Every skier, tuber or rafter must wear a U.S. Coast Guard–approved Type I, II, or III PFD. Inflatable PFDs may not be used.

Every boat towing someone on water skis, tubes, wakeboard, or a similar device must have a person on board, (in addition to the vessel operator) observing the towed person(s) at all times.




It is illegal to tow persons on skis, tubes, rafts, wakeboards, or any device of this type between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, or from at least 100 feet away from shore, from any moored or anchored boat, from all docks and rafts, from the marked swimming area at Camp Tannadoonah, and from any person(s) in the water.

We recognize that on holiday weekends the increased traffic makes this difficult, but it also makes it more dangerous be aware of everyone and everything around you on the lake and SLOW DOWN!







Use caution with fireworks, campfires!

The Michigan DNR reminds residents and travelers that special care and vigilance are necessary while enjoying campfires and fireworks over the Fourth of July holiday weekend.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), in a typical year more fires are reported on Independence Day than any other day, and fireworks account for two out of five of those fires. NFPA also reported that campfires are the third biggest source of human-caused wildfire.

Make sure your campfire is out cold before turning in!

"Times like those spent with family and friends during the Fourth of July are what make Michigan summers so enjoyable," said Ada Takacs, DNR fire prevention specialist. "In order to keep these times fun, it's important to take a few extra steps that will ensure safety for all."

When preparing to use fireworks, the DNR suggests the following safety tips:

- Only use fireworks in parking lots, driveways and gravel or dirt areas.
- Keep them away from fields, grassy areas and buildings.
- Follow instructions carefully, with close adult supervision.
- Let fireworks cool, and then soak them in water before disposing of debris.
- Keep a bucket of water, wet towel and a garden hose nearby.
- · While enjoying campfires, some important safety

tips to keep in mind:

Never leave your fire unattended, even for a minute. Keep campfires small. Be sure to have water nearby. When putting a campfire out, drown itwith water then stir until it is cold to the touch.

"Keeping your family and property safe is vital to making Independence Day fun for everyone," Takacs said. "Smokey Bear turns 70 this year. Let's give him an early birthday gift by practicing his safety tips while having fun with fireworks and campfires this holiday. Always remember Smokey's words of wisdom: 'Only YOU can prevent wildfires!"



Handling Holiday Heartburn


It's the 4th of July!!!!!! It's a holiday spent with family gathered around a grill, and eating lots of delicious, yet generally unhealthy, foods. With all these holiday treats, surely somebody is going to have heartburn this weekend. Plus, the famous purple pill, Nexium®, just moved from prescription to "OTC" (over the counter) on May 27th so there have been lots of questions surrounding this topic lately.

Why does heartburn occur?

When you eat, the food you ingest travels from your mouth, through your esophagus, and into your stomach. Once the food hits the stomach, it splashes into an extremely acidic environment which helps with food breakdown. Since the stomach is so acidic, we all have an apparatus between the stomach and the esophagus called the lower esophageal sphincter (LES) which more or less functions as a gatekeeper. In normal digestion, this gate remains securely closed after food has passed into the stomach, so that no contents of the stomach can return back into the esophagus. However, certain conditions, foods, or lifestyles can cause the gate, or sphincter, to become weak, allowing the stomach contents to sneak their way back up into the esophagus. When the stomach contents are able to reenter the esophagus, it damages the esophagus and causes the painful burning sensation that we know as heartburn.

What causes the LES to become weak?

The LES can become weak during pregnancy, obesity, hiatal hernias, and in smokers. Certain foods can contribute to

heartburn such as spicy foods, peppermint, chocolate, coffee and alcohol. Eating right before bedtime and eating large meals are other contributors.

How to treat heartburn

Heartburn can be controlled with therapy that aims to neutralize or reduce the acid in the stomach. Tums work to neutralize the acid that is already present in the stomach. When you make the acid less acidic, it doesn't burn as badly. The other medications aim to reduce the amount of acid that gets released into the stomach. Zantac and Pepcid are called H2 blockers, and they work to reduce the amount of acid that is present in the stomach by about 50 percent. Prilosec , Nexium and Prevacid are called Proton Pump Inhibitors (PPIs) and they work to block the pump that releases acid into the stomach. By blocking the pump, proton pump inhibitors can inhibit nearly 100 percent of acid production in the stomach.

How do I know what medication to choose?

Medication choice depends mostly on how often you experience heartburn. If you experience heartburn greater than 2 days per week, then you should try a 14 day course of PPIs $(Prilosec^{\mathbb{R}}, Nexium^{\mathbb{R}}, or Prevacid^{\mathbb{R}})$ — like I said above, these are the workhorses of acid reduction, and can eliminate up to 100 percent of acid production. If you experience heartburn frequently, but it only occurs 1 or 2 days per week, then you should try Zantac[®] or Prevacid[®]. Although it would seem like you should use the stronger PPIs, it is not necessarily advised to use PPIs if not totally necessary — having too little acid in the stomach can cause problems over the long run as well. Plus, PPI's take 3 days before they start working. For this reason, use H2 blockers if your heartburn is not constant. If you are somebody who rarely has heartburn, but for whatever reason you ate too many spicy foods, Tums[®] will probably do the trick. Although Tums[®] doesn't reduce acid production, it makes the acid already in your stomach less acidic — perfect for those who only suffer from minor, temporary heartburn.

How fast do the medications work? The proton pump inhibitors like Prilosec^ \mathbb{R} , Nexium^ \mathbb{R} , and Prevacid^ \mathbb{R} take about 3 days before they start to work, so you might have to use Zantac^ \mathbb{R} or Pepcid^ \mathbb{R} for the first couple of days. Proton pump inhibitors are taken once daily on an empty stomach, typical 30-60 minutes before breakfast. Zantac^ \mathbb{R} and Pepcid^ \mathbb{R} work within 30-60 min, and are taken twice daily before meals. Tums^ \mathbb{R} work almost immediately and can be chewed whenever they are needed.

Lifestyle modifications to treat heartburn: Elevating the head of the bed by six inches, avoid eating before bedtime, avoid eating spicy foods or other foods and drinks that contribute to heartburn, weight loss, and reduce smoking.

I hope everybody has a nice 4th of July!! My advice: drink the beer, eat the salsa, and worry about the heartburn later.



Please be SAFE!

Know and Obey the Boating Safety Laws!

In Michigan, "reckless operation" of a boat, personal watercraft (JetSki), water skis, tubes, etc. which disregards the safety or rights of others or endangers people or propert are illegal.

Some examples are:

- Weaving through traffic or swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision
- Jumping the wake of another vessel
- \blacksquare Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife
- Causing damage from the wake of your vessel

Failure To Regulate Speed is operating a boat at speeds that may cause danger to life or property of any other person or at speeds that will not permit you to bring your vessel to a safe stop.

It is illegal to operate a boat:

- Over 55 mph
- At greater than "slow, no wake speed" when a person is in on the foredeck of a boat
- Faster than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions (weather, traffic, etc.)

Improper Distance is not maintaining a proper distance while operating a boat or towing a person. To maintain a proper distance when you are operating at greater than "slow, no wake speed" the boat or persons being towed $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{must}}$ not $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{be}}$

within 100 feet of:

- A shoreline
- Any moored or anchored vessel
- A dock or raft
- Any marked swimming area or person(s) in the water "Slow, No Wake Speed" means the slowest speed at which it is still possible to maintain steering, and which does not

Improper Direction is defined as the failure to operate in a COUNTERCLOCKWISE direction.

Riding on the Bow is illegal if the vessel is not equipped with bow seating and the vessel is operating at greater than "slow, no wake speed." Persons also are not allowed to ride on the gunwale. While underway, persons on a vessel may not sit, stand, or walk on any portion of a vessel not designed for that

Insufficient equipment is operating a vessel that is not carrying, storing, maintaining, and using marine safety equipment on board the vessel as required by the Department of Natural Resources.

RESTRICTED AREA Camp Tannadoonah



Under Michigan law, Boating in Restricted Areas is defined as operating within a restricted area clearly marked by buoys, beacons, diver-down flags, etc.

On Birch Lake the area marked by the buoys in front of Camp Tannadoonah on the north shore is a legally designated swim area that

Staying afloat: Life jackets, vests and floats

Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs) All boats must be carry with a personal flotation device for each person on board or being towed. Michigan law requires all children under 6 years old towear a USCG-approved Type I or II PFD when riding on the open deck of any boat while underway. All PFDs must be in good and serviceable condition and must be readily accessible.

Boats less than 16 feet long (including a canoe or kayak) must have either a Type I, II, or III or a throwable PFD for each person on board.

In addition to the above requirements, one USCG-approved Type IV PFD must be on board vessels 16 feet or longer and be readily accessible.

Each person riding on a PWC or being towed behind a PWC or boat (all skiers, tubers, etc.) must wear a USCGapproved Type I, II, or III personal flotation device. Inflatable PFDs are not

Type I: Offshore Life Jackets



These vests are geared for rough waters where rescue may take a while. They provide the most buoyancy, are excellent for flotation, and will turn most unconscious

persons face up in the water.

Type II: Near-Shore Vests

These vests are good for calm waters when quick rescue is likely. A Type II may not turn some unconscious wearers face up in the water.



Type III: Flotation Aids

These vests or full-sleeved jackets are good for calm waters when quick rescue is likely. They are not

Type IV: Throwable Devices These cushions and ring buoys are designed to be thrown

to someone in trouble.

Since a Type IV is not designed to be worn, it is neither for rough waters nor for persons who are unable to hold

TYPE V: Special-Use Devices

These vests, deck suits, hybrid PFDs, and others are designed for specific activities such as windsurfing, kayaking, or water-skiing. To be



acceptable, Type V PFDs must be used in accordance with their label.

Special laws apply to personal watercraft (PWC's, JetSkis, etc.)


Safety Requirements

- \blacksquare Anyone riding or being towed by a PWC must wear a Type I, II, or III PFD. Inflatable PFDs may not be used.
- Children under 7 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.
- The lanyard of a PWC's ignition safety switch must be attached to the operator.
- PWCs must be operated in a reasonable and prudent manner at all times.


IT IS ILLEGAL TO:

- To operate a PWC from sunset until 8 am.
- Jump the wake of another boat close to the other boat.
- Weave through congested traffic.
- Swerve at the last possible moment to avoid collision.
- A PWC must be operated at "slow, no wake speed" if crossing within 150 feet behind another vessel.
- You may not operate a PWC in waters less than two feet deep unless you are operating at "slow, no wake speed" or docking or launching.
- It is illegal to harass wildlife or disturb aquatic vegetation with a PWC.

STU'S STAR STUFF



Danger Will Robinson ...

n a lot of sci-fi movies and TV shows, humanity's fate is in the stars. According to these visions, we'll be warping off to Alpha Centauri, (Danger Will Robinson!) and beyond any day now.

The reality is far more daunting.

Consider that the most distant space-craft yet launched, Voyager 1, recently exited the solar system 35 years after it left Earth. At that rate, if the probe were headed toward Alpha Centauri, our nearest stellar neighbor, it would need another 75,000 years to get there.

Even so, a few scientists and engineers are thinking seriously about how we might reach the stars.

One leading idea is solar sails propelling a starship with the pressure of sunlight. Such a ship might reach a few percent of the speed of light but its sail would be as big as Michigan and the ship would need a thousand years to reach Alpha Centauri. Change the power source from sunlight to giant lasers and you could cut the travel time to a century. But such a laser would require as much power as all of humanity generates today.

There are other possibilities, but they're even more difficult. Giant worldships could carry hundreds of people on a one-way trip that would last many generations. And even a faster-thanlight warp drive might be possible but wildly impractical.

For the time being then, we're stuck in our own solar system. Yet some small steps into the galaxy could help set the stage for journeys to other stars.

It'll be a long time before we can send even a robotic probe to another star. The challenges of time, distance, and energy are just too tough to overcome with present-day technology or even foreseeable technology.

> Yet some scientists and engineers are pondering a small step toward the stars: a probe that would travel farther than any has yet journeyed.


The initial goal is to get a ship out to 250 times the distance from Earth to the Sun (faithful readers will recall that 1 AU, or Astronomical Unit, is about 93 million miles, about the average distance from Earth to the

Sun) more than 20 billion miles within 20 years of launch. By comparison, the farthest object yet launched is only half that far, and it took 35 years to get there.

After that, the ship would keep going, perhaps reaching close to a hundred billion miles before losing contact with Earth.

One concept calls for the mission to be propelled by solar sails. Another, devised about a decade ago, calls for a smaller sail that would be propelled by nuclear reactions triggered by antimatter. The study found the mission could reach the goal of 250 AU in a decade, using just 30 milligrams of antimatter. One small problem though, it would take decades to produce that much antimatter. Don't ask me how or why.


As such a craft sailed out of the solar system, it could measure the par-



ticles and magnetic fields of interstellar space. So even though it wouldn't reach another star, it could give us a taste of what our stellar neighborhood is like.

Check out our neighborhood any night of the week here at the lake. Raise your telescope, binoculars or eyes above the level of your neighbor's bathroom window and enjoy the show above. Look for the summer triangle, made up of Deneb, Vega and Altair, getting higher in the East each night as darkness falls. Blood-red Mars is between Spica and the Moon in the southwest. There's so much up there, and even if you don't know exactly what you're looking at, the show is still amazing.

And of course, it's always free.

- 4 Tbs dill, finely chopped

- 6. In a small bowl, mix dill, mayonnaise and lemon juice.
- 7. Add eggs, sweet potato and bacon, and mix. Serve warm or cold.
