

We have had swans visiting our lake for several years without causing a problem so let's follow the old adage "Live and let live." Do not chase them with PWC's or with boats (this causes them to become aggressive) and take care when using chemicals and fertilizers. Avoid placing and storing any chemical products where they may be a danger to living creatures.

It is also reported that a baby duck hatched during a rain storm. The mommy duck and the rest of the eggs disappeared so after a few days of waiting for her to return, our kind Birch Laker gave the baby to the same rescuer. It is reported that the baby is now living happily with other baby ducks in a nice wetland area prepared for that purpose. If you happen to find one of our feathered friends in distress, you can contact the fine lady that took in these two. Her name is Diane Kuhl at 574-220-4042. She is a certified waterfowl

Safety Note: 10 pier sections!

The Cass County Marine Division reminds everyone to observe the 100 feet no wake zone from all other boats, piers, rafts and especially skiers. If you are in doubt about how far 100 feet might be you are encouraged to look at any pier the average pier section is 10 feet long, so 100 feet equals 10 pier sections laid end to end. Please keep your boat and the tubes and skiers on the back at least 10 per sections away form everything else when you are at wake speed!

Four Tales of Two Lakes

Recently, our neighbor and everybody's friend, "Honest Ed" Chester shared a piece published on July 9 of this year in the Goshen (Indiana) daily newspaper. Written by Louie Stout, a long time, and therefore highly regarded, contributor on the subjects of wildlife, fishing, and hunting to a number of local papers. To say the article was alarming would be a substantial understatement.

Louie told a riveting (to me anyway) story about Lake Webster, a 770 acre body of water near Syracuse, IN, not much more than an hour or so south of here. He reported that in 2010 a chemical treatment applicator had been paid what seemed to me to be a huge sum of \$125,000 to treat the entire 770 acre lake for an invasive plant species called Eurasion Milfoil with a potent product called Sonar. Since then, the article continues, the lake once known for great Muskie fishing, has become "turbid" (thick or opaque, with roiled sediment). Its' fishing has since deteriorated so severely that it is now largely reliant for its existence on some donated, man-made devices that provide some sense of natural habitat in a dozen or so specific locations throughout the lake. Stout spoke of continuing and growing friction between the lake's fisherpersons and other recreational users. The inference was clear: a big mistake had been made, a plant overkill had occurred, and the results were tragic.

Ed's admonition was that these circumstances were horrible indeed; and we must be on the alert to prevent them from ever coming to pass here at Birch Lake. As much as is possible for an overweight, sedentary, senior citizen who wears flip-flops, I too was shaking in my boots.

Tale #2

Determined to assure nothing so devastating would ever befall Birch Lake, it seemed some research was in order. We asked questions of Mr. Stout, the state of Indiana's area fish and wildlife biologist, the applicator firm, and the 15-year Chairman of the Lake's Weed Control Committee and learned a few things that weren't included in Mr. Stout's article as published in the Goshen News that day:


- 1. The Eurasian Milfoil (EM) problem at Lake Webster was not only mammoth but also long-standing. In 1998, the entire lake surface was so dense with EM that one couldn't motor across the lake without fouling their prop. Almost all recreational use was stymied.
- 2. While Mr. Stout's reported expenditure of \$125,000 in 2010 may have been high, the process was very expensive, not only when done in 1998 and 2010 but also when done on a lakewide basis in 2002. (Yes, that's 3 times in 14 years). So much so, that one of the reasons for

occasionally performing the mass treatment was to hopefully "hold down" the costs in the intervening years to \$25,000 or more per year.

- 3. While almost every activity has those that oppose it, to suggest the 2010 treatment was wildly or even generally unpopular just doesn't make sense. The support of the Lake Associate's 15-members Board of Directors was almost, if not, unanimous for each of the three lake-wide treatments. If the cost numbers thrown about are at all accurate, it would not be unreasonable to conclude that on the order of a half million dollars has been spent there on Milfoil treatments since 1998. A program of that magnitude required lots and lots and lots of eager and repeated local donors.
- 4. While some state employees might have preferred a smaller treatment in 2010, the state did grant the permit for the full treatment. If it had not been for economic restraints, the state might even have contributed towards it (as it had for at least one previous full treatment).
- 5. Reports of the current frustration of Muskie fisherpersons may not have been balanced. As much as there may be a friction between them and other lake users, there are also differences of opinion between local Muskie and bass fisherpersons. Suggestions that Muskie fishing may have been permanently ruined may have been premature. In this spring's annual Muskie tournament, more of that species were retrieved from Webster Lake than from either of two area chains of lakes.
- 6. There are two very scary, highly unfortunate properties of Eurasian Milfoil:
- a) Even with massive, lake-wide treatments, it can never really be killed 100% permanently completely.
- b) It grows faster than almost any natural more desirable underwater species. This means there is a real risk that (as happened at Webster) once EM overtakes a lake to the point where there is little other plant life and it is then killed off, the kill will result in a relatively barren lake bottom which will be repopulated by the fastest growing available species, in this case Eurasian Milfoil. What a depressing, self-perpetuating cycle.

Tale #3

...is of our little gem of a (and God's favorite) lake, Birch. We do have significant advantages over Webster Lake in our shared battle with Eurasian Milfoil . Being much deeper, with limited intake from other bodies of water, Birch "flushes" itself far less often. This not only can help retard the spread of individual plants but also make localized treatments easier and more effective. Other advantages Birch enjoys are that no appreciable quantities of Eurasian

Milfoil were discovered here until 2007, and then only within a few acres of our lake, and that subsequent regular vigilance and treatment have prevented any further growth of the affected areas and has even caused them to recede. Our initial four locations of EM are now down to one location which has shrunk in size. (Your Water Quality Committee is also currently monitoring very small amounts of two other exotics: purple loosestrife and curley leaf pondweed). In any singular year, we have not had to eradicate as many as 10 acres of EM or spent as much as \$10,000 doing so. Not that Webster's application firm recommended more aggressive treatment than we would have had applied under similar circumstances, our use of an independent aquatic engineering and consulting firm to help us identify problems and recommend treatments, to be performed by others, is comforting. God does continue to shine his light upon us.

Tale #4

...is even better than that of the place Birch Lake. It is of the people of Birch Lake. People who so regularly, and on such a timely basis, do whatever it takes, whenever necessary, to protect and improve our quality of life. In this case, we are reminded of contributions of all the Water Quality Members and the Yacht Club Board Members and it's Commodore's who have served so steadfastly, usually in the background and without much fanfare. Two particular everyday and ordinary heroes deserve mention: Rick Russwurm, long time Water Quality Committee Member, who has long coordinated, and continues to, with the consulting firm to at least annually inspect the lake and the application of warranted treatments, first brought the need for action to the Yacht Club officers early in the 2007 season. Then commodore Blair Garceau immediately called a special meeting at which your Board overwhelmingly, and without reservation, supported any and all recommended remedial action forthwith. At least one present at that Board meeting felt like he had been present at a call to arms, a universal voluntary conscription, an outpouring of conviction so immediate and strong that one might almost pity the invasive species, so strong that the consultant, permitting agencies, and application were seemingly motivated to react almost immediately, and so strong that within hours there were thousands of dollars in a special fund to monitor and combat Eurasian Milfoil

Rick, Blair, and many others were and remain the heroes of this story. In a larger way though, all of you are heroes; particularly those that pay your dues, participate, take your turn, and support your fellow contributors of time and talent. You, the participating residents of the Birch Lake Community, are the best story of all.


nized by the International Federation of Sailing.



Barnacle Bill the Sailor

arnacle Bill the Sailor" is an American drinking song adapted from "Bollocky Bill the Sailor," a traditional folk song originally titled "Abraham Brown."

There are several versions of this often bawdy song. The first printed version of the song is in the public domain book Immortalia (1927). Later versions feature the eponymous "Barnacle Bill," a fictional character loosely based on a 19th-century San Francisco sailor and Gold Rush miner named William Bernard. Versions are also known in England and Scotland from the early 20th century.

The earliest known recording is an expurgated adaptation by Carson Robison and Frank Luther in 1928. This version was also recorded on May 21, 1930 by Bix Beiderbecke and Hoagy Carmichael with Carson Robison on vocals and released as a Victor 78. In 1996 it was released on CD on the album "Bix Beiderbecke 1927-1930." A friend of Beiderbecke's is quoted as saying that Beiderbecke told him he could not believe the record would be pressed and had felt that it had been done just for laughs. Beiderbecke cut loose on the tune with what is believed to be one of his finest cornet solos.

The tune has inspired a Fleischer Studios Betty Boop cartoon and two films, as well as the name of a rock on Mars. In the first Fleischer Popeye cartoon, Popeye the Sailor (1933), "Barnacle Bill" was used as the recurring theme for the Bluto character. A later Fleischer Popeye cartoon, Beware of Barnacle Bill (1935), is a mock operetta based around a toned-down version of the song.

One version of "Barnacle Bill" refers to an exchange between Bill and a "fair young maiden." Each verse opens with



inquiries by the maiden, sung by women, or by men in falsetto, and continues with Bill's profane responses sung by men.





Polaris, the North Star

olaris, the brightest star in the constellation Ursa Minor, or the Little Bear, a.k.a. the Little Dipper, is not especially bright or close by. It is famous however, because it marks the north celestial pole, so it's also known as the North Star or the Pole Star. Polaris is estimated to be at a distance of about 434 light-years from Earth. It is a multiple star, consisting of the main star, two smaller companions and two distant components discovered in 1780 by William Herschel.

It's currently about two-thirds of a degree from the true celestial pole. But over the next century it will snuggle even closer.

Because in the current era Polaris lies nearly in a direct line with the axis of the Earth's rotation "above" the North Pole, the north celestial pole, Polaris stands almost motionless in the sky, and all the stars of the Northern sky appear to rotate around it. Therefore, it makes an excellent fixed point from which to draw measurements for celestial navigation. The moving of Polaris towards, and in the future away from, the celestial pole, is due to a process called precession, a slight wobble of Earth's rotational axis, much like you'd see a top wobble as it's spinning slows. The celestial pole will move away from Polaris after the 21st century, passing close by Gamma Cephei by about the 41st century. Historically, the celestial pole has moved around some but as one of the brighter stars close to the celestial pole, Polaris has been used for navigation at least from Late Antiquity, and described as "always visible".

At present, Polaris is 0.7° away from the pole of rotation and hence revolves around the pole in a small circle $1\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ in diameter. Only twice during each day does Polaris accurately define the true north azimuth; the rest of the time it is slightly displaced to East or West, and to bearing must be corrected using tables or a rough rule of thumb. Over the next century or two precession will bring the North Star slightly closer to true north but then it will slip away and another star will be the next best reference point. Don't worry about it though. Our great grand-children's great grand children won't even notice.

But you should go out there and notice the spectacular show we have every single cloud-free night here at the lake. Look for Polaris by following a line defined by the pointer stars of the Big Dipper, the two stars that form the edge of the bowl opposite the handle, upward from the

bowl. That will lead you to the Polaris, the end star of the handle of the Little Dipper. Continue to follow that same line and you will come to Cassiopeia, a lazy W shape of stars. We've covered that before, and may possibly do so again.


