Safety Alert: Giant Hogweed

Giant hogweed is an invasive plant currently growing in Northern areas of the country. The primary spread is in the Northwest in Washington and Oregon, and the Northeast in the New England area. In the Midwest, this plant has taken root in Michigan, Illinois and northern Indiana. Giant hogweed is especially dangerous due to the sap coating the entire plant. If the sap makes contact with skin or eyes, and is then exposed to any kind of UV light or moisture, it reacts in a way that inhibits our protection from UV light. What this means is that if an affected area is exposed to sunlight, skin can be severely burned and eyes can be blinded. Attached to this email is a printable flier provide by the Michigan Department of Agriculture that includes a photo of the plant, examples of the kind of skin damage it can cause, information for how to

work safely in the vicinity of the plant, and steps to take in case of exposure.

If you do happen to come across one, DO NOT touch it, but call 1-866 NO EXOTIC (1-866-663-9684). You will be asked for your name, address, phone number, what species you think you have seen, what county it is in and what you have seen. If you call after hours, please leave a message. flush any type of wipes, diapers or feminine hygiene products into the sewer system. These items get tangled in the grinder pumps and in lift stations causing maintenance problems that could be avoided. Problems like this may cause replacing pumps or other mechanical parts which may necessitate increasing the maintenance rate. If problem causing items are not flushed into the system the cost of maintenance and thus the sewer maintenance rate may be maintained.





HOMEMADE MOSQUITO TRAP:

ITEMS NEEDED:

200 ml water 50 grams of brown sugar 1 gram of yeast 2-liter plastic bottle

HOW:

1. Cut the plastic bottle in half.

2. Mix brown sugar with hot water. Let cool. When cold, pour in the bottom half of the bottle.

3. Add the yeast. No need to mix. It creates carbon dioxide, which attracts mosquitoes.

4. Place the funnel part, upside down, into the other half of the bottle, taping them together if desired.

5. Wrap the bottle with something black, leaving the top uncovered, and place it outside in an area away from your normal gathering area. (Mosquitoes are also drawn to the color black.)

Change the solution every 2 weeks for continuous control.

Eurasian Milfoil treated

urasian Milfoil is an aggressive, tall growing exotic aquatic plant from Europe and Asia. It is capable of growing to the surface in up to 10 to 15 feet of water. At the surface it forms a dense canopy of vegetation over other plants. Many native plants may be reduced in abundance by the Milfoil canopy. It also conflicts with many recreational activities. In dense conditions it is a serious localized and lake wide problem. It is not a significant food crop for waterfowl, other birds or aquatic mammals. It readily regenerated from detached fragments and spreads rapidly. Consequently this plant can form dense colonies covering much of a lake's shore line out to a depth of about 20 feet.

We began monitoring aquatic vegetation in Birch Lake in 2001. We were part of a Michigan Lake & Stream program that mapped the aquatic plants in Birch Lake. Howard Wandell provided professional assistance to the Birch Lake Water Quality Committee. The mapping project revealed that Birch Lake had a



moderate plant population consisting of a good variety of species none of which dominated. At that time the survey determined that we did not have Eurasian Milfoil. In 2007

Eurasian Milfoil was discovered at three sites. Progessive AE provided professional assistance and is still under contract. For 2013



Progressive AE surveyed the entire lake for all types of invasive species in late May. Their survey turned up a total of 1-¼ acres of Eurasian Milfoil at two sites, one by the landing and the other at the north end of the east shore. Professional Lake Management has already treated the sites (on Tuesday 6/11/13) and Progressive AE will do a second survey.


This annual program is important in order to keep the Milfoil under control and to detect any other invasive species in the early stages to enable us to better control them. With your continued support we can maintain this vital program, and avoid having to deal with the acres of invasive species that are currently challenging so many other lakes.

Stu's Star Stuff

There You Have It

he Milky Way galaxy is most significant to humans because it is home sweet home. But when it comes down to it, our galaxy is a typical barred spiral, much like billions of other galaxies in the universe. Let's take a look at the Milky Way and then we'll be done.

A glance up at the night sky reveals a broad swath of light. Described by the ancients as a river, as milk, and as a path, among other things, the band has been visible in the heavens since Earth first formed. In reality, this intriguing line of light is the center of our galaxy, as seen from one of its outer arms.

As previously mentioned, the Milky Way is a barred spiral galaxy, and about 100,000 light-years across. If you could look down on it from the top, you would see a central bulge surrounded by four large spiral arms that wrap around it. (Cultural aside...In space, or in the universe, is there a top or bottom or up or down?) Spiral galaxies make up about two-thirds of the galaxies in the universe.

The Milky Way does not sit still, but is constantly rotating. As such, the arms are moving through space. Our sun and solar system travel with them. The solar system travels through space with the rest of our portion of the galaxy at an average speed of 515,000 miles per hour, or around 15 miles per second. Even at this rapid speed, the solar system would take about 230 million years to travel all the way around the Milky Way.

Not only is the Milky Way spinning, it is also moving through the universe. Despite how empty space might appear in the movies, it is filled with dust and gas and other galaxies. The massive collections of stars are constantly crashing into one another, and the Milky Way is not immune.

In about four billion years, the Milky Way will collide, as I gratuitously mentioned last week, with its nearest neighbor, the Andromeda Galaxy. The Andromeda Galaxy is obviously not the most careful of drivers. It shows signs of having already crashed into another galaxy in the past. The two of us are rushing towards each other at about 70 miles per second. When we collide, we will provide a fresh influx of material that will kick off star formation anew.

As late as the 1920s, astronomers thought all of the stars in the universe were contained inside of the Milky Way. It wasn't until Edwin Hubble discovered a special star known as a Cepheid variable, which allowed him to precisely measure distances, that astronomers realized that the fuzzy patches once classified as nebula were actually separate galaxies.

When you look up to find the Big






INSTRUCTIONS


Place all ingredients in the crock pot, and cook on high for 4-5 hrs. or low for 6-8 hrs.
