



Treating lice

t my company's end-of-the-summer intern meeting we asked each intern to speak about their experiences this summer. One intern passionately declared, "I SAW A LOT OF LICE!!!" I burst out laughing, because she was SO right. WHAT A SUMMER FOR LICE! I don't ever remember seeing so many people come in looking for lice treatment! Now that the kiddies are heading back to school this week, I only expect it to get worse.

Lice are parasites that feed on our blood. While is sounds disgusting that you might have a parasite living on your head, lice are considered to be harmless as they do not spread disease.

If you get lice, it does not mean that you have poor hygiene, it just means you came into contact with somebody with lice. Lice cannot fly and they have very short, stubby legs. Therefore, the only way lice can move is by slowly crawling around. Lice can be spread by sharing brushes, hats, pillows etc., but the most common route is by direct, persistent head to head contact—such as heads touching while sleeping.

The main symptom associated with lice is an itchy head. If you see somebody consistently scratching their head especially around the ears or nape of the neck, you might want to inspect for lice. Lice infestation can be confirmed by the presence of a louse egg (nit) stuck to the hair. Louse are adult lice that lay their eggs at the base of the hair shaft (about ¼ inch from the scalp). Adult louse are about the same size as a sesame seed and the eggs are the size of a tiny seed. Eggs can sometimes be confused with "dandruff", but dandruff can be easily brushed off the hair, where lice eggs cannot.

If you confirm a lice infestation, you can start the process of eliminating the lice. First, inspect all family members to confirm who does and doesn't have lice. Only treat those who have an active lice infestation. It is not recommend to treat the whole family "just in case" they might have lice.

To treat lice, purchase an over the counter lice treatment kit and follow the packaging instructions. There are 2 kits available for purchase, Rid® and Nix®. Of the 2, Nix® wins my recommendation.

1. Nix® (permethrin): Kills adult lice, but not the unhatched eggs. Remains working for several days, so might kill newly hatched lice. Treatment should be repeated in 7-10 days to kill any new lice that might have hatched. Safe for use in age greater than 2 months. This is the most effective over the counter agent for killing lice since it continues to kill lice even after it's rinsed out, it's safe for use in infants, and it's not associated with allergies.



2. Rid®(pyrethrin): Kills adult lice, but not the unhatched eggs. Treatment should be repeated in 7-10 days to kill any new lice that might have hatched. Safe for use in people age 2+. Should not be used if you have a ragweed or chrysanthemums allergy.

General instructions for use: Wash hair with shampoo only (no conditioner). After towel drying hair, apply Nix® or Rid® paying special attention to the back of the ears and nape of the neck. Let sit in hair for 10 minutes, then rinse out. Try not to wash your hair for the next 2 days because some of the medicine remains on the hair and continues to kill newly hatched lice (Nix® only). After rinsing, separate hair into 1 inch sections and begin the process of removing the unhatched eggs (this is the most tedious, but most important part). Wash and machine dry bedding, hats, coats, clothing, etc on the warmest cycle, and throw away hair brushes. Vacuum all furniture and carpets and avoid using pesticide sprays that are marketed for lice prevention as they are unnecessary and can be dangerous if inhaled. Lice do not like heat so it may be extra beneficial to blow dry and flat iron hair. Repeat lice treatment in 7-10 days.

If live louse are noticed on the hair after a 2nd treatment, do not repeat with a 3rd treatment. If live louse are still present, the lice might be resistant to the treatment and you will need to go to a doctor to get a prescription lice shampoo.

The celestial scorpion

The celestial scorpion curves above the southern horizon as night falls on summer evenings, with the bright orange star Antares as its bright heart.

Antares is one of the most impressive stars in the galaxy; a supergiant that's destined to explode as a supernova any day now. But a fainter star that stands close to its right is pretty impressive, too. Sigma Scorpii consists of four stars, at least one of which will also end its life with a giant bang.

Two of Sigma Scorpii's stars form a tight pair their surfaces are separated by about half the distance from Earth to the Sun. They're so close together that even the biggest telescopes see them as a single pinpoint of light. But instruments that break the light into its individual wavelengths detect the presence of two stars, not one.

Both stars are much bigger, brighter, and heavier than our Sun. Their details have proved a bit elusive, but a recent study found that the dominant member of the pair is about 14 times as massive as the Sun and about eight times the Sun's diameter. Its companion is smaller and lighter, but still a stunner.

The heavier star is almost certain to explode as a supernova sometime in the next few million years. But the companion's fate is less certain. The star is near the mass limit for a star that will become a supernova. Above that limit, it goes boom. Below it, the star sheds its outer layers, leaving its hot, dense core a dead star known as a white dwarf, as likely our own Sun's fate.

What else is out there?

The two brightest objects in the night sky other than the Moon will stand side by side at dawn tomorrow like a pair of headlights. They're quite low in the eastern sky, though, so you need a clear horizon to see them. That likely means no dice for us down here in the hole.

Regardless, Venus is the brighter of the two. It's on the far side of the Sun, and is preparing to pass behind the Sun this fall. So right now, most of the hemisphere that faces our way is awash in sunlight. Seen through a telescope, the planet looks

like an almost-full Moon. Unlike the Moon, though, Venus isn't brightest when it's full because that's when it's farthest from Earth.

Over the next few weeks, Venus will gradually drop lower into the dawn twilight as its orbit carries it behind the Sun. It'll get lost in the Sun's glare by late September or early October.

Jupiter stands just a whisker to the right or upper right of Venus just now. It's heading in the opposite direction, away from the Sun. Over the coming months, it'll rise a few minutes earlier each day, and stand a little higher in the sky at the first blush of twilight. By the time Venus disappears from view in early autumn, Jupiter will be standing half-way up the sky at first light, ready to dazzle skywatchers throughout the fall and winter.


Look for Venus and Jupiter in the east-northeast at first light. Also look for the scorpion low above the south shore all night long. Enjoy the show. It's always free.

Next week, a star here on Earth. Hmmm \dots didn't I say that last week? This time I really mean it.

pletely new porch and roof. It will be expanded out about 4 feet to make a better space for campers to gather and for programming to take place.




