The Company holiday program



Camp Tannadoonah Fall is coming!

t's hard to believe that September is just around the corner, and we're having the Birch Lake Fall Dinner this Saturday! As you all know, the Camp Fire Silent Auction will be held in conjunction with the Fall Dinner at camp. We are hoping that this year's silent auction is just as successful as last year's! There are some great items up for bid again this year.

On Saturday, September 17 from 10am to 3pm we will have Camp Fire Outdoor Training at camp. This is open to all youth ages 5-16. They will learn about fire-building, hiking, outdoor cooking, knot-tying, campsite setup, knife safety, and much more! The cost is just \$5 for the day.

This fall we're planning to combine our annual Fall Camp with a Family Camp event! The dates for this event are September 23 -25. Families will each be given their own cabin, or room in a cabin, and all meals are provided. The cost is \$100 for a family of 2, and \$25 for each additional family member (kids 4 and under are free). Our counselors will be there to run a variety of camp activities, and we hope to have lots of families in attendance! Kids ages 5-16 can also attend Fall Camp without a parent. The cost for fall camp is \$75 per camper.

In addition to Fall and Family Camp, there are a lot of fall plans being made up here at camp. We will, of course, have our usual work days throughout the fall, and hopefully many lake residents will be around to help us rake leaves and close up camp in October. Keep an eye out for work day announcements!

One thing we're trying to accomplish this fall is a Waterfront Beautification Plan. The grassy areas at the waterfront are in pretty bad shape, with big, deep holes and some very wet, marshy areas. We'd like to till up all of that area, re-level the soil so that it slopes a bit to keep water from pooling under the clothes racks, and put down some grass seed to start taking root before winter. We've also brainstormed some ideas for how to re-direct the water flow from the springs behind our waterfront, so that it doesn't get so swampy in front of the clothes racks. I am working on obtaining information from the DEQ about this project, so that we make sure we're doing everything by the books. But if you have some time to help out, we're thinking that this project will be scheduled for sometime in mid- to late-October.

We are working with some Boy Scouts from the area to do some other projects around camp, as well. Right now, Thom Behrens is working on his Eagle Scout project, which involves cleaning, sanding, and refinishing all the steps on the waterfront staircase! He's using a chemical treatment to remove the dirt and grime from the

stairs, sanding them smooth, leveling any stairs that are crooked, and then applying a new stain with an additive to make them less slippery when it rains! If you see the stairs roped off, it's probably because he is working on his project, and would like people to avoid walking up and down them for a few days.

Another former camper, Austin Raffelock, is working on proposing his upcoming Eagle Scout project, and his plan is to get donations of materials to build new wooden bunk beds for several of our cabins. This is something we've been working on for a number of years, and currently we have replaced all of the old metal bunks in Cardinals & Wrens, Robins & Woodpeckers, Rotary, and Morris Lodge. That leaves Wallace, Exchange, Exchangettes, and Luta Koda. If he does all of the bunk beds in camp, that's a total of 26 bunks. In addition to the bunk beds, we have about 30 single beds that are still the old metal style. It's probably too big a project for just one Eagle Scout to attempt, but he plans to do as many as he can!

When to expect wind shifts ...

Ithough they took their time in arriving, the winds last Sunday were the strongest in quite a while. A cold front passed through overnight with light rain. In the morning, a Canadian high pressure system settled in producing 10 to 12 MPH from the West to North West and beautiful puffy clouds. When we were setting the marks, it seemed as though the winds were coming from different directions at each mark.

Here's a tip for you sailors: if you see us traveling back and forth between the marks to adjust them, we aren't sure where the wind is settling and you should expect large shifts during the race.

The winds were strong enough to cause Gib to go over on the second race. While trying to right his MC, the wind took it away from him. Luckily, Rick Doolittle was able to ferry Gib and chase it down. Also during the second race, as Bernie was approaching the finish line, his rudder broke off. Quite creatively, he tried to finish holding it over the side, but he eventually gave up and had to retire from the race. Again, Rick Doolittle helped by towing Bernie back to shore. Thanks to Rick for assisting the sailors in need. Unfortunately for the sailors, if you do accept outside assistance, you cannot finish the race.

So far this year, we have had 19 races. Finishing two-thirds of the races is necessary to qualify for the season final standings. Stu's Star Stuff



The planet Venus ...

he planet Venus passed behind the Sun a few days ago, moving from morning sky to evening sky. It's still too close to the Sun to see, though. In fact, we won't get a good look at it until around Halloween.

In a way, Venus is always hidden, because its atmosphere is completely veiled by clouds. Orbiting spacecraft have used radar to peer through the veil, and a few Soviet landers gave us brief glimpses of the surface.

None of those missions has told us a lot about its interior, though. Venus is a little smaller than Earth, but about the same density. That suggests that its interior is similar to Earth's.

We do know that Venus produces no magnetic field. Earth and other planets generate magnetic fields because different layers rotate at slightly different speeds, creating a dynamo effect. But Venus takes eight months to turn on its axis. At such a slow speed, all the layers rotate at the same rate.

We also know that Venus is covered by volcanoes, some of which may still be active. But there's no pattern to them, and there are no geological fault lines, indicating that Venus's crust is a single sheet instead of the overlapping plates that make up Earth's crust.

So the evidence suggests that Venus has a large metallic core, a surrounding mantle of partially molten rock, and a thin crust. But we won't get a good view until we set up instruments on the surface to probe what's happening underground -- something that won't happen for a long time.

Basil-Garlic Grilled Pork Chops

Ingredients • 4 (8 ounce) pork chops

- 4 (8 ounce) poix
 1 lime, juiced
- · I line, juiceu
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil
- salt and black pepper to taste

Directions

1. Toss the pork chops with the lime juice in a bowl until evenly covered. Toss with garlic and basil. Season the chops to taste with salt and pepper. Set aside to marinate for 30 minutes.

2. Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat, and lightly oil the grate.

3. Cook the pork chops on the preheated grill until no longer



pink in the center, 5 to 10 minutes per side. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read 160 degrees F (70 degrees C).
