack boat will have Right-of-Way over all Port Tack boats.

At about 10:45 am on Monday, July 11, 2011, a mighty thunderstorm with heavy rain and strong winds hit Birch Lake. Fortunately the power stayed on, but a lot of folks were left with new needs for tree removal, roof and boat cover repair work, finding of lost articles, picking up sticks, righting of tossed lawn furniture etc.

However, it was also a reminder of how man's activities can affect our lake.

We have moved the natural surroundings back from the shoreline 50 to 100 feet or more in many cases, building houses that with asphalt roofs eliminate acres of permeable surface areas in addition to roads, driveways, patios, etc.

Instead of natural shorelines we have many concrete and rock sea walls,

and short cut grass which does very little to slow down water flow to the lake. In short, since the rain and run off cannot naturally percolate into the soil through large available surface areas with native trees, shrubs, high plants, and such, instead it pours relentlessly off of roads, houses, driveways and their finished areas carrying everything on those surfaces over the grass and right into the lake.

Thus, the phrase, "If it is around the lake it will get into the lake" is quite accurate.

Our lake is not a truly natural system but a composite of what nature and man together have done.

For these reasons, please be parsimonious with use of (zero phosphorus only) fertilizers and weed killers, in addition to being careful with refueling of your boats and other motorized water equipment.

Lakes will age and change even without our presence and help; however, we do not want to accelerate this process more than necessary, particularly if we want to live here and enjoy the lake.

For the long term, it would be helpful to think about building buffers at the



shoreline to filter and slow down flow into the lake, even if minimal, i.e. a few feet.

We will provide some information on that in the future with reference to programs and education provided by the Michigan Lakes and Streams Association, Michigan State University, and others.

Water Quality Testing Data

Since the mid-80s, lake residents, primarily on behalf of your Birch Lake Yacht Club's Water Quality Committee, have been sampling and testing the lake for a number of different characteristics, trying to track its development and relative quality. Now, there are samples taken and tests performed by numerous different people and organizations (To their credit, Bob and Gert Temple have probably taken more tests than everyone else combined.)

Available on-line are two summaries of past test reports.

We know of the 1980's tests because of records maintained by the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) which is operated by the Michigan Lakes and Stream Association in conjunction with Michigan's Department of Environmental Quality and a number of other agencies.

Sampling is done by lake volunteers and analysis is conducted by state certified labs for all the lakes participating.

We participate in the following programs:

(1) Secchi disc or transparency - weekly readings

(2) Phosphorous - spring and summer,

(3) Chlorophyll - monthly, and

(4) Dissolved oxygen/temperature profiles of the lake — also spring and summer.

In addition to the Water Quality Committee tests, Bob and Gert Temple still do tests 1-3 above and are responsible for data prior and through 2008.

All of the CLMP data is available online by linking to it from **mymlsa.org**. Click on CLMP and then you can either download the "2010 CLMP Final Report" or visit the "micorps" website, go to "Data Exchange" then "View Data" and pull up all the data from when testing started.

This report includes data on a hundred or so Michigan Lakes and draws few conclusions other than to suggest our lake rates midway between an oligotrophic and mesotropic status, often thought of as the top and second most desirable classifications.

In addition to our CLMP work, within each of the last 2 years, we have also participated in an ongoing program run by Dr. Wallace Fusilier a Ph.D Limnologist (one who scientifically studies bodies of freshwater lakes).

We send spring samples and secchi disc data to him, and then he comes out in the summer to do his own testing. Each year he then provides a formal indepth report. The complete 2010 - 2009 report will be posted on the Birch Barker site next week (watch next week's Barker for complete information on accessing the file).

Although Fusilier has run similar studies on scores of area lakes, this report concerns itself with only our lake, includes reports on far more criteria than does the CLMP report, and summarizes that data to rate Birch as an "A" quality lake.


We hope you avail yourself of both of these reports.

Separately from the above, the Water Quality Committee contracts to have the lake mapped and then treated as needed for invasive species, and we do our own E coli screening, both each year. Results from those activities are shared with you via the Barker.

Last but not least, each summer members of the WQC survey for, and pull out, any then emergent purple loosestrife, which is another invasive species.

We will start a series on this data in the coming weeks, reviewing parameters separately and looking at them historically as well as today. We will also continue to report any E coli screening and invasive species information as it occurs.

e've talked about this before. Deneb, Vega and Altair, the summer triangle, is easily spotted directly overhead on Birch Lake summer evenings. The three points all have their own stories. Let's start with Deneb and Cygus the Swan.

As is the case with so many of the constellations, there are a number of possible explanations for the presence of the swan in the heavens. Some myths, for instance, state the swan was once the pet of the Queen Cassiopeia. Other versions state that the swan was Cionus, son of Neptune, who was wrestled to the ground and smothered by Achilles. To save his son, Neptune immortalized Cionus as a swan.

Another story says the swan is Orpheus, who was murdered by the Thracian women while under the influence of Bob Bacchus. Upon his death, the celebrated musician was placed in the heavens to spend eternity by his harp, Lyra. Yet another variant says that the swan represents the form taken by Jupiter when he deceived Leda and fathered Pollux.

According to Ovid, the swan was once Cygnus, son of Sthenele and a close friend of Phaethon. Phaethon died in the river Eridanus after attempting to drive the chariot of the sun, and Cygnus was overcome with grief that Jupiter could have struck down his friend:

As he mourned, his voice became thin and shrill, and white feathers hid his hair. His neck grew long, stretching out from his breast, his fingers reddened and a membrane joined them together. Wings clothed his sides, and a blunt beak fastened on his mouth. Cygnus became a new kind of bird: but he put no trust in the skies, or in Jupiter, for he remembered how that god had unjustly hurled his flaming bolt. Instead, Cygnus made for marshes and broad lakes, and in his hatred of flames chose to inhabit the rivers, which are the very antithesis of fire.

Cygnus is easily found in the summer sky. Also called the Northern Cross because of its characteristic shape, its brightest star is Deneb, which is part of the Summer Triangle with Vega and Altair. Cygnus is

located next to Cepheus and Lyra.

The star Vega anchors Lyra, the harp. Lyra represents the lyre played by Orpheus, musician of the Argonauts and son of Apollo and the muse Calliope. Apollo gave his son the lyre as a gift, and Orpheus played it so well that even the wild beasts, the rocks, and the trees were charmed by his music. He fell deeply in love with the nymph Eurydice, and the two were married. Their wedded bliss did not last for very long, however. Eurydice was wandering in the fields with some other nymphs when she was seen by the shepherd Aristaeus. Aristaeus was struck by her beauty and pursued her; as she fled, she was bitten by a snake in the grass and died of the serpent's poison.

Orpheus was devastated. He decided to seek out his wife in the underworld, and gained an audience with Pluto and Persephone. The king and queen of the underworld, like all others, were charmed by his music and granted him permission to take Eurydice back to the land of the living with him:

They called Eurydice. She was among the ghosts who had but newly come, and walked slowly because of her injury. Thracian Orpheus received her, but on condition that he must not look back until he had emerged from the valleys of Avernus or else the gift he had been given would be taken from him.

Up the sloping path, through the mute silence they made their way, up the steep dark track, wrapped in impenetrable gloom, till they had almost reached the surface of the earth. Here, anxious in case his wife's strength be failing and eager to see her, the lover looked behind him, and straightaway Eurydice slipped back into the depths. Orpheus stretched out his arms, straining to clasp her and be clasped; but the hapless man touched nothing but yielding air. Eurydice, dying now a second time, uttered no complaint against her husband. What was there to complain of, that she had been loved? With a last farewell which scarcely reached his ears, she fell back again into the same place from which she had come.

According to Ovid, Orpheus was so heartbroken from having lost his love not once, but twice, that he rejected the company of women in favor of that of small boys. The women of Thrace were infuriated and, while maddened during Bacchic rites, hurled rocks at the bard. The rocks, tamed by the sound of Orpheus's lyre, at first fell harmlessly at his feet, but the shrieks of the infuriated women soon drowned out the music. The women dismembered Orpheus, throwing his lyre and his head into the river Hebrus. The Muses gathered up his limbs and buried them, and Orpheus went to the underworld to spend eternity with Eurydice. Jupiter himself cast the bard's lyre into the sky.

Lyra may be easily picked out in the sky because it contains Vega, at zero magnitude the second brightest star visible from the northern hemisphere. Vega is also part of the summer triangle, formed with Deneb and Altair.

Check it out. It's up there every night all summer long. It's spectacurlar anywhere but especially here at Birch Lake. And best of all, it's free.

Balsamic Chicken

When the weather out is to wet to grill, try this Balsamic Chicken. I would recommend a nice Cabernet Sauvignon.

Prep Time: 5 Min Cook Time: 20 Min Ready In: 45 Min

Original Recipe Yield 4 servings

Ingredients

- 1/3 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried Italian herb seasoning
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Directions

1. Whisk together the balsamic vinegar, chicken broth,

sugar, garlic, and Italian seasoning in a bowl, place the chicken breasts in the marinade, and marinate for 10 minutes on each side.

2. Heat the olive oil in a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Remove the chicken from the marinade and reserve the mari-



nade. Place the chicken in the heated pan and cook until they start to brown and are no longer pink inside, about 7 minutes per side. Pour the marinade into the skillet, and cook until it thickens slightly, turning the chicken breasts over once or twice, about 5 minutes.
