Minutes of the Homeowner's Association Meeting July 9, 2011 70 lake members \$7.548 in budget

Williamsville Drainage Project:

Phil Vitale contacted Cass County Drain Commissioner Bruce Campbell for an update. Bruce reported Williams Street was closed but is now open. Crews are working on seeding and shoring up the area. They will construct a catch basin and shut down the Mill race. Bids ranged from \$36,000 to \$90,000 Bruce accepted the lower bid. We will be assessed a second time but for less than the first installment, the project has been completed.

Steve Northrup reported on the following:

Sewer Problem Resolution Rainbow Road near Shavehead. There was a valve installed to flush the line in the winter since Birch Lake does not sufficiently flush the line due to fewer residents. There was an air valve that had to be dug up to repair. The Sewer Board is looking into other maintenance companies.

Road Resurfacing:

During the sewer project there was no road work performed. Last year the Township used \$230,000 including dust control. This year \$216,000 including dust control was budgeted. The Township uses Road Commission recommendations as a guide for road repairs. The Township makes the final decisions and the Road Commission matches 30%. The funds come from property taxes. Harvey St. paving was not recommended this year by the Road Commission. Lakeview will get paved this year. Teasdale Lake Road paving has been completed. A member asked about Lenore St. because every time it rains sand comes from the road and washes out into yards. The response was that residents from Birch Lake must continue to ask for assistance in getting a dry well placed for catching the rain. As a result the Township has appointed a study committee to look into the Lenore

St. problem.

Steve also informed the Homeowners Association that the Road Commission is trying to turn the Boat Landing over to the township. The Homeowners Association will continue to monitor and report on future actions. Road Signage to control speed on Birch Lake Road: The Homeowners Association Board of Directors will work with the Road Commission to receive approval for three "Slow"signs to be placed at the Cove, Harvey and Sears street entrances to the lake.

Terry Dugan asked who is responsible for blind spots caused by trees and brush on Sears and the South Shore lake road. Steve suggested Terry call the Road Commission about those locations.

The HO Directors discussed the need for a pamphlet on boating safety tips to be distributed to all Birch Lake Homeowners. The Directors will work on this project for completion at the beginning of next season.

There was also a discussion and vote on a motion to ask the Marine Division to patrol Birch Lake an additional time for each of the holidays in the summer. Memorial, July 4, and Labor Day. The Directors will look into this and funds up to \$250 an occurrence has been authorized.

A Weird Beard

During my stint in the Air Force at Limestone, Maine, I had established a small clinic for the pets on the base.

One of the common wild animals in that area is the porcupine. Its quills are an effective defense against enemies who might want to harm them.

Many of the pets, mostly dogs, had never come across what they thought should be easy pickings for them. Many of the larger more aggressive dogs were fooled by this slow moving animal and would subsequently show up at the clinic with a "weird beard." They came in with a multitude of white whiskers (quills), looking like they needed a shave.

With these quills emerging from the face, a dog can hardly eat. It requires a general anesthetic to remove most of them. After a dog grabs the porcupine, the guills cannot be pulled out with tweezers because the shaft of the quill is lined with barbs that are like small fish hooks. The pointed quill must be pushed forward from inside through the cheek to the outside of the mouth. Some quills remain deeply imbedded and may have to be broken off and worked out later.

The porcupine is not to be trifled with. Nature has given this animal a great defensive weapon. STAY AWAY so your dog won't end up with a "weird beard."





Advantages and disadvantages

here are several positives in my assisting to set the marks. Harold gets a helping hand and backup if he could not be here. I get a chance to see the course layout prior to the race. Going to the wrong mark or rounding one in the wrong direction happens more often than you would think. On the downside, I don't get to see any radar until I get back to shore.

When Harold, Karen and I left shore to set the course at 11 am there was a storm brewing over Lake Michigan that looked like it should pass to the north of us. We kept an eve to the west as we set the marks. but although the winds were light, the weather was beautiful. We came back to shore just prior to the noon start. When I had a chance to check the radar, the storms had moved to the western edge of Cass County and a line had developed stretching to the south. The committee boat had already left shore and was beginning to anchor. I grabbed my brother-inlaw, Marty Donohue, and headed out in our bow-rider to cancel the races and warn everyone.

We meet up with the committee boat, told them to leave and began to track down the few sailors already milling in the pre-start area. After telling them to head for home, we quickly made a loop around the lake to make sure no other sailors were going to head out to race.

By the time we had made our loop

and returned to the middle of the lake, menacing black clouds were on the western horizon. One sailor, who had borrowed Karen's Sunfish, was not going to make it back to shore in time and the committee boat was about to tow him to shore. A quick decision was made that I would tow the sailor since my boat was faster than a pontoon. We tied up and headed to the western shore, with the Sunfish going about as fast as one has ever moved. We were approaching the western shore when the strong, cold winds outflowing from the storm hit us. It began to rain as we untied the Sunfish and then we headed four cottages south to home.

My lovely bride meet us at the end of the pier to tell us that another Sunfish had stayed out too long and was now repeatedly capsizing in the middle. I turned to Marty and asked if he was ready for this. He said "sure" and off we went into the storm.

We reached the sailor, had him drop his sail, quickly tied up and began to tow him to shore. As we approached the shore, Marty said, "at least there isn't any lightning." I replied with, "zip it." Well, as you probably guessed by now, about 30 seconds later when we reached the shallows, a large strike hit at the top of the hill. Needless to say, we even more quickly untied the Sunfish, retrieved our rope and left.

As we pulled away from shore and turned westerly directly into the mael-

Water Quality Committee Report Chlorophyll (a) in Birch Lake

hlorophyll (a) sampling is one of the four tests that we do in concert with the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. As we have previously discussed, the others are transparency using the Secchi disk, which is done weekly from spring until fall. Phosphorous sampling in the early spring and late summer, and dissolved oxygen/temperature profiles of the 95 foot column of water in the deepest part of the lake monthly from May through September.

In regards to today's topic, chlorophyll (a) samples are taken monthly from May through September. Like phosphorous, all samples are taken in duplicate. While transparency and phosphorous are indirect measures of potential productivity, chlorophyll (a) concentrations are a more direct measure of this productivity, i.e. production of biomass. Since we are sampling a column of water for the chlorophyll (a) we are actually measuring the growth and amount of algae in the lake. Algal growth and buildup can be a slow and steady process or occur in blooms. Algal growth is a product of temperature, sunlight, and available nutrients, primarily phosphorous (why we measure it and discourage its' use) and nitrogen.


First let us say that algae are not bad actors and in fact are absolutely vital to the health of the lake as well as to us as oxygen breathing animals. The chlorophyll in algae is a pigment and what makes them green like all plants. This pigment is unique in that it can capture the energy of sunlight that allows the algae and other plants to make carbon dioxide into organic compounds (sugars), a process called photosynthesis, which can then be used to synthesize everything else in the algae or plant. A waste product of this process of fixing carbon dioxide is oxygen. Most of the oxygen in the atmosphere actually comes from algae in the lakes and oceans. Thus, algae are our friends as we would all like to keep breathing with minimum effort. Additionally, they serve as the first element of the food chain in lakes and oceans, upon which all animals are dependent. No algae, no may flies, no bluegills or bass.

However, with the exception of chocolate, too much of anything can be a problem. With increases in algae production, sediment at the bottom accumulates, oxygen is lost in the lake due to bacterial decomposition of dying algae (think fish habitat loss), and transparency is lost. This will all be part of the natural aging of the lake, but again we want this to be an issue in innumerable generations and to occur as slowly as possible.

Below are two graphs for the years 1999-2010. One shows the mean chlorophyll concentrations in micrograms/liter, and the other is the Carlson Trophic Index score for the algae concentrations each year. Although the concentrations bounce around a bit (weather etc can have a major impact), there is no upward trend and in fact the past two years have been the lowest we have seen. The Carlson Trophic Index is something used by the CLMP to illustrate where on the continuum of Oligotrophic to hypereutrophic (range is 20 through 80) these measured values lie. Again, we bounce from 36 to




42, all of which are on the shoulder of the oligotrophic (typically deemed most desirable) grading into mesotrophic (typically deemed second most desirable) range. Like phosphorous, these values are good, not changing for the negative (maybe better the past couple of years), and will serve as a baseline to evaluate change in the lake.

Perseid meteor showers

he Perseid meteor shower is at its best tonight. Unfortunately, that's not much to get excited about.

The Moon is almost full, so its beautiful but pesky light will overpower the "shooting stars." Only a handful will shine through. But keep looking anyway.

Almost any night here at Birch Lake we can see shooting stars. We've covered this before but it's certainly interesting to hear again. Meteors are most generally tiny bits of space debris that enter out atmosphere at a high enough rate of speed for friction to cause them to burn up. Particles smaller than a pea and even as small as a grain of sand are typically what you see over head when you see that streak of light out of the corner of your eye.

Amazingly the friction of the atmosphere is so great at the speed the earth encounters the debris that the stuff just burns up. We've all watched space missions on TV and we've seen how astronauts have to deal with friction at high speeds.

Meteor showers are predictable because we know that our path around the sun is predictable. We also know that comets that have passed nearby have left dust, beer cans and other debris in their wake and our path around the sun intersects with this line of trash on a regular and predictable basis.

Meteor showers are named for the direction from which they appear to originate. A shooting star can appear in about any part of the sky but if you trace it's path backward the origin will appear to be from a given general location, in our most instant case the constellation Persius.

Every once in a while a larger particle will enter Earth's atmosphere at speed and either create quite a spectacular light or even an



explosion or on rare occasions actually fall to earth as what then would be called a meteorite. Some examples have crashed through the roof of homes and in the extreme may have even caused the extinction of the dinosaurs.

There's no doubt though that they sure are cool to see. Look for shooting stars this weekend in most any part of the sky. Get yourself a blanket or towel, a lawn chair The Moon for Aug. 13 Illuminated Fraction: 0.996 0.5 days after full moon



and some bug spray and look up. The show is normally free but this week it isn't. Send me a dollar and have a good time. Next week it will be free.

~Birch Lake Recipes~ Pineapple grilled pork chops

These are a delightful and quick meal for the grill. I usually serve with a baked potato, but I prefer them with wild rice.

Original Recipe Yield 4 servings

Ingredients

■ 1 (8 ounce) can pineapple rings, juice drained and reserved

- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup brown sug
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspool gaine
- 4 pork chops
 1 pinch ground black pepper
- **Directions**

1. Mix together the drained pineapple juice, brown sugar, soy sauce, and garlic powder together in a large plastic zipper bag, and smush the bag a few times



with your hands to mix the marinade and dissolve the sugar. Place the pork chops into the marinade, squeeze out any air in the bag, seal it, and refrigerate overnight. Reserve the pineapple rings.

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium 2. heat, and lightly oil the grate. Remove the chops from the mari-3. nade, shaking off excess, and grill until browned, the meat is no longer pink inside, and the meat shows good grill marks, 5 to 8 minutes per side. Brush several times with marinade and let the marinade cook onto the surface of the meat. Discard excess marinade. While the meat is grilling, place 4 pineapple rings onto the grill, and allow to cook until hot and the slices show grill marks; serve the chops topped with the grilled pineapple rings.
