





— Water Quality Report —

Why is our lake cloudy?

s part of our water monitoring program we weekly measure the transparency using an approximately 8" diameter (secchi) disc with alternating quadrants of black and white that is lowered into the lake with a tape measure. The depth at which the disc is no longer discernible is measured and recorded.

Every year, the lake starts out in the spring with good clarity followed by increased cloudiness during summer. Normal transitions have been from in the area of 30+ feet in the spring to around 10 feet or maybe a little less in the summer.

This year we had an incredible reading of 50 feet in the spring which is almost 10 feet below what we have seen since doing these measurements.

However, in the recent couple of weeks the lake has taken on a truly cloudy appearance with a secchi disc reading of only 6 feet.

In addition to the direct transparency readings, we also do monthly chlorophyll measurements, which indicate the amount of algae that are

growing (typically in response to increased sunlight and warmth). Increased algae would mean more particles in the lake and reduced transparency. Chlorophyll levels, and thus algae levels, have not been going up over the years and therefore would not seem to be a cause for increased cloudiness.


We will not know about this year's chlorophyll levels until winter, when we receive those test results from Michigan Lakes and Streams.

Another potential reason for the increased cloudiness is that this is a very hard water (water with a high mineral content) lake. As a springfed lake, water leaches through the

limestone below, dissolving calcium on its way to the lake. This calcium can then combine with carbon dioxide that has been previously dissolved in the lake in the form of bicarbonate, resulting in relatively insoluble calcium carbonate that will eventually fall to the bottom, mix with clay, and produce marl (which we have in abundance).

This year we had truly impressive rains a few weeks ago which could have increased the amount of dissolved carbon dioxide brought into the lake from the atmosphere. That, combined with our lake's high level of available calcium and the seasonal warming waters (which accelerate the process), could have created a calcium carbonate "bloom." This would not necessarily appear white but grayish or greenish when combined with the normal increase in green algae in the lake

The above theory, or educated guess, is just that but does have a good chance of being at least part of the explanation of what is happening in our lake. The most recent pH reading is 7.8 (or slightly alkaline) which indicates a higher potential bicarbonate concentration. Also recently, the water definitely tested "hard", indicating high mineral (most likely calcium) concentrations. The rest is chemistry.

How to set a wound

ave you ever known anybody who sliced open their foot trying to catch a turtle for the 4th of July Turtle Races? Have you ever slipped on a sleeping bag and cut open your leg? Have you ever tried to shave your face or legs and ended up with a bleed? Have you ever found yourself needing to know first-aid and you didn't know what to do?

If you answered "yes!" to any of the above questions, then this is the article for you!

First things first: If you cut yourself and there's blood, you need to stop the bleeding. To stop a bleed, use a clean cloth and apply direct pressure to the site until bleeding stops. Applying pressure to a wound will constrict blood vessels which allows for activation of the body's natural clotting mechanism. To speed up the process, utilize the power of gravity and elevate the wound above the heart. After about 15 minutes of applying pressure, the bleeding should naturally stop.

After the bleeding has stopped, the next important thing to do is to disinfect

the wound and prevent infections. To clean the wound, use water to rinse the wound for 5 minutes. I used to think you could use 3 percent hydrogen peroxide, rubbing alcohol, or iodine for disinfecting wounds, but turns out that can delay healing and injure the tissue. Once the wound is clean, apply triple antibiotic ointment or cream (Neosporin®) to the injured skin and cover with a sterile bandage. Repeat this process at least once daily until the wound is completely healed.

If a wound looks really dirty, is deep, or has jagged edges, please go to the doctor because you might need stitches or a tetanus shot! You should get a booster tetanus shot at least once every 10 years.

If trying to decide between a cream vs. ointment, creams absorb quicker, but rinse away easily. Ointments are oily by nature and do not rinse off with water so they stay on the skin for a longer period of time. Most people prefer creams because they feel less "greasy."


However, ointments may be best for cuts because they will stay on the skin longer and will act as a barrier against dirt and infections. If your wound is due to a burn, use Neosporin® cream because the ointment will actually hold in your burn.

The Summer Triangle

he Summer Triangle soars directly overhead in our sky just now. In the east after dark here at the lake on these July evenings, look near the horizon for Altair, the brightest star in the constellation Aquila the Eagle. This is the bottom star of the Summer Triangle; that is, it's the last of these three bright stars to ascend over the horizon. Cygnus, the swan is another corner of the Summer Triangle.

Aquila represents an eagle, the thunderbird of the Greeks. There are several explanations for the presence of this eagle in the sky. In Greek and Roman mythology, the eagle was the bird of Zeus, carrying thunderbolts which the wrathful god hurled at his enemies. But the eagle was involved in love as well as war.

The constellations of the eagle and the swan are linked in an account by Hyginus, some old, obscure Greek dude. Zeus fell in love with the goddess Nemesis but, when she resisted his advances, he turned himself into a swan and had Aphrodite pretend to pursue him in the form of an eagle. Nemesis gave refuge to the escaping swan, only to find herself in the embrace of Zeus. To commemorate this successful trick, Zeus placed the images of swan and eagle in the sky.

According to another story, Aquila, the pet eagle of Zeus, showed the gentler side of his nature when he carefully carried up the beautiful Greek boy Ganymede to Mount Olympus to be cup-bearer to his master.

However, in yet another story considering the myth surrounding Prometheus, the ferocious, darker side of Aquila is very evident. Prometheus was one of the last Titan gods who became an advisor to Zeus. He was protective of humankind and, seeing how they suffered because they had no fire, stole a ray from the Sun which he smuggled down to earth in a hollow stem. Zeus did not believe that man was worthy of such a gift and was furious that Prometheus had acted without his permission. The well-meaning Titan was chained to the side of a mountain, stripped naked of his garments and was continually attacked by Aquila. Since he was immortal, his dreadful wounds healed themselves every evening, only to be opened up again the next day by Aguila. After many years Prometheus was saved by Hercules, who agreed with his kind deed to mankind. Using his bow and arrow, he killed Aquila, who was then placed by Zeus to soar in the heavens.


Look for the three bright stars of the Summer Triangle any night this month. Vega and Denab are nearly straight overhead, while Altair is much farther east. Remember — Vega and Denab overhead, Altair is

"out there." Tequila can be found most any night near the constellation Flamingo on the eastern horizon.

There's a bunch of other stuff up there too and you don't need me anymore to find it or tell you what it is. You also know that the show is free and always will be.

Grilled salmon

A simple soy sauce and brown sugar marinade, with hints of lemon and garlic, are the perfect salty-sweet complement to rich salmon fillets. Even my 9 year old loves this recipe! NOTE: you can buy individual portions (vacuum sealed) at Bullseye Market.

Recipe makes 6 serving

Ingredients

1-1/2 pounds salmon fillets lemon pepper to taste garlic powder to taste salt to taste 1/3 cup soy sauce 1/3 cup brown sugar 1/3 cup water 1/4 cup vegetable oil

Directions

Season salmon fillets with lemon pepper, garlic powder, and salt.

In a small bowl, stir together soy sauce, brown sugar, water, and vegetable oil until sugar is dissolved. Place fish in a large resealable plastic bag with the soy sauce mixture, seal, and turn to coat. Refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

Preheat grill for medium heat.



Lightly oil grill grate. Place salmon on the preheated grill, and discard marinade. Cook salmon for 6 to 8 minutes per side, or until the fish flakes easily with a fork.









Camp Tannadoonah

Now for something completely different

or something a little different this week, I'd like to share some The Legend of Tannadoonah, which we read to the campers at Council Fire on the first week of camp each year.

The Legend of Tannadoonah

Many moons ago, when the Great Oak, which stands guard over our cooking fires, was but a tiny sapling, a young Indian scout made his way silently through the forest. The birds chattered to him as he passed, and farther away a mother deer and her young fawn stared at him curiously.


