COMMODORE'S COMMENTS

ecently, I have had several comments on my previous article concerning the Home Owner's Association meeting and hiring the Cass County Sheriff Dept's Marine Patrol to do extra patrols of our lake on holiday weekends (Labor Day weekend this year, then the 3 major summer holiday's for 2012).

Most residents were in agreement, but a couple felt that the patrols wouldn't do any good, possibly be an invasion of their privacy, and they didn't want the cost coming out of their B.L.Y.C. dues. They also felt it wasn't necessary to pay Home Owner's dues of \$10 and hadn't paid.

I explained that it was an unanimous vote of all the Home Owner's who attended, and the funds to pay for the extra patrol came from the Home Owners Association fund, not Yacht Club funds (no co-mingling of \$\$\$).

The #1 concern was SAFETY on the lake and if we could possibly prevent an accident by having the CCSMP here an extra time isn't it worth it? I think it is. It was voted on to approve up \$250 from the H.O. Association fund for 1 extra patrol each holiday. That is roughly \$1.06 for each home on the lake, the same cost as a large drink at McDonalds.

Both Diamond Lake and Indiana Lake had boating accidents over the 4th of July, no serious injuries, alcohol wasn't involved, since Indiana doesn't have a public access a drop-in wasn't involved.

I say get involved, come to the meetings, pay your dues to be able to vote for Directors to represent your opinions and views at the B.L.Y.C. monthly meetings (next vote for Directors with expiring terms is the Fall Dinner) and pay your Home Owner's dues to be able to vote at the annual Home Owners meeting. I'll get out of my Crow's Nest soapbox now,

Wrestling on TV has been quite a popular sport for viewers. I have heard of a hold and throw in the sport called











DNS (Did Not Sail) does not count against season score, however sailor must complete 2/3 of races to qualify for season.

DNF (Did Not Finish)

DSQ (Disqualified) scores as one place worse than last place (if 5 boats finished, you would have finished 6th, will be scored as 7th place). DNF, DSQ not counted toward minimum number of races needed.

CB - sailor who serves on Committee Boat receives their season average place as of that date - counted toward season total.

Season Points are awarded on Square of 40 system (1st = 40 squared = 1600, 2nd = 39

squared, etc.)

- Season Place = total season points/number of races attempted
- Crew Counted toward completed races.
- Points go to skipper of boat.

Basic rules of sailboat racing WHAT TO DO IF A FOUL OCCURS

IF YOU ARE FOULED _

- 1. Avoid Contact!
- 2. Hail the word, "PROTEST" to the boat that you believe created the foul. Raise a Red Protest Flag somewhere visible from your stern
- At the finish, notify the Race Committee that you plan to issue a protest giving the name and/or sail number of the offending boat.
 Once onshore, find a race official to fill out the appropriate paperwork.

IF YOU FOUL ANOTHER BOAT.

- 1. Avoid Contact!
- 2. If you believe you fouled another boat, promptly get clear of all other
- If you believe you fouled another boat, promptly get clear of all other boats and do two complete circles in the same direction consisting of two tacks and two gybes. Once the circles are complete, you can rejoin the race without further penalty. If you do not think there was a foul, continue sailing the race with the understanding that you are racing under protest. Once the race is complete, and not necessarily on the same day, a protest committee will hear the incident to determine which boat was correct. If you are wrong, you will be Disqualified (DQ) from that race.

IF YOU HIT A MARK

Promptly get clear of all other boats and do one complete circle in the same direction consisting of one tack and one gybe.

NOTE — You have NO rights over any other boat during the time you are doing penalty circles. Make sure you are clear in both time and distance from all other racers during staring your circles!

Water Quality Committee Report More on water quality testing data

n the Barker issue of two weeks ago, we outlined many of the types of tests performed on our lake. This information is available online from two different sources:

1. Dr. Wallace Fusilier's most current report, summarizing 2009 and 2010 Water Quality Studies, concerns itself with only our lake, includes data from the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) as well as from his own tests, over a broader range of criteria, and might give more in-depth and understandable explanations. Directions for accessing that report are elsewhere on this page.

2. The CLMP has been collecting, testing, and recording data, and Birch Lake volunteers have been submitting samples for same, since the 1980's. Its reports are available by linking to it from www.mymlsa.org. Click on CLMP and then you can either download the "2010 CLMP Final Report" or visit the "micorps" website, go to "Data Exchange" then "View Data" and pull up all the data from when testing started. Volunteer program watches over Michigan lakes for over 35 years

The Great Lake state can continue to be proud of its nickname thanks to its diligent citizens. Michigan residents have been volunteering to maintain the state's thousands of lakes for 39 years through the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. The state-funded effort provides lake monitoring, management and education for about 230 lakes.

More than 400 volunteers record lake parameters, such as turbidity, phosphorous, chlorophyll, dissolved oxygen, and exotic plants. Their field season is from May to September, when algae growth is high. Volunteers record Secchi disk transparency weekly, dissolved oxygen biweekly, chlorophyll once a month, and phosphorous twice, at the beginning and end of the season. Volunteers send samples to the Department of Environmental Quality where they are analyzed. The results are then published online for the public.

Volunteers also raise awareness about test results through word of mouth, said Paul Steen, ecologist with the Huron River Watershed Council. He noted how important it is to educate residents on controlling nutrient loading.

"People who live on lakes tend to have very nice houses with beautiful lawns," he said. "It's a stereotype, but there's a lot of fertilizer that goes into the lakes." That fertilizer contains high amounts of phosphorous and nitrogen, both of which contribute to eutrophication. This reduces the amount of oxygen available for the local flora and fauna in the lakes.

Also outcompeting native species in some Michigan lakes are invasive plants. These include the curly-leaf pondweed and the more common Eurasian water milfoil, which covered nearly 75 percent of Lake Ovid's surface, according to a 2005 DEQ study. Volunteers know to look for these invasive species while



collecting samples.

CLMP meticulously monitors the lakes in its scope, but the majority of Michigan's 11,037 inland lakes are not a part of the program.

"The hope is that we have a representative amount so we can figure out a trend that all the lakes are going toward," Steen said.


The program's name has changed over time, but Steen said he believes it first began in 1972, the same year the Clean Water Act was passed. It started with only Secchi disk measurements. One of the program's first volunteers has been making CLMP's Secchi disks for 37 years. Ralph Vogel, a retired engineer, began recording water data on Corey Lake in 1974 during an outbreak of swimmer's itch. Since then, he has gathered more than 1,500 data measurements and samples. He's also crafted more than 300 Secchi disks for the program. Vogel was named an "Amazing Volunteer" by The Volunteer Monitor, an EPA publication.

CLMP keeps costs low by using other homemade equipment, too, such as chlorophyll sample recorders made from juice cans and chains. The cans are lowered to the bottom of the lake with five-pound weights and then pulled to the top by the chain. Samples are then sent to the lab for testing. The only purchased equipment are 15 dissolved oxygen meters; the program buys only two a year due to funding constraints.

Though the program is only active May through September, some lake volunteers go above and beyond. The Glen Lake Association, just one of many member organizations of CLMP, received one of four annual National Fish Habitat Action Plan Awards in May. The GLA has been active for over 50 years monitoring Glen Lake and its surrounding waters.

emember our first episode about Ursa Major (the Big Dipper)? Callisto, the wood-nymph bore a son, Arcas, to Jupiter. Jupiter's then wife, Juno was angry as all Hades and transformed Callisto into a bear. But what happened to the child, Arcas?

When Arcas was fifteen, he was out hunting in the forest when he came across a bear. The bear behaved quite strangely, looking him in the eyes. He of course could not recognize his mother in her strange shape, and was preparing to shoot her when Jupiter prevented him. Arcas was transformed into a bear like his mother, and the two were taken up into the sky.

Juno once again was annoyed. It irked her that the pair should be given such honor, so she took her revenge by convincing Poseidon to forbid them from bathing in the sea. It is for this reason that Ursa Major and Ursa Minor are both circumpolar constellations, never dipping beneath the horizon when viewed from northern latitudes.

Ursa Minor is better known as the Little Dipper. Polaris, the star marking the end of the dipper's handle, is located at the north celestial pole. You know where to find it.

Next let's learn about Hydra, the watersnake. This is a tricky constellation to find, especially this time of year. This constellation represents the Lernaean Hydra, slain by Hercules as his second labor. The Hydra was a multi-headed monster--according to Diodorus (first century B.C.), it had a hundred heads; Simonides (sixth century B.C.) said it had fifty. The most common opinion, however, seems to be that it had nine. What made the Hydra so difficult was the fact that, whenever one of its heads was chopped off, two would grow in its place. Hercules managed to get around this rather major obstacle by having his nephew, Iolaus, cauterize each stump with a hot iron as soon as Hercules could chop off a head. The hero then buried the monster's immortal heads beneath a rock. The task was made somewhat more difficult by Juno, (here she goes again) who sent a crab to nip at the feet of Hercules while he battled the Hydra.

Hydra is a long and wandering constellation, stretching almost from Canis Minor (near Canis Major, the Dog Star) to Libra. It lies south of Cancer, Leo, and Virgo, and is best seen in the northern hemisphere during the months of February through May.

Next week let's see if we can find out why Juno is so cranky. Until then, get out there and see the show. It's always free.
