

Blow the man down ...

ome all ye young fellers that follows th' sea. W-ay! Hey? Blow th' man down I'll sing ye a song if ye'll listen t' me. Give us th' time an' we'll blow th' man down!

Blow the man down is an old sea shanty. It has been described as the most famous sea shanty of them all, and justly so. It is claimed that its life began in the Western Ocean sailing ships, with German emigrants. Others state that it derived from an African-American song: Knock the Man Down. Western Ocean law was: 'Rule with the fist, the belaying pin or a capstan bar'. Chief Mates in these ships were known as 'Blowers'. The Second Mates were 'Strikers' and the Third Mates were 'greasers'. A rough tough world indeed.

There are countless versions of Blow the Man Down and as we've learned before this halyard shanty is a working song. A halyard is a strong rope used to haul on the yard - a wooden extension of the mast to which sails are fastened. The halyard shanty is sung while hauling on such a halyard. The crew 'rests' while the shanty man (sometimes elected by the crew) sings the verse - then all hands join in the chorus - and haul.

Between 1850 and the early 1900's, the fastest clipper ships were the Black Ballers, plying between England and America. The westbound voyage was usually 4 weeks against the wind and the returning eastern voyage was about 3 weeks, going with the winds. And the more quickly a ship returned to homeport, the quicker a sailor would get paid. A position aboard the Black Ballers was one to be envied, however, the reputation of the Black Baller captains was notorious, they ran a brutal ship. When it was said that a man was blown down, it meant that he was beaten to the ground, which was rumored to happen often aboard the Black Ballers.

The following are a sample of versions of the song about these ships and their treatment of sailors:

As I was a walking down Paradise Street A pretty young damsel I chanced for to meet.

She was round in the counter and bluff in the bow, So I took in all sail and cried, "Way enough now."

So I tailed her my flipper and took her in tow And yardarm to yardarm away we did go.

But as we were going she said unto me There's a spanking full-rigger just ready for sea.

But as soon as that packet was clear of the bar The mate knocked me down with the end of a spar.

It's starboard and larboard on deck you will sprawl For Kicking Jack Williams commands the Black Ball.

So I give you fair warning before we belay, Don't ever take heed of what pretty girls say.

Sailing was a ball last week with the excellent wind. While I couldn't see everything that happened I did notice some excitement on at least one of the MC starts and Rick and I went hull to hull on the last Sunfish race. No gunshots were exchanged but I may have heard some sailor language out there.

Thanks to Bad Patty and her committee boat crew for the wonderful job they did for all of us. We are grateful. See you Sunday at 11:00. Remember, all are welcome to come out and sail. Rick is giving Sunfish lessons so just follow him. I do. That is all.

Water Quality

Monitoring our lake

The Water Quality Committee continues to provide monitoring services regarding the health and safety of Birch Lake, as well as to survey for and eliminate invasive species as feasible.

At present, the monitoring services regarding the health of the lake are primarily through one program. It is the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) which is managed by the Michigan Clean Water Program (MiCorps). We participate in this program through our association with the Michigan Lakes and Streams Association, and this is all done in concert with the Department of Natural Resources. Our usual monitoring includes weekly evaluation of water transparency, spring and summer phosphorous sampling, monthly chlorophyll sampling, and frequent evaluation of the temperature and dissolved oxygen profile through the water column at the deepest part of the lake. Labs at Michigan State conduct the actual analysis for phosphorous and chlorophyll from the samples provided.

Birch Lake Yacht Club Water Quality Committee in-house monitoring and sampling services are typically performed by Dr. Terry Dugan and Gordon Seyfarth.

The entire CLMP report can be found at the Michigan Lakes and Stream Association web site. http://www.MyMLSA.org. After reaching their home page, click on CLMP, and once there, click on "2011 CLMP Final Report". This is a very educational report to read that includes not only the data for Birch Lake and all the other lakes in the program, but an overview of Lake biology.

For the 2009 and 2010 seasons we also contracted with an independent limnologist, Dr. Wallace Fusilier. He combined his own samples and test results with some of ours and provided an informative, in-depth report on just Birch Lake including test results from those two seasons. Although not based on most current data, his report is still significant because its conclusions are similar to those indicated by the CLMP data and it includes measurements on and information about other criteria not measured by the CLMP. The 2009 -2010 Water Quality Report on Birch Lake prepared by Dr. Wallace E. Fusilier, Consulting Limnologist with Water Quality Investigators of Dexter, MI, is now available online at the bottom of the same page as the 2011 Barkers ... go to http://www.philvitale.com and follow the links to the 2011 printed Birch Barkers. Unfortunately, Dr. Fusilier's decision to retire truncated any subsequent reports by him.

For the last 3 - 4 years we also randomly check throughout the summer for the presence of E coli. This data will be provided as it is collected during the summer. Please note that none of the BLYC samples, even those collected by an independent lab, over this time period, identified an issue here but will remain diligent in the monitoring.


Rick Russwurm contracts with an outside agency for survey and eradication of asian milfoil, and he and Bruce Wagner survey and actually pull out purple loostrife as it is found. These are




but two invasive species that if unchecked could dramatically alter our lake. Others are on their way and we will evaluate programs for identification and management as the issue arises. Michigan Lakes and Streams is a good source for information on other invasive species.

Programs are in place for the long term evaluation on the State of the Lake so we can look at issues from year to year. At this point we see no major changes from last year. Generally that is a good thing. In the absence of dramatic differences in weather patterns from year to year, stability in observations should be the norm. The lake will age as that is the natural progression of things. We just do not want to help it along through our activities.

In the meantime, please recall that fertilizer washing into our lake is not a good thing. If you feel you have to fertilize your lawn, please try to do so only minimally and use only a phosphorous free fertilizer. Gert and Bob Temple still have a supply of phosphorous free fertilizer at their home which they'd be delighted to share with any lake resident at a nominal cost, if not for free.

Daylight Saving Time

Big groan. Are we going there again? You betcha. The main purpose of Daylight Saving Time (also called "Summer Time" in many places in the world) is to make better use of daylight. We change our clocks during the summer months to move an hour of daylight from the morning to the evening

Most of the United States begins Daylight Saving Time at 2 am on the second Sunday in March and reverts to standard time on the first Sunday in November. Most of the rest of the civilized world follows a similar protocol but with some subtle differences not worth noting due to space.

The official spelling is Daylight Saving Time, not Daylight SavingS Time. Saving is used here as a verbal adjective (a participle). It modifies time and tells us more about its nature; namely, that it is characterized by the activity of saving daylight. It is a saving daylight kind of time. Because of this, it would be more accurate to refer to DST as daylight-saving time. Similar examples would be a mind-expanding book or a man-eating tiger. Saving is used in the same way as saving a ball game, rather than as a savings account.

Nevertheless, many people feel the word savings (with an 's') flows more mellifluously off the tongue. Daylight Savings Time seems to be in common usage, and can be found in dictionaries.

Adding to the confusion is that the phrase Daylight Saving Time is inaccurate, since no daylight is actually saved. Daylight Shifting Time would be better, and Daylight Time Shifting more accurate, but neither is politically desirable. In Europe Summer Time is used.

In the U.S., 2 am was originally chosen as the changeover time because it was practical and minimized disruption. Most people were at home and this was the time when the fewest trains were running. It is late enough to minimally affect bars and restaurants, and it prevents the day from switching to yesterday, which would be confusing. It is early enough that the entire continental U.S. switches by daybreak, and the changeover occurs before most early shift workers and early churchgoers are affected.

Anecdotally, daylight saving time has had a remarkable impact on a wide variety of unexpected areas. Though too numerous to go into in space available I'll provide a sample and we'll be done.

Widespread confusion was created during the 1950s and 60s when each US locality could start and end Daylight Saving Time as it desired. One year, 23 different pairs of DST start and end dates were used in Iowa alone. For exactly five weeks each year, Boston, New York, and Philadelphia were not on the same time as Washington D.C., Cleveland, or Baltimore — but Chicago was. And, on one Ohio to West Virginia bus route, passengers had to change their watches seven times in 35 miles! Holy mackrel. Most recently once in 20 miles was too much for some to comprehend. The situation led to millions of dollars in costs to several industries, especially those involving transportation and communications. Extra railroad timetables alone cost the today's equivalent of over \$12 million per year.

Through 2006, Daylight Saving Time in the U.S. ended a few days before Halloween (October 31). Children's pedestrian deaths are four times higher on Halloween than on any other night of the year. A new law to extend DST to the first Sunday in November took effect in 2007, with the purpose of providing trick-or-treaters more light and therefore more safety from traffic accidents. For decades, candy manufacturers lobbied for a Daylight Saving Time extension to Halloween, as many of the young trick-or-treaters gathering candy are not allowed out after dark, and thus an added hour of light means a big holiday treat for the candy industry. Ironically, the 2007 switch may not have had much effect, as it appeared that children simply waited until dark to go trick-or-treating anyway. Go figure.

While twins born at 11:55 pm and 12:05 am may have different birthdays, Daylight Saving Time can change birth order -- on paper, anyway. During the time change in the fall, one baby could be born at 1:55 a.m. and the sibling born ten minutes later, at 1:05 a.m. In the spring, there is a gap when no babies are born at all: from 2:00 a.m. to 3:00 a.m.

Indiana was for a long time a hotbed of Daylight Saving Time controversy. Historically, the state's two western corners, which fall in the Central Time Zone, observed DST, while the remainder of the state, in the Eastern Time zone, followed yearround Eastern Standard Time. (Note: NOT IST - no such thing then or ever) An additional complication was that five southeastern counties near





Cincinnati and Louisville unofficially observed DST to keep in sync with those cities. Because of the longstanding feuds over DST, Indiana politicians often treated the subject gingerly. In 1996, gubernatorial candidate Rex Early firmly declared, "Some of my friends are for putting all of Indiana on Daylight Saving Time. Some are against it. And I always try to support my friends." Nice sidestep.

Day length: 15h 14m

In April 2005, Indiana legislators wisely passed a law that implemented Daylight Saving Time statewide beginning on April 2, 2006, forever ending the needless and ridiculous debate about what time it was at Birch Lake.

This subject can be revisited again. But what's going on in the night sky?

The planet Mercury is peeking into view quite low in the west-northwest as the sky begins to darken. It looks like a bright star, but it is so low that it's tough to find. Keep looking as the month progresses.

Venus, the morning star, is quite low in the eastern sky, with the slightly fainter planet Jupiter not far to its upper right. Over the next few weeks, both will climb into view earlier, providing more time to enjoy the pairing.

On Tuesday he planet Mars stands to the upper left of the Moon as darkness falls, and sets by around 1 a.m. Mars looks like a bright orange star. The planet Saturn and the star Spica are far to the upper left of Mars and the Moon.

Check it out. The show never ends and it's always free.
