

A Zen lesson from the East (side)

Thanks to Dan Waxman (east side) for the beautiful sunset picture he captured from his home recently ... and even more special thanks are due since this gives me (the editor) an opportunity to educate readers and contributors.

Due to the limits of the printing (and photocopying) process, in order to be aesthetically pleasing in the Barker (or any other publication), photos need to be sent in to us in a fairly high resolution (for those of you who understand resolution, our preference is 300 dpi) at the size it is expected to be printed. For the most part, cell phone photos and photos from almost all web sites are in the range of 72 to 96 dpi, and they usually arrive about the size of the photo at the right. What that means is that for the photo to look nice in the paper, I have to print is small — and if I were to enlarge this, the individual dots that make up the



image would be enlarged proportionally and the quality of the image would become very "grainy," "fuzzy," or "muddy."

Even photos from digital cameras (if they are set for low resolution output to conserve space on the storage card) are often too low in resolution to do much with ...

Believe me, I want to publish as many photos as I can from lakers, but sometimes it just isn't going to work ... If you have a printed photo, not one you printed on plain paper on your home printer, a real, old-fashioned printed photography from a drugstore or photo lab (does anyone still get those?) I can usually scan it at a high resolution and use the photo ... so that's usually worth a try

maintained residence status can now obtain annual Michigan fishing or hunting licenses free of charge, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources announced. The licenses are available at DNR Customer Service Centers and at license retail outlets statewide.

Boating safety courses

The Michigan Department of Resources reminds anyone who plans on operating a watercraft this year to take a boating safety course. Classroom and online options are available, and boating safety is required for anyone born after Dec. 31, 1978, who wants to operate a personal watercraft (PWC) and those born after July 1, 1996 who want to operate a motorboat. Children under the age of 14 may not legally operate a watercraft in Michigan.

Some boating safety requirements in Michigan are:

Those born on or after July 1, 1996, are required to have a boater's safety certificate to operate a motorboat. Those younger than 16 years of age also require adult supervision;

Persons younger than 14 years of age may not legally operate a PWC;

Those 14 and 15 years of age may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate and if he or she is accompanied on board by his or her parent or legal guardian or by a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian, or he or she is operating or riding the PWC at a distance of not more than 100 feet from his or her parent or guardian or from a person at least 21 years old who has been designated by the parent or guardian;

Those at least 16 years of age and born after Dec. 31, 1978, may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate; and those born on or before Dec. 31, 1978, may operate a PWC legally without restrictions.

Boating safety courses are offered in classrooms around the state.







Public Service Announcement Boating Under the Influence

oating and booze ... is that redundant? Asking if a yacht club has a bar ... is that even a question?

Aren't we now in 'Beer Can' racing season?

Yes, it's hard to escape the connection sailing has with spirits, so consider what follows to be a helpful reminder to be responsible ...

- A boat operator is likely to become impaired more quickly than a driver, drink for drink?
- The penalties for Boating Under the Influence (BUI) can include large fines, revocation of operator privileges and serious jail terms?
- The use of alcohol is involved in about a third of all recreational boating fatalities?

While it is not illegal to drink alcohol while boating, it is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs in every state. The U.S. Coast Guard also enforces a federal law that prohibits BUI. This law pertains to ALL boats (from canoes and rowboats to the largest ships) – and includes foreign vessels that operate in U.S. waters, as well as U.S. vessels on the high seas.

The marine environment – motion, vibration, engine noise, sun, wind and spray – accelerates a drinker's impairment. As a result of these factors, a boat operator with a blood alcohol concentration above .10 percent is estimated to be more than 10 times as likely to die in a boating accident than an operator with zero blood alcohol concentration. Passengers are also at greatly increased risk for injury and death – especially if they are also using alcohol.

The Coast Guard and every state have stringent penalties for violating BUI laws. Penalties can include large fines, suspension or revocation of boat operator privileges, and jail terms. The Coast Guard and the states cooperate fully in enforcement in order to remove impaired boat operators from the waters.

In waters that are overseen solely by the states, the states have the authority to enforce their own BUI statutes. These penalties can include the suspension or revocation of one's vehicle driver's license.

Spread the word on the dangers of BUI. Many recreational boaters forget that a boat is a vehicle – and that safe operation is a legal and personal responsibility.

~A history of Birch Lake ~

Note: I found a paper that was in some files at my dad's (James S. Tjaden) estate that was titled "History of Birch Lake." (James S. Tjaden passed away on 27 February 2013 at the age of 88). The author is unknown. I am enclosing what was written.

ong ago, millions of years in the past, the region where Birch Lake now lies was deep under a tropical sea. After the sea receded the land which emerged was the home of the reptilian and mammal age. Some 2,500 years or more ago great sheets of ice a mile in thickness swept down from the northeast, plowing and gouging the surface of the land.

Probably primitive man lived here before the ice came. He may have been the Folsom man as Folsom points, believed to be spearheads, have been picked up in Cass County. Shortly after the ice left, man came again, the forefathers of the Indians.

The first Indians in this section as found by the early French explorers were Miami's. Through a war council treaty, the Miami Indians, who were not a war-like tribe, were replaced by the Chippewa's, Pottawattomie's and the Ottawa's, who with exception of occasional wars, lived in relative peace.

The area around Birch Lake was held by the Pottawattomi Indians, who were headed by Big Chief Pokagon and under Chiefs Weesaw and Shavehead. While Pokagon was a very brilliant man, making friends with the white man, accepting white man's way and teaching, Shavehead was the opposite. He was a large man for an Indian, very ugly and very mean, gaining his name by keeping his head shaved, which did not make for an improvement in his appearance. Shavehead's winter quarters were around Shavehead Lake and in the summer he migrated to what is Mottsville where there was a ford across the St. Joseph River. This ford was on the Sauk Trail which is modern U.S. Highway 12. Shavehead would camp at the ford and extract a fee from the white settlers for use at the crossing. It is reported that he discontinued this practice only after a young burly settler had taken his ox whip and thrashed Shavehead within an inch of his life.

Shavehead was responsible for the death of many white settlers. He would promise to secure game for the white man but no one returned from the hunting trips but Chief Shavehead. Strangely enough, Shavehead met his death the same way. He was at the Trading Post, which is now Cassopolis, drunk and making brags about participating in the Fort Dearborn massacre. He was overheard by a young trapper who had lost his wife and child in the debauchery. The young trapper was then living on the Island of Diamond Lake. He asked Shavehead to go home with him. A shot was heard and Shavehead was never seen again.

The Indians under Chief Weesaw, whose winter quarters were in the vicinity of Newton's Woods joined Chief Shavehead's band in the early spring around Birch Lake, where they bathed in the lake and drank of its water, claiming the water had great healing power. It is recorded that Chief Pokagon, who was ill, made the journey from his home near Summerville for this purpose.

Settlement in Cass County was very slow; in 1840 the population was only 5,710. Early settlers around Birch Lake were the Harveys, Merritts, and O'Dells.

The decade previous to the Civil War was very exciting in the Birch Lake area. Sections of land in the south Cass County had been purchased by Quakers for the purpose of setting up small farms for runaway slaves and Negroes brought up through the underground railroad. Periodically, there would be a raid by southern slave owners to recover their

One of the first, if not the first, was the Smith cottage on Birch Lake.





Stu's Star Stuff

A favor called in

ur home galaxy, the Milky Way, is one of the leaders of a galactic pack: the Local Group. Its four dozen or so galaxies, tied to each other by gravity, move through space together toward the Virgo cluster at over 375 miles per second.

The number of galaxies in the Local Group is uncertain because astronomers keep finding new residents of this galactic neighborhood. They found a new one in 1997, about three million light-years from Earth. This new galaxy is a pipsqueak: It contains only about one million stars, compared to hundreds of billions in the Milky Way. That's why I hadn't mentioned it before now.

The Local Group, which spans some 10 million light years, has a definite hierarchy, with two leaders and a whole bunch of followers. Our Milky Way is one of the leaders, while the other is the Andromeda galaxy, a.k.a. M31. Both galaxies look like cosmic pinwheels, with streamers of bright stars wrapping around creamy middles. Each galaxy spans more than a hundred thousand light-years, and contains hundreds of billions of stars.

But it's tough to tell which of the two leaders is the boss. The Milky Way is more massive but Andromeda is bigger. Andromeda lies about 2.5 million light-years away. In other words, when we see M31, we're actually seeing it as it appeared more than two million years ago.

Andromeda is a wonderful laboratory for astronomers who study everything from gas clouds to black holes. It looms so large in our sky that big telescopes reveal many of its individual stars. Yet it's far enough that we can see the entire galaxy, allowing astronomers to study its overall structure and composition.

Almost all the other members of the Local Group are companions to either Andromeda or the Milky Way. Following the rules of the pack are paramount. Disloyalty or disobedience is not tolerated. In fact, both of the big galaxies have grown so big in part by gobbling up smaller galaxies who could not play well with others. The Milky Way is devouring several of these galactic snacks right now.

And, in several billion years, the Milky Way and Andromeda may have their own show down. We're moving toward each other within the Local Group, like two gunslingers on the dirt street of an old west town, where we will eventually slam together to merge into a super galaxy.

Look for the Andromeda galaxy, a small fuzzy patch of light, with binoculars on any clear evening this summer at the lake. Once you can find it that way you won't need them. Use the right side of the "W" of Cassiopeia as a pointer. Stop before you get to an intersecting line with the upper side of the Great Square of Pegasus.

To find The Milky Way, just look up.





Planet-stuff (an addendum to Star stuff): Though Jupiter, Venus and Mercury are millions of miles apart, right now these three planetary bodies will cluster above the evening horizon in a triple conjunction. The celestial phenomena peaked on May 26-27 as the planets form a tight triangle,



but can continue to be seen now. This will be the closest conjunction until 2021 and is special since these are the brightest three planets in our solar system. Watch in the western night sky from dusk through an hour after sundown.
