Please do not flush any type of wipes, diapers or feminine hygiene products into the sewer system. These items get tangled in the grinder pumps and in lift stations causing maintenance problems that could be avoided.

Problems like this may cause replacing pumps or other mechanical parts which may necessitate increasing the maintenance rate. If problem causing items are not flushed into the system the cost of maintenance and thus the sewer maintenance rate may be maintained.





Tallships Challenge — Great Lakes 2013

Although it began last year, the bicentennial commemoration of the War of 1812 will show its real fire power in Summer 2013, when Tall Ships America's bi-national TALL SHIPS CHALLENGE® series of tall ship races and family friendly public maritime festivals sets sail throughout the Great Lakes. In collaboration with local port organizers, Tall Ships America has scheduled visits from members of a fleet of 25 world-class tall ships to 22 U.S and Ontario communities. The festivities begin on June 14-16 with the Brockville (Ontario) TALL SHIPS® 1812 Tour and culminate September 6-8 with the Tall Ships® Erie event (Erie, Pennsylvania), but not before a historic re-enactment of the 200th Anniversary of the Battle of Lake Erie in Put-in-Bay (Ohio) on September 2.

Two countries, five Great Lakes. over 25 participating tall ships, 22 port appearances, five races, and millions of visitors-this is our biggest TALL SHIPS CHALLENGE® series to date in terms of ports, impact and numbers," said Tall Ships America Executive Director Bert Rogers. In 2010, when the TALL SHIPS CHALLENGE® series was last in the Great Lakes, the series visited six ports and recorded an economic impact of \$384 million. For 2013, Rogers expects that number to double.

"Operatives at each venue have been working for over a year to create memorable activities and events that not only honor the historical significance of the War of 1812 but also feature the vibrant nature of the host ports and celebrate the magnificence of the tall ships themselves," added Rogers.

At each site, the tall ships will be open to the public for viewing and feature dockside exhibits and lively interactions with crew. Among the ships partic-ipating at a majority of the ports are Norway's 210-foot Sorlandet, the oldest full-rigged ship in the world still in oper-ation; Canada's 72-foot brigantine Pathfinder, and the USA's 198-foot Brig Niagara. The Niagara was instrumental in the War of 1812 as the flagship for Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry. During the Battle of Lake Erie, one of the war's most critical battles, she helped Perry defeat the British fleet, ensuring American control of Ohio and all of Lake Erie.

Races for the TALL SHIPS CHALLENGE® Great Lakes 2013:

Between ports, the tall ships have the option to compete in five offshore races, one in each of the Great Lakes:

Race One: Toronto "Around-the-

Buoys" Race in Lake Ontario Race Two: Cleveland, Ohio to Pelee Passage in Lake Erie

Race Three: Tawas Point, Mich. to Drummond Island in Lake Huron

Race Four: Duluth, Minn. to Whitefish Point in Lake Superior

Race Five: Chicago, Ill. to the top of Lake Michigan

'Students and trainees will sail the ships just as was done during the great Age of Sail," said Rogers. "These races follow long-distance courses on the open water, and the ships sail without using engines. It's all to promote international goodwill through friendly competition.

Founded in 1973, Tall Ships

America is a non-profit organization dedicated to enriching youth education through character building and leadership programs aboard tall ships. It is the hub for tall ship activity, expertise, and information in North America, and is commended by Congress as the Sail Training organization representing the United States in the international forum. In addition to organizing the TALL SHIPS CHALLENGE® Series, Tall Ships America supports the people, ships and programs of sail training through grants, scholarships, confer ences, education, publications, and public events and advocacy

Lessons from the regional meeting

s many of you are aware, your Birch Lake Yacht Club through its Water Quality Committee has long been a participating member of the Michigan Lakes and Streams Associations. This entity sponsors numerous worthwhile and helpful activities, including: publishing the Michigan Riparian magazine, tracking and trying to influence, and/or responding to legislative, judicial, and executive government activities, holding quarterly statewide meetings and annual conferences, and co-sponsoring the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. Currently the MLSA has about 275 member lake associations.

This MLSA has divided the state into 15 regions. The region in which we are located, Region #3, has about 60 lake associations as members, it covers the southwest portion of Michigan and is particularly active in its own right, each year having an educational seminar and 2 open meetings in which each lake association present (typically 20 - 25) shares news of its status, successes, and challenges.

Finding these meetings both informative and enjoyable, typically a pair of your Water Quality Committee members attend.

Items we learned or relearned, at this May's meeting include:


1) In order to address their common problems (typically weeds), the vast majority of those lakes present have had to petition their township boards to create Special Assessment Districts, with average annual fees (in addition to voluntary dues) of \$100 to \$200 or more. 2) Most area lakes treat much higher percentages of their lake for eurasion watermilfoil then we do here at Birch. 3) A few area lakes have already identified colonies of hybrid watermilfoil through genetic testing. The jury is still out on how best to treat this faster growing, more hardy, nuisance. 4) Although the state DNR has extremely limited (virtually no) money for any activity we might deem worthwhile, its Trust Fund, which receives gas and oil pumping fees, is loaded and anxious to spend it's money on more and larger public boat launches. They currently have their sights set on 320 acre Eagle Lake, here in Cass County. 5) A number of lakes have actually participated in licensed swan and geese eradication programs, even though their hopes of success are only limited. 6) As we've reported before, none of these associates can even conceive of having one of our finest assets, which we tend to take for granted, the weekly, free, hand-delivered to everyone (not just members), Birch Barker.



7) One lake, of roughly 1,020 acres, named after an inert gemstone, a few miles due west of our lake , claims it spends some \$18,000 on fireworks each July 4th. This is a little better than double what we lay out. While I'm sure our show is better, if your competitive juices have been whetted, send Chas another, bigger check for this year's Birch Lake fireworks.

Please recall that these stories come from active members of active lake communities. As such, they are likely to describe conditions more favorable than those in place at the unrepresented lakes.

Bottom line? There is no doubt, Birch Lake remains God's favorite.

Stu's Star Stuff



One Encore

he golden tresses of Queen Berenice adorn the sky on early summer evenings. They form the constellation Coma Berenices, or the Northern Crown, a spray of stars that's visible through binoculars high in the east at nightfall

The constellation represents the beautiful hair of Queen Berenice of Egypt. She was so concerned for the safety of her husband Ptolemy III when he went off to war, that she vowed to cut off her glorious long hair as a sacrifice to Venus, should he be spared. When he eventually returned safely home, she kept her promise, and Zeus placed her beautiful hair in the heavens to shine among the stars.

If you look deep into the constellation, you'll see that the locks have some beautiful decorations - thousands of galaxies that form the Coma Cluster.

The cluster is only about 300 million light-years away, so its galaxies are fairly easy to observe and study. There's plenty to see - galaxies that range from little puffs of stars to monsters that are many times larger and more massive than our own galaxy, the Milky Way.

Galaxies can be classified in several ways. The most common is a system developed by Edwin Hubble, which is based on the shapes of galaxies.

The most beautiful galaxies are called spirals. The Milky Way is a spiral, and so is the Andromeda galaxy.

Spirals are flat disks of stars with bright bulges in their centers. Spiral arms wrap around these bulges. Spiral arms probably form as the result of waves that sweep through

the galactic disk. Like the waves on the ocean, these "density waves" don't carry material with them. Instead, they influence matter as they pass by. In the case of galaxies, they squeeze clouds of interstellar gas, triggering new star formation. Some newborn stars are massive, hot, and bright, so they make the spiral arms appear bright. These massive stars are blue or white, so the spiral arms look bluewhite, too. The gaps between the arms contain older stars, which are not as bright.

In some spirals, a wave organizes the stars in the center into a bar. The arms of barred galaxies spiral outward from the ends of the bar. The Milky Way falls into this class of spirals.

A second class of galaxy is the ellipticals. Like spirals, they are named for their shapes: they look like fat, fuzzy footballs. Instead of spreading out into a thin disk, as they do in spirals, the stars in ellipticals wrap completely around the galaxy's heart in all directions.

The largest galaxies in the universe are giant ellipticals. They can contain a trillion stars or more, and span as much as one million lightyears - about 10 times the diameter of the Milky Way. Like many large spirals, most of them appear to contain "supermassive" black holes at their hearts -- star-gobbling monsters that are as much as three billion times as massive as the Sun.

The final class of galaxies contains a hodge-podge of shapes — anything that looks neither spiral nor elliptical. These are the irregulars. These galaxies have no identifiable form, although, like looking at fluffy clouds

(At Midnight, US Central time, as viewed from the Northern Hemisphere) Illuminated Fraction: 0.339 1.5 days after last quarter



on a summer day, one might envision something recognizable, such as in the case of the Horse Head nebula or the Sombrero galaxy. Their stars, gas, and dust spread randomly. These are the smallest galaxies, and may contain as few as one million stars. They may be like the "building blocks" that came together to form the first large galaxies. Many small irregular galaxies orbit our Milky Way.

Look for the Northern Crown between the end of the handle of the Big Dipper and Leo's tail. It looks like a small tiara.



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



We are having a Lifeguard Training at camp next week — Tuesday through Friday, and then the waterfront staff arrives on Saturday, June 8th, and the rest of the staff arrives Sunday, June 9th for training! It's not even officially here yet, and the summer already feels like it's flying by!

We are still right on pace with last year's registration numbers so far. On May 28th last year we had 368 campers registered for camp, and as of this afternoon we had 389. That's nearly 40 more kids than we had for the entire summer in 2006 and 2007. We're still hoping to pass 700 campers for this year, so please spread the word about camp!
